Meeting to Be Held—

Trappers and fur dealers of Oregon will hold a meeting at Burns January 15 to form a state organization. Though perhaps not generally realized, the fur industry in Oregon has again come to be an important business. Several hundred thousand dollars a year are brought to the state from the sale of furs and pelts trapped or raised here. The state game commission is glad to see the movement toward an organization, as trappers have been rather hard to handle. If the trapper forms an association of his own and helps to make the open season dates, or is persuaded that he does, he will be less likely to crowd the season and market surplus furs that have little or no value. All the fur dealers of Portland are expected to join the proposed body, as it is as much to the interest of the dealers as the trappers to see that only marketable furs are taken. The meeting at Burns will be the first of its kind in the history of Oregon and perhaps in the entire country. Trappers and fur dealers from all parts of Oregon are eligible to attend, and those who do so will receive a hearty welcome from their Burns hosts.—Oregonian.

NIGHTINGALES RETURNING TO SAFETY TODAY

Trio Spent Six Days In Snowbound Cabin In Sierras.

STOCKTON, Calif., Jan. 10, (A P.)—After spending a comfortable night at Cow Creek, following their rescue Wednesday from a snow-bound cabin in the High Sierra, 45 miles northwest of Sonoma, John M. Nightingale, his wife and 7-year-old son Stanley, were expected to resume their slow trek back to civilization early today.

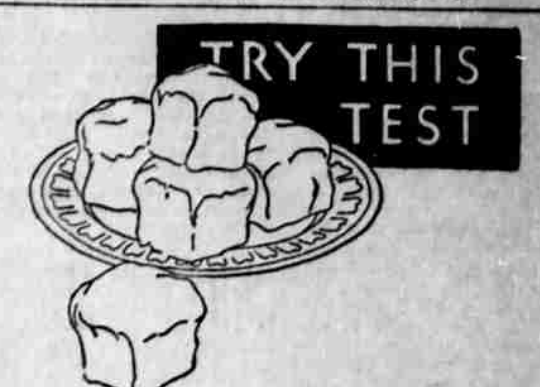
Friends awaited the Nightingale party and its rescuers, Fred Merma and Jasper Meuli, at Long Barn, last point on the road to Sonoma accessible by motor. By nightfall it was expected the Nightingales would reach their home here again, six days after they disappeared in a blizzard while on their way to Niagara Flat for a holiday.

Merma telephoned News here with a portable telephone and flashed the news just as A. A. "Scotty" Allen, noted Alaska musher, and his two dog teams were preparing to leave Tahoe tavern for Sonoma to aid in the hunt. Meanwhile, Nightingale's first wife, apprehensive for the

safety of 7-year-old Stanley, had taken off in a plane from Stockton, but was forced to abandon the search when the plane nosed over in the soft mud at the Oakdale airport, after being driven back by a blizzard over Sonoma.

Mrs. Nightingale's first concern on reaching a telephone was for the welfare of her canary. Friends found the bird in the Nightingale home here, weak from hunger.
