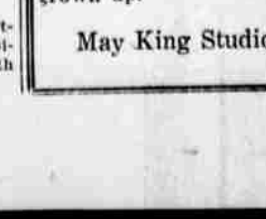

CITY TO JOIN LEAGUE OF ALL OREGON CITIES

Order Ordinance To License Restaurants; Unable To Move Snow on Streets; Committee To Meet

No Building Permits
For the first time in many months no building permits were presented to the city council last night to be approved.

Letters From Kelley
A letter was referred to the finance committee from C. C. Kelley, city engineer, requesting a membership in the American Society for Testing Materials, to enable the engineer's office to keep informed on the latest specifications and methods for testing all materials used in city work. It was explained that membership costs \$30 a year if taken out in the name of the city, but only \$15 a year if it is in the name of an employe.

Oil Company Protests
Through H. C. Merryman, attorney, the Shell Oil company presented the council with a written protest against the awarding of the gas and oil bid to the Modoc Gas and Oil company, stating that in all instances the prices quoted by the Modoc company were higher than in the bid presented by the Shell company. The protest was referred to the finance committee, which stated that the city would re-advertise for gas and oil bids.

Taxis Request Licenses
Applications for permits for right to take on, discharge and wait for passengers at 610 Main street, at a stand owned by B. B. Fenwick, and at 531 Main street at stand of Eva Hogue, were referred to the police committee.

Refer Applications
A number of rooming house and other permit applications were referred to the police committee for investigation.

Dispose of Boxing Fund
A recommendation of the finance committee that 40 per cent of the \$900 received by the city from the Klamath Falls boxing commission be turned over to the ex-service men's organizations here was accepted. The money will be divided according to paid-up membership in the organizations.

It was recalled by Mayor T. B. Watters that several years ago when the American Legion took over the boxing game here, the organization paid off a \$500 debt, and that since the Legion has handled it, all officers of the commission have served without salaries. The council accepted a recommendation as made by the mayor that the other 40 per cent be returned to the Legion.

City to Join League
After a recommendation from the finance committee, the mayor was authorized to sign a contract to make Klamath Falls a member of the League of Oregon Cities, which is seeking to have more funds appropriated from the state for highways through cities.

Preliminary Money In
Preliminary money to the amount of \$225 was turned over by Councilman Oids on the proposed Klamath avenue lighting system. The city engineer's office has already been authorized to draw up plans and specifications.

Resolution Agreement
Upon the suggestion of Councilman Oids, members of the council reached an agreement to pass no resolutions originating outside of the council without first referring them to a committee for investigation. As Oids explained, many resolutions pop up suddenly and are passed before they are given any consideration. No particular resolutions of the past were mentioned.
