Stons," arising from the prohibition laws.

Wants Unhindered Study

Simultaneous with the publication of the commission's statement came an expression from Senator LaFollette of Wisconsin, a member of the independent republican faction, that the crime study group be allowed to conduct its survey unhindered by outside influence or discussion.

"The violent outcry over the enforcement of prohibition and the too free criticism and abuse of law enforcement," he said, "are not conducive to the careful, patient, scientific research which the country has a right to expect and demand of that tribunal. That a deliberate effort is being made to hamstring the commission and discredit its work is the only fair conclusion to be drawn from the untimely, bitter attacks now being made upon it in advance of its report."

Make Exhaustive Study

The law enforcement commission's statement went into great detail in describing its activities and its organization work, declaring that the purpose had been to conduct a "searching examination of criminal law enforcement, including prohibition."

The organization of its work, the statement said, "naturally falls into the conduct of police, prosecution, courts and judicial procedure, the management of penal institutions and the causes of crime; the object of all of which is to determine positive measures of reform which will secure more prompt and effective justice." It explained that eleven committees had been appointed to deal with various subjects.

Better Policing Urged

Necessity of a study of police organization has emphasized, and the statement outlined the commission's efforts in that direction.

Under separate headings the commission repeated what it had been doing in the way of research work in the field of prosecutions, the courts, penal institutions, causes of crime, criminal justice as it affected the foreign born, the cost of crime, abuse in enforcement, and statistics.

used to linger by the Oregon way-side today and refused to make his abode in other sections of the country more accustomed to his vagaries.

Although tempered by the sun, Portland's weather was invigorating, at least, with the mercury hovering consistently about the 25 degree above mark. Early today it went into a tailspin and reached 20 degrees above.

Edward L. Wells, government meteorologist at Portland, scanned his gimbals, gagegaws and gadgets for some signs of a let-up, but issued a prediction that the winter weather would continue for the most part of Oregon.

Mercury dropped to 3 degrees below zero at Medford, Ore., setting the coldest mark in eleven years in the city. Outlying districts reported from five to eight below.

A new low was established at La Grande, Ore., today when the mercury stopped at 7 above. A bitter wind whipped the city throughout the night and a fine snow was sifting down upon the city today. The mercury, however, was going upward.

Coldest Since 1924.

The coldest weather since December, 1924, was recorded at Eugene when the mercury slumped to 10 above. The sky was overcast and the north wind was biting. Wendling, Ore., reported 2 above with the mill pond frozen over.

The government thermometer recorded four degrees above at The Dalles last night. It was the coldest this winter. Roads are slick but only four accidents were reported.

Two Below at G. P.

Grants Pass' weather report smacked of the frigid, saying the mercury dropped to two below.

Another fraction of an inch of snow fell in Baker, Ore., during the night. The weather was warmer today with a minimum of four above.

Two degrees below zero made Pendleton shiver during the night. Fifteen above was the highest Friday. A little snow fell during the night.

the best producers may, in that manner, be culled from the herd and only the best producers kept. The tester is also qualified and will be able to give technical information to the dairymen relative to feeding and care of cattle and furnish housing plans.

Throughout the most noted dairy producing sections cow testing associations have been formed and many testimonials have been given relative to the value of the associations to the dairymen.

County Agent Henderson considers the forming of the cow testing association in Klamath county as one of the most advanced steps taken by the dairymen here.

Within the last year two farmer-owned dairy co-operative manufacturing and marketing associations have been formed and a third has shown rapid strides in its business in the last year.

Addressed to Lloyd George. The "British document" was addressed to David Lloyd George, then premier of Great Britain, and was dated from the British consul's office in New York City.

It purported to show the operations of a vast British spy system in America in a view to "the reconquest of America."

Dr. Maloney said that Irish societies were the main purchasers of the pamphlet.

"With the end of the fight on the league of nations, the purpose of the paper died," he said.
