Feeding Problem Discussed

The problem of feeding sheep is receiving attention of the wool growers of central Oregon. George M. Blakely of Redmond, who is in the city for a few days, says that carloads of corn have been shipped in for feed purposes and that this corn is distributed by trucks as far from Redmond as Lake county, while the corn is sent into Klamath, Grant and other sections where there are sheep. While the corn is about twice the cost of hay, Mr. Blakely considers that, in the long run, it is cheaper as not so much is required and the results are better. There is a shortage of hay and prices are high. One advantage of corn is that it can be scattered and little is lost. Even better than corn, contends this sheepman, are the cottonseed cakes. Mr. Blakely says that sheep men are going into new regions where water has to be carried to the stock. This was tried with success last year and while it is a costly operation to buy trucks and tanks and transport the water, the results have been more than satisfactory, as the lambs are heavier. But, looking at the sheep business from any angle, Mr. Blakely says the prospects for the sheepmen are not encouraging.—Oregonian.
