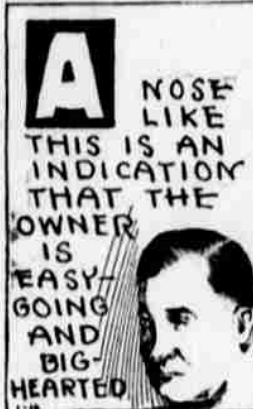


NEWS IN BRIEF

With a plan to try to get more than \$4,000,000 from the federal government, C. R. Williams, a commissioner of Klamath county, is headed for Washington, D. C. The county court has an idea that the government may make the appropriation in lieu of taxes which the county might have received in the past ten years had the Klamath Indian reservation lands been on the tax roll. The precedent, Klamath county figures, was established in the Oregon & California grant land matter. Mr. Williams is armed with a formidable array of statistics and the best wishes of his fellow members of the county court. There are several other counties in Oregon wherein are located Indian reservations and there are a number of states similarly situated, but Klamath county is not, at this time seeking to consolidate with other counties and states, but intends playing a lone hand.—Oregonian.
