ASHLAND WINS FAST CONTEST FROM K. U. H. S.

Nose Out Local Squad In Last Minutes Of Play.

In a game that was anybody's right up to the last minute of play, the Pelicans of Klamath Union high school lost to the husky Ashland team last night, 35 to 22.

Although Ashland led in the scoring most of the time, the determined fight put up by the Pelican squad gained Klamath the lead in the third quarter and it looked bad for the visitors until after the last rest period when they gained the lead and held it.

Howell Real Center

It was plainly a case of too much center on the part of Ashland. Howell, a rangy 6-footer, was able to toss the ball where he would and it was only by fast, hard playing on the part of the Klamathites that they were able to overcome this handicap. Take Howell out of the team and it is a safe bet that the Pelicans would easily turn the tables on Ashland.

Klamath is weak on free throws. Ashland gave the boys plenty of opportunity to win last night, for if they had converted half of the fouls the would have stayed at home.

Reeder High Scorer

Reeder of Ashland was the high scorer of the game, throwing 11 baskets and one free throw. Howard Wakeman of Klamath led his team mates with six baskets and one free throw to his credit.

A crowd of about 500 people saw the game, which was one of the best seen on the new gymnasium floor. The band and Pep Peppers enlivened the occasion with music and stunts, while the rooters pulled hard for the team all through the game.

Some Old Tricks Are Still Good

Prize fighting is a pretty cleanly conducted game this present day, but it wasn't always so in the past and many managers and seconds didn't hesitate to put over a "fast one" on the referee and the public when it looked like the only way out.

Marking a man below the belt in the dressing room before a fight was always an "ace in the hole" should a fighter get the worst of the going and he always had apparent proof of a low blow should the referee pull down his trunks and examine him.

Some fighters even had their seconds bite them in the arms and chests between rounds, according to my old friend, Ed Smith, and then claim their opponent bit them in a clinch. Claiming a foul is just about the oldest and easiest way out of a tough spot, a recent example of which was "Phalling Phil" Scott against Otto Von Porat, and it was Jack Dempsey's plight to have it pulled on him as the referee.

Shires Upsets Al Spohrer's Ambition With Technical KO

BOSTON, Jan. 11. (AP)—Arthur (The Great) Shires, has upset the pugilistic ambitions of Al Spohrer, Boston Braves catcher, but baseball rivalries still bother him.

Winning a four round technical knockout from Spohrer here last night for his fourth ring victory in five starts, the White Sox first baseman was dissatisfied. "I didn't want Al Spohrer. I wanted Hack Wilson," he shouted at 18,000 fight fans after the decision.

Spohrer was outclassed from the opening gong. Right hooks by Shires began to land soon after the start of the first round and Spohrer quickly went into a clinch, grabbing Shires around the legs. Spohrer was dropped for the count of nine in the second round and remained in a neutral corner for a minute covering his bald head with his arms. His seconds threw the towel into the ring in the fourth.

Shires landed 87 right hooks to 29 misses, ringside statisticians said, while Spohrer got 27 light hits across to 29 misses. Spohrer's weight was announced as 169 to 175 for Shires.

The Garden management announced that Shires would return on January 31 for a match with an unnamed opponent.

WOODCHOPPER SURPRISES BIG SCANDINAVIAN

After Three Rounds Of Punishment Basque Turns Tables.

NEW YORK, Jan. 11. (AP)—Old Paulino Uezodus, the brawny Basque woodchopper, may be going back but Otto Von Porat, belting Norwegian from Chicago, will never believe it.

Otto poured heavy rights and lefts into Uezodus' rock-ribbed chin for three rounds of their ten round match in Madison Square Garden; had the Spaniard tottering about apparently ready for a knockout, and then saw, and felt, Paulino rally fiercely to gain the decision as 16,000 of the faithful cheered him on.

Regains Lost Punch.

It was an amazing victory for the woodchopper who seemed in recent battles to have lost much of the effectiveness that carried him to victory over many of the leading heavyweights of a year or so ago.

It appears likely that Paulino, in all his career, never absorbed so terrific a beating as he did in the first three rounds last night. Von Porat, punching accurately and with deadly power, sank lefts flush on Paulino's chin and dug into the Basque's body with heavy blows. After three rounds of this punishment, Paulino's nose was bleeding freely, his left eye turned red and his face was badly battered.

Von Porat Takes Cover.

Then the woodchopper began to fight. He charged in close and belted Von Porat about the body until the Norwegian was forced to abandon his sharp shooting for defense.

Von Porat tired under the Spaniard's relentless attack and lost the punching accuracy that, early in the fight, seemed to forecast the first knockout of Paulino's career. Von Porat took the first three rounds but Paulino won all the rest except the fourth which was even.

After the fight the Norwegian said he had been handicapped from the fourth round on by injuries to his hands.

Von Porat had a seven pound edge in the weights. He scaled 203 1/2 to 196 1/2 for Paulino.

Idaho Trounces Oregon Staters

CORVALLIS, Ore., Jan. 11. (AP)—With their head coach, Amory Gill, ill in a Salem hospital, Oregon State lost last night's basketball game to Idaho, 41 to 23. Idaho flashed a fast offensive. The same teams will play here again tonight.

MACHINE TESTS PEARLS

LONDON, A machine for testing pearls to reveal fakes is being used here. In testing, the pearl is suspended on a silk thread in a glass tube over an electric magnet in such a position that it is exactly between the two magnetic poles. When a current is passed through the magnet, the fake pearl will revolve, while the real pearl will not.

JONES THROWS CANADIAN.

EUGENE, Ore., Jan. 11. (AP)—Henry Jones, Provo, Utah, decisively defeated Jack McLaughlin from the frozen tundras of Canada here last night. Jones took the first fall in 49 minutes with his favorite hold, the whip wristlock. The second fall was awarded Jones in just four and one-half minutes with a duplication of the same grip.

SEATTLE, Wash., Jan. 11. (A. P.)—The return of Captain Jack Walker to the lineup of Seattle club after a six weeks' layoff, gave the Eskimos new life yesterday and they won their first hockey game in their last nine starts. The local club conquered Hockey League cellar holders, 5 to 2.

Referee Mickey Ion handed out a ten minute penalty and a \$25 fine to both Max Sutherland of Seattle and Oasie Osmondson of Victoria for fighting.

LAYTON TAKES CHAMPIONSHIP IN FINAL PLAY

Downs Reisel for Eighth Title in 20 Years Of Competition.

NEW YORK, Jan. 11. (AP)—Johnny Layton, a red-haired Missourian, is perched on top of the three-cushion billiard world for the eighth time in 20 years of competition.

He retained his title last night by downing Otto Reisel of Philadelphia, 50 to 32 in 43 innings. It was the final round of the week's tournament.

First Meeting

Although the two old masters have been battling in championship three cushion play together for a decade it was the first time they have ever met in a final game. Reisel won his only title in 1925, while Layton was in retirement. The little Philadelphia German stylist consistently rolled up his score. In 16 innings he counted 39 billiards, 23 of which were made in the last eight innings.

It was during this remarkable spurt that the champion ran his high cluster of eight. Reisel sought to stay in the battle, counting eight in two consecutive innings but as a rule he found himself confronted with a defensive style of play that was almost as brilliant as Layton's offense.

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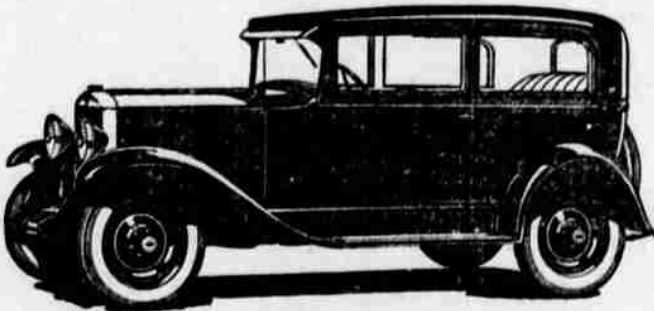
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
