## Student Has Narrow Escape

Many accidents of the cold weather have been reported but one of the narrowest escapes was that of Eugene Bailey, high school student, who recently skied to a friend's house on the upper Klamath Lake, about 4 miles distant. On the return, about 10 o'clock that evening the boy was crossing the ice alone on skates when the ice cracked and he fell in. The ice kept breaking around him but he was able to get out, and after removing his skates he ran more than a mile to his home, still cold and wet but none the worse for his experience.

## Boy Has Foot Frozen

Two transient youths arrived in Klamath Falls yesterday, after riding a blind from Eugene here, on the rear of a passenger train. The two youths were about 16 or 17 years of age, one from San Francisco and the other from Detroit. One of the boys had his foot badly frozen and was under a doctor's care for several hours yesterday.

## Park Pigeons Frozen

Five pigeons, which came to the Crater Lake lodge last November and made their home under the eaves, are dead as the result of the freezing weather according to Rudolph Lucke, the lodge caretaker there. They could not withstand the rigors of the cold.

## HIGHWAY WORK BIG THIS YEAR

Contracts totaling more than \$1,250,000 to be let soon.

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 14, (AP)—Contracts to be let by the state highway commission at its meeting in Portland next Thursday will represent a larger expenditure of money than any other batch of contracts in seven or eight years, according to Roy A. Klein, state highway engineer. It is estimated that the contracts to be let will total around \$1,250,000. No other group of contracts has totaled as high since the state was letting paving jobs under the highway bond program.

## Rogue Bridge Included

Included in the list will be a contract for the construction of the bridge over Rogue river at Gold Beach on the Roosevelt coast highway.

Other bids received will cover 27.1 miles of broken stone resurfacing on the Jenny Creek-Keno section of the Green Springs highway in Jackson and Klamath counties; 21 miles of resurfacing on the Nimrod-Belknap springs section of the McKenzie highway in Lane county; construction of a ferry slip and one mile of embankment on the Yaquina Bay-South Beach section of the Roosevelt highway in Lincoln county; 3.9 miles of concrete paving on the Multnomah County Line-Beaverton section of the Tualatin highway in Multnomah county; 10 miles of construction in two units on the Barnhouse Ranch-Picture Gorge section of the Ochoco highway in Wheeler and Grant counties; a bridge over Beaver Creek on the Columbia River highway about 6 1/4 miles west of Rainier.

## SAW CAUSES BLAST

STRAVEN, Ala., Jan. 14, (AP)—Sparks from a miners saw were believed today to have caused an explosion which yesterday claimed six lives in the Peerless-Canaba Coal company's mine near here. The blast occurred about 1,000 feet below the mine entrance.

A seventh man trapped by the explosion made his way to the mine opening. He was in a serious condition today.

## GENEVA LEAGUE TO CONFORM TO KELLOGG PACT

Outlawing War First in Minds of Member Countries.

GENEVA, Jan. 14 (AP)—A report recommending a committee to draft changes in the covenant of the league of nations to bring it into harmony with the Kellogg pact outlawing war was adopted by the council of the league today.

In carrying out the previous directions of the league assembly with regard to closing any gaps in the league's covenant whereby war may be admitted as a possibility, the British, French, German and Italian representatives on the council announced their undisturbed confidence in the league and said that the proposal to amend the covenant indicated no loss of faith in it.

Arthur Henderson, British foreign secretary, said:

"Would Remove War Right  
"We want to make these changes which are necessary to take out of the covenant the right of war. We have not lost faith in the covenant. We regard the covenant as the fundamental constitution of an organized international society of states. It is just because we regard the covenant as a fundamental constitution that we want it to be up to date and complete.

"And least of all do we think that the pact of Paris or any treaty can make the league less necessary or less important. On the contrary, as loyal members of the league, we regard the league with its assembly, its council, its secretariat and other organs as an indispensable instrument for the development of international co-operation and the maintenance of world peace. \* \* \* It will justment and adaptation, but as it is, it is incomparably the most effective instrument the world has ever had for the maintenance of peace and the settlement of conflicts.

"The British government is determined to exert all its influence to maintain as between league members its right, obligations and its machinery unimpaired, to supplement them and strengthen them where necessary and never to weaken them."
