Give Reasons of Dairy Products Market Slump

The present disastrous slump in dairy products markets has resulted from a combination of overproduction and reduced consumption coupled with increased production of better substitutes, according to the current dairy situation report issued by the Oregon extension service.

Production of creamery butter for the first 11 months of 1929 exceeded that of the same period in 1928 by some 25 million pounds. Consumption decreased by 29 million pounds, while consumption of butter substitutes mounted by a similar amount. The federal outlook report a year ago said that a national increase of 1 percent in dairy production would reach the limit of present domestic consumption.

Consumers can help the situation by taking advantage of the abnormally low prices to increase their use of wholesale dairy products, says P. M. Brandt, head of the dairy department at Oregon State college.

RURAL ROUTE ESTABLISHED

Postal Patrons South Of City Limits Get New Service.

In order to serve the postal patrons that are now being served by the Klamath Falls-Main stage and the Lakeview stage, a new rural route to be known as R. F. D. No. 2 will be established in Klamath Falls, effective February 1st, when the service will begin, was the announcement made this morning by Postmaster John A. McCall.

Patrons from the South Sixth street city limits, south to the junction of the Merrill and Lakeview highway, south again to a point one half mile south of Mack's store, then to the Warner corner, Van Emon's residence, then south past J. R. Elliott's residence, then west across Stukel bridge, back to Klamath Falls over what is known as the Hill road to Pine Grove, then from that point back and up through Piedmont heights, serving that new district, then back to Klamath Falls, coming in by Shasta Way, will be served by this new rural route.

Must Change Address
Addresses of all people now receiving mail by Lakeview and Klamath Falls-Main stages will have to change their official address to R. F. D. No. 2 and are asked to notify their correspondents of this change as soon as possible, since the change will be effective February 1. A box number will be assigned to them by the R. F. D. carrier.

Boxes should be located on the right hand side of the highway as traveled by the carrier. Anyone putting up a new box should keep this in mind.

Postage Service Added
One advantage well worth while on the rural route, Mr. McCall stated, is that the patrons will be able to mail parcels, secure stamps or special delivery privileges, directly from the rural carrier.

Regulations Cited
A few of the regulations that should be remembered follow: No receptacles of any kind, or for any purpose, shall be attached to the posts or other supports upon which a post of this box is erected.

The display of advertising matter on rural mail boxes is strictly forbidden.

The use of locks on boxes is not necessary, but is suggested as a matter of precaution. Each box must be equipped with some sort of a signal in order that the carrier will know there is mail for collection.

Other regulations should be obtained from the postmaster before this service goes into effect.
