Historical Map Made by A.A.U.W. Is Work of Art

A new historical map of Oregon has been published by the Portland chapter of the American Association of University Women, and has been placed on sale. Material for the map was gathered, and the map drawn and printed under the supervision of a small committee of Portland women who are members of the organization, and was completed in about a year's time.

Oregon members of the association are attempting to raise \$40,000 to support one independent fellowship. The name of Margaret Snell, one of the pioneer educators of the Northwest, who founded the first school of home economics west of the Rocky mountains, at Oregon State college, has been given to this fund.

The map is 17 by 21 inches in size. Its coloring is brown and red, and it is printed on tan cover paper. It is sold rolled, and is suitable for framing, for fire screens and for school use. Miss Doris Wildman, Portland artist, did the sketching on the map. Zinc etchings were made in Portland, and the printing was done there also. The map is copyrighted.

The border of the map is a symbolic Indian design. While the principal cities, towns, rivers and other geographic details are incorporated, some of the small lakes, rivers and towns have been omitted to make room for the historical illustrations which point out the places of historical interest in the state.

Three ships show the early explorations on the coast; wagons on the trails represent the ingress of pioneers. The Indian wars are properly represented, and the discovery of gold is pictured. The trails of the early settlers are shown.

The motto, "Alis volat Propria," appears in one corner. Its translation is "It flies on its own wings."

Money from the sale of the map, which is correct in all historical details, will be used by the association to supply its portion of the \$100,000 international scholarship fund which the American Association of University Women is raising. The fund will supply fellowships for women who have their masters' and doctors' degrees and wish to do original research work toward some definite contribution to knowledge.
