Many Magazines Shipped—

Four hundred eighty boxes of magazines were shipped to 115 different lumber camps in Oregon and Washington in 1929 by John Anderson, head of the Anderson system to promote co-operation and good will in the lumber business, according to his annual report. The reading material was made available to 17,000 men, the report declares. Thirty-five libraries or book cases were placed in as many different camps during the year, and Anderson hopes to equip other camps. He traveled 151 days in the field. The expenditure for the 12 months totaled \$4208.81.
