## PELKEY'S POOR SHOWING MARS SNAPPY CARD

### Oaklander Loses Match In Fourth for Too Much Holding.

Klamath fight fans are still convinced that Willie Feldman is the best man of his weight ever to show here. This is not based on his showing made last night so much as the fact that Ray Pelkey failed to show any symptoms of a real fighter.

Pelkey has a wallop, all right, but he had so little chance to use it in the brief time the fight lasted that Willie and the crowd know little of the danger of it. Pelkey, if he can fight, certainly showed no desire to loosen up last night. Assuming a crouching pose as he left his corner, he maintained that attitude throughout the three and a half rounds, taking severe pummeling of the face rather than to expose his rather lean middle to the blows Willie constantly rained upon him. He continually went into a clinch and this practice cost him what chance he had to win the fight and caused rank disappointment among the fans. Instead of standing up and making a fight of it, he chose to hold Feldman with his left and pound him on the back and neck with his right. Referee Dick Reed endeavored to stop the practice in a gentlemanly way but Pelkey ignored the commands. Dick should have showed his authority in a more determined manner and the fight would have gone farther.

**Feldman Willing**  
Feldman showed the same inclination to mix last night that has made him the favorite of the fans here, but with Pelkey's style there was little chance to get a real fight. Even after the referee raised his hand in token of victory, Willie showed an eagerness to attack Pelkey and make him come in and fight. Feldman wanted that fight to take with him as an introduction to the fans in the south and it was a keen disappointment to him not to win in the regular way. Willie is still strong with the fans here, but Pelkey will never have another chance in the local arena.

**Other Bouts High Class**  
From the semi-windup to the curtain raiser, the rest of the show was the best up on here this season. Austin Kosander showed decided improvement over his last engagement here and was awarded a well-earned decision over Billy Church, in the semi-windup. Austin takes less punishment now than formerly and can hit! The crafty Billy was put to the test in defensive to save himself from hitting the canvas.

The special six-round event between Ted Mike and Eddie Edelman was one of the best exhibitions of clever boxing seen here in many a moon. Mike is a little faster than Eddie and uses both hands to better advantage. His victory was clean and the decision pleased the crowd.

**Steamboat Does "Stuff"**  
Steamboat Jackson made a warm place for himself in the hearts of Klamath fans last night and won a decision over Ted "Kid" Evans that fully satisfied everybody. Never before in ring history here has such a first round been seen. Evans attacked the veteran battler with a rush that looked like the fight might not last long, but that kind of punishment is what "Rowboat" trains on and as soon as Evans laid down his barrage Jackson got into action. Jackson has added some weight and is in the "pink." He trains faithfully and is always ready for a hard fight. Evans has not been here long enough to get his wind properly and when he does, if he should be matched with Steamboat again, Tex will have to give these boys a big black type position on the window card. The fans will just naturally demand it.

The scheduled Dyson-Wright match was called off for the simple reason that Harold Wright got married Thursday evening and failed to put in an appearance. If there was any disappointment on the part of fans it soon disappeared when Danny Bass and Slim Russell, who substituted for the match, got into action. It was fought from the word go with these two boys and everybody was pleased when the referee called it a draw.

With four such red hot fights preceding the main event, it is little wonder the crowd has no patience with the tactics of Pelkey, who evidently has little concern about the boys who furnish the coin he's fighting for. Pelkey is scheduled to fight Gene O'Grady at Medford January 23 and many Klamath fans are going over to urge Gene to knock the Oaklander out of the ring.

Sammy Gordon and Ted Mike are scheduled to box a special event at the Medford card. Old-timers around here have considered Sammy in the once-was class but it is said he still has action, punch and words of confidence. A well filled house greeted the fighters last night and interest ran high until the farcical main event got under way.

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## DEMPEY FINDS PROMOTING NOT SO PROFITABLE

### Losses to Date Amount To \$40,000. Lomski Feels Bad, Too.

CHICAGO, Jan. 18 (AP)—Promoter Jack Dempsey and Leo Lomski, Aberdeen, Wash., light-heavyweight, today were almost convinced that the boxing game is something to stay out of.

The former world heavyweight champion's sorrow was caused by the fact that only 5,432 spectators who paid \$15,939, went to the Coliseum to see Lomski and James J. Braddock, the Jersey City puncher, fight.

**Lomski Disappointed.**  
Lomski will never believe he didn't get better than a draw with Braddock, and from their actions when the standoff decision was announced, most of the witnesses agree with the westerner.

Although knocked down twice by Braddock's right hand jolts, Lomski, in the opinion of ringside experts, took seven of the 10 rounds, and deserved the decision. The referee and judges produced all the variety of opinion possible, the former, Davy Miller, calling it a draw, one judge voting for Lomski, and the other casting his ballot for Braddock.

**Weather Kept Crowd Away.**  
Dempsey, thwarted by sub-zero weather that kept the fans at home listening to the radio account of the fight, was reported to have lost about \$11,000 on the venture, bringing his total deficit since he started offering boxing entertainment in Chicago last October, to approximately \$40,000.

SEATTLE, Jan. 18 (AP)—The University of Washington basketball team, touted as the favorite in the Pacific coast conference race, was defeated 34 to 24 by Oregon State college here last night. NEW YORK, Jan. 18, (AP)—Jack (Kid) Berg, the human perpetual motion machine from England, today occupied a strategic position from which to fire a challenge at the king of all the lightweights, Sammy Mandell of Rockford, Ill.

Berg gained the finest triumph of his American invasion in Madison Square Garden last night when he gave Tony Canzoneri, former featherweight champion, a terrific beating in a ten round bout fought before 15,500 spectators.

Berg now needs only to turn back Al Singer, Bronx idol, later in the indoor season to win a title "shot" with Mandell in one of the big outdoor shows of the year.

Except for the first and third rounds, Berg gave Canzoneri a thorough trouncing. Carrying the fight to his stocky little rival, the Briton slung leather from every angle, split Tony's lips and cheeks and opened up cuts over both of the little Italian's eyes.
