Romance, drama, thrills—a girl of high society caught in the coils of the underworld—that, briefly, is "The Racketeer," Pathé's all-dialogue production, starring Robert Armstrong, which comes to the Pelican theatre today. Carol Lombard is featured. The story of "The Racketeer" deals with a society girl, Rhoda Philbrook, who, through an ill-fated romance with a musician, falls outside of the pale. She encounters Mahlon Keene, a carpenter of the underworld, who helps her and her sweetheart, and then falls madly in love with the girl himself. The machinations of fate that bring the affairs of this triangle to a dramatic and thrilling conclusion. Most of its action takes place amid the luxury of Park Avenue and rich Long Island estates. The backgrounds are most lavish and many of the characters are of the upper strata of society. Yet throughout the action, the sinister influence of the underworld is felt. Written by Paul Gangelin and directed by Howard Higgin, this feature is said by preview critics to be the most accurate screen painting to date of that mysterious figure of the underworld who rules vice by a wave of his hand and spends millions with the lavishness of a Midas. "The Racketeer" deals with this imposing character of the underworld side of society, it is not wholly an underworld picture. Most of its action takes

AT THE LIBERTY No picture of recent years has evoked more spontaneous praise from critics than "Drums of Liberty," the epic romance of two brothers in love which D. W. Injury Received In 1919 Leads to Editor's Demise

BALTIMORE, Jan. 21, (AP)—Stanley M. Reynolds, 45, associate editor of the Baltimore Sun, died yesterday at his home here. He had been ill since 1919 when he was injured in an automobile accident on the Columbia highway in Oregon, while accompanying the presidential tour of Woodrow Wilson. The automobile carrying a number of newspaper correspondents overturned, killing the driver and Ben Allen of the Cleveland Plain Dealer. The late Robert T. F. Allen, then of the Associated Press, and Reynolds were critics.

Arabs Engage in War on Italians

TRIPOLI, Jan. 21, (AP)—Troops of the Duke Della Pagine engaged in battle yesterday with Arab tribesmen outside Murzuk. The Arabs fled after a spirited engagement, leaving 50 dead and 24 wounded. Survey Extension For S.P. Into Lake County Timber

ALTURAS, Calif., Jan. 20.—Surveys for an extension of the Southern Pacific line running from here to Lakeview, Ore., to the Danbury tract of timber north of the latter place is now being made. The tapping of this tract of timber, part of the immense body of western yellow pine located in the Lakeview territory, will add an immense tonnage to the Southern Pacific line in this section. A permit granted to the old Nevada, California and Oregon, predecessors of the Southern Pacific, about six years ago for an extension of its line to Warner canyon will undoubtedly be the authority for the road to make the extension now under consideration. Lake county contains many billions of feet of merchantable timber, the bulk of which is western yellow pine, easily accessible. So far this immense body of timber has not been touched by railroads. It is estimated that at least four

and a quarter billion feet of this timber is directly tributary to the city of Lakeview.
