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SCOUT HEADS
HOLD MEETING

Lamm Re-Elected Head of Council for 1930; Reports Given

The annual meeting of the Boy Scout executive council was held last night at the chamber of commerce when the officers who served during the past year were re-elected, including W. E. Lamm, president; Jack Kimball, vice-president; and J. A. Gordon, treasurer.

At the beginning of the evening's program, Lamm explained the activities of the council and sketched briefly what had been done at summer camp after securing a plot of ground from the forest service. He explained the terms of the lease which the council has with the service and suggested that clubs and individuals be allowed to donate sleeping cabins of patrol size for the camp. Such cabins would provide space for eight boys—the number making up a patrol.

14 Active Troops
It was pointed out that at present there are 14 active troops in the county and four more in the process of formation. It is expected there will be 20 troops completely organized by summer.

A report on the condition of the troops in the Klamath area was made by Oscar Hoover, scout executive. Lee Bean reported for Troop 16 of the Odd Fellows lodge, George Walton for Troop 10, and Leon Crawford for the troop sponsored by the American Legion.

Officers Report

A report on the court of honor was made by R. C. Groesbeck who expressed the feeling that the department is in fine shape in the report from the treasurer, J. A. Gordon said that practically all major expenses for summer camp have been met. A publicity report was given by Fred Fleet and a report on the condition of city troops was made by Commissioner Percy Murray.

He was so impressed by Arthur's work that he called on him in his dressing-room after the performance and offered him the title role in "Kippa," as H. G. Wells story.

Charlie Chaplin saw "Kippa" on its release and recognized new talent. He advised Arthur to come to America and under Chaplin's influence the young actor received work immediately in "Madness of Youth," a Fox picture with John Gilbert.

Today's Markets

PORTLAND, Jan. 11. (AP)—Egg and butter prices were still weak today, but no changes were announced.

Reviewing the fruit and vegetable situation, the Portland bureau of the United States department of agriculture says:

"Local supplies of bunched root vegetables are entirely depleted on the wholesale market. Storage supplies of sacked vegetables are liberal though, and are still cheap, although with slight price advances. Carrots are especially plentiful with supplies adequate for Portland's consumption for several weeks. Much of the field supplies of these crops will be ruined, as snowfall was generally inadequate for protection against the present cold weather."

"Fancy California carrots, in crates of 5 dozen bunches each, moved readily at \$5.50 per crate to retailers."

"Potato movement to jobbers, and to retailers, is much more active this week. The local potato market is firm, and sales to jobbers are a shade higher."

"After several days of unusual activity on the wholesale fruit and vegetable market, trading was very light, being confined to retailers' actual necessities, on account of the cold weather, rendering motor-truck haulings subject to freezing."
