Los Angeles Has Parrot Fever Cases Authorities Think

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LOS ANGELES, Jan. 16, (AP)—Declaring one man has died and two women are seriously ill here from a disease believed to be Parrot fever, or parrot fever, Dr. J. L. Pomeroy, head of the Los Angeles county health department, today reiterated a warning that all recently purchased parrots must be quarantined.

MAN AND PARROT DIE
The death last week of B. O. Johnson, at first ascribed to pneumonia, now is believed to have been caused by parrot fever, Dr. Pomeroy said.

A parrot brought home by Johnson's son from Rio de Janeiro on December 1, died a few days before Johnson became ill. Mrs. Johnson now is ill, apparently with the same disease.

Woman Has Fever
Mrs. A. H. Stewart, who was taken to a Santa Monica, Calif., hospital a few days after her recently purchased parrot had died, now is believed to be afflicted with parrot fever, the symptoms of which are similar to those in pneumonia.

Dr. Pomeroy said the cases are being studied by State bacteriologist Wilfred Kellogg of Berkeley. Little is known about the malady or its bacteria on the west coast, he said.

Drinking Wine in School Leads to Youth's Suicide
CORINTH, N. Y., Jan. 16, (AP)—Suspended from high school for drinking home-made wine in the school building, Eugene Clothier, 14 years old, committed suicide last night.

Principal Herbert A. Beekman of the Corinth high school said he found young Clothier and another boy drinking the wine in the cloak room yesterday, and suspended Clothier when investigation disclosed he had brought the wine to school.

Clothier was found in bed at his home this morning, with a bullet wound in his chest.

Grain Corporation To Purchase Wheat

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CHICAGO, Jan. 16, (AP)—William G. Kellogg, general manager of the Farmers National Grain corporation, today confirmed reports that the farmers' union has been authorized to purchase wheat at Duluth for the account of the corporation.

The purchases are No. 1 dark northern at \$1.25, two other grades at \$1.22, No. 1 durum at \$1.12, and No. 2 durum at \$1.10.

Fractured Knee May Cause Death

EUGENE, Ore., Jan. 16, (AP)—The condition of H. C. Oakes of Junction City, who is in a hospital here suffering a compound fracture of the right knee, caused by a bullet from a rifle supposedly in the hands of his brother, was reported "very grave" today.

Oakes is also suffering from pneumonia and exposure. Oakes and other hunters went to Elmira, A. rifle exploded, and Oakes received the bullet in his knee. It was not determined whose rifle was fired.
