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ICE COVERED
RAILS CAUSE
TRAIN WRECKOre-Laden Train Leaves
Track, Causing Death
To Two Trainmen.

WALLACE, Idaho, Jan. 17 (A P)—Ice-covered rails today were believed to have caused the wreck of an ore-laden Northern Pacific freighter at Lookout, east of here yesterday, killing two men and injuring a third.

Two Trainmen Die
Louis E. Erickson, 45, a brakeman who was pinned under the engine until today, was killed outright; Charles E. Campbell, 50, the engineer, was crushed and burned so badly that he died en route to a hospital and C. A. Ewart, 38, the fireman, was only slightly injured. All three men resided in Missoula, Mont.

The wreck occurred on a horse shoe curve of a four per cent grade while the train was going down hill ahead of 22 freight cars loaded with ore for an East Helena smelter. The engine dived into a snow bank, pinning the men under it. Campbell and Ewart extricated themselves, but Erickson was pinned.

Got Beyond Control
Members of the crew said the train got beyond control and was hurtling down the grade. The engine and first two cars broke from the rest of the train, speeding on ahead of the loaded cars and hurled clear of the track on the sharp curve. The rest of the train rolled on past, stopping at an incline two miles further on. The caboose was cut loose from the train and stopped 1,000 feet past the wreckage.

A relief train sent from Wallace to bring the injured to a hospital crashed into a delivery truck on a crossing here, demolishing it. The driver escaped unhurt.

As Army Air Fleet Prepared
For Icy 3500-Mile Tour

These pictures show scenes as a score of the army's crack pilots prepared to take off from Selfridge Field, Mich., for a winter test flight along a 3500-mile "hurry front," extending from Detroit to Spokane, Wash., and return. Maintaining constant radio communication with Washington, the pilots were to "attack" cities en route, while studying flying conditions amid zero weather. One of the fast pursuit planes, equipped with skiis, is pictured above. At the right you see Lieutenant N. D. Sillis wearing a fur-lined leather suit. Major Ralph Royce, flight commander, is shown at the left below, and directly above him is Sergeant K. E. Wilson, wearing radio earphones inside his fur-lined helmet. Eighteen pursuit ships and three transports were to make the flight.

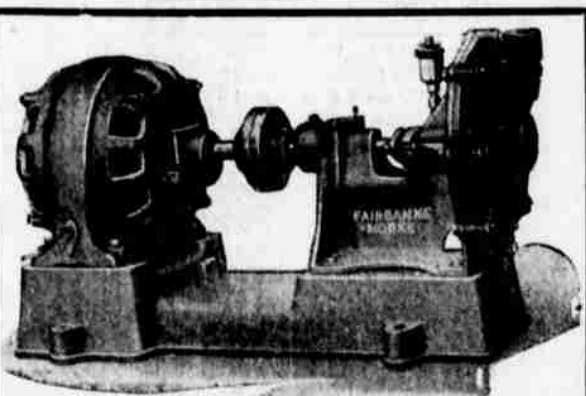
The total loss was \$3,500, money and jewelry. The profits went to four marked robbers who held up nearly a score of crap shooters, men and women, and took everything in sight.

The guns used by the bandits were equipped with silencers. Police had difficulty in finding persons who would admit having been robbed. The "tip-off" of the robbery was phoned to police headquarters anonymously.

The robbery was in a room being used for a furniture display. The victims whose names police finally obtained were from many parts of the country. Several denied they had been gambling, but told of being robbed. Lester M. Kusworm of Dayton, Ohio, and Sidney P. Frank, New Orleans, reported losses of approximately \$1000 each.

PESCARA, Italy, Jan. 17, (A P)—Gabriele D'Annunzio, war-rrior-poet and playwright, whose works were sweepingly condemned by the papal authorities and put on the index prohibitorum two years ago, has just donated 100,000 lire (more than \$5,000) to the rector of the church of San Cetto here, soon to be enlarged and embellished, for the erection of a votive chapel dedicated to the memory of his mother.
