

# KING GEORGE GIVES PLEDGE

## England To Cooperate In Efforts To Reach Agreement.

(Continued From Page One)

MacDonald took the chair vacated by the monarch and immediately upon his designation as chairman began his own address, urging in an eloquent speech the necessity for heightening the spirit of confidence among peoples and thus paving the way for an agreement to halt competition in naval construction.

"The whole world," he said, "expects that we shall deliberate and negotiate on the assumption that having put our names to peace of peace we mean to respect our signature."

The British prime minister gave President Hoover credit for inviting the present conference. "After several attempts had been made unsuccessfully to get such an understanding between the United States and ourselves as would make a wide international agreement possible," he said, "President Hoover through his newly appointed ambassador to London, proposed to me that we should explore our differences once more."

### Limitations Continuous Process

Colonel Stimson addressed the assemblage when Mr. MacDonald had concluded his speech, remarking that the present effort at naval limitation was not to be regarded as final by any means. "Naval limitation is a continuous process," he said, "we regard disarmament as a goal to be reached by successive steps, by frequent revision and improvement. A solution reached today, however perfect, may not respond to conditions at a later date."

### American Aid Pledged

Colonel Stimson pledged the cooperation of America to further endeavor in behalf of disarmament, both land, naval, and in the air. "Our efforts to contribute to the success of endeavors in other fields will continue unabated," he said. Other delegations followed in alphabetical order, the Canadian, Colonel J. L. Ralston, coming next, to be followed in turn by Andrew Tardieu, French premier.

### Weather Drab

The conference has as drab a weather setting as London possibly could provide. A dense fog—some said the heaviest of the year—permeated even the inside of buildings and on the outside was so thick traffic was retarded and in some localities almost tied up.

### Delegations were late in arriving at historic Westminster Palace where the opening session was held. Once there, however, they spent only minutes warming their hands before a large open fireplace and hurried to the conference room so as to be in place when his majesty arrived.

### Haney Goes East To Represent Poe-Malin Rail Route

Bert E. Haney left for Washington, D. C. today on a special mission for the Joint Railroad Committee of Klamath county. Mr. Haney will go before the Interstate Commerce Commission in the matter of the location of the proposed Great Northern extension to California and endeavor to get the line from Klamath Falls to the state line established through the Poe Valley and Malin.

### Three routes are on the Great Northern's map and it is the hope of the Joint Railroad Committee to get the location settled in conjunction with the Interstate Commerce Commission's order, if such is the outcome of the recent hearing at San Francisco.

### Klamath Falls merchants have come to the assistance of the joint committee, subscribing over \$800 to the fund necessary to carry the fight through. It is the viewpoint of many that if the Great Northern is allowed to build its extension that part of the line running from Klamath Falls to the state line should serve a district not already enjoying rail service.

### Mr. Haney will also take up the matter of the proposed power plant considered by the Irrigation District, which they hope to build on the McCormack site on the Klamath river near Keno.

### A. M. Thomas will accompany Mr. Haney to Washington, D. C. in the interests of the Klamath Irrigation District.

speech the president and his companions went to an enclosed court for the regular early morning medicine ball game. While the president was listening to the broadcast Acting Secretary of the Navy Jahneke and two admirals were in a room at the Mayflower hotel listening to the conference.

### SOUND PICTURES TAKEN

The reception at the Jahneke party was so clear that sound

### motion pictures of the group were taken.

"In just a few minutes now the naval conference will be formally opened in London," said Jahneke before the broadcast began. "This conference has been characterized by President Hoover as the most important in a great many years, and probably the most important for many years to come. He has also said that the progress of peace for the world rests in a great measure upon the shoulders of the five delegations."

### Hope for Success.

"As the navy is heavily represented in this American delegation, we representatives of the navy here in the United States, in common with all the people of this country, naturally want to see this conference succeed. We know that, as the president has said, there is the will to succeed on the part of the five participating nations."

"So it seems to me that despite the early hour it would be interesting for those of us from the navy to listen directly to the king of England as he opens the first plenary session of this conference upon which our commander-in-chief places so much hope for the future benefit of mankind. That is why I ask you to join me in listening to the king's address as it comes over the radio."

## Would Leave Land With Government For Time Being

At a meeting held at the chamber of commerce Saturday, when the committee appointed to study the public land policy as outlined by President Hoover met and discussed the situation and gave arguments pro and con, a resolution was passed to leave the lands to the government as they are at the present time.

### State Interested.

A suggestion made recently by President Hoover whereby the otherwise unappropriated public lands be returned to the state, for surface right only, the mineral and other rights being retained by the government, is meeting with state-wide interest, and meetings are being held throughout the state to discuss the problem and vote on it.

### Governor Calls Meeting.

A letter from Governor Norblad to R. C. Groesbeck, president of the Klamath county chamber of commerce, asks him to be present at a meeting to be held in Portland on Thursday, January 24, to discuss the public lands question and the disposal of public lands in the state of Oregon. The meeting will be composed of men over the state interested in the matter, and they will decide whether to be in favor or in opposition to the issue.

### Southern Pacific.

3. That granting the present petition would give 19.9 per cent of the state's area competitive rail service to the Pacific northwest, but increase railroad mileage only .15 per cent and total investment only .13 per cent.

### 4. That the cost of the rail link would be small compared to the many advantages it will give the rail-using public.

### 5. That the link would improve the earning position of a comparatively weak railroad, the Western Pacific, and should not impair the ability of the Southern Pacific, the principal proponent, to perform its service to the public.

### 6. Without the proposed link the Southern Pacific would be forced to double track a portion of its Shasta route by 1935 or 1937.

### 7. That the construction would make large timber areas accessible and benefit California lumber consumers.

### 8. That the new line would stimulate movement of California perishable products into the northwest through removal of certain existing rates and division barriers.

Oral arguments on the case are expected to be heard by the I. C. C. in Washington in April.

### AGED MAN FREEZES HANDS

AMITY, Jan. 21 (AP)—Steve McKinney, 78, is in a critical condition as a result of exposure and is suffering with badly frozen hands. McKinney, who lives alone on the place where he was born and raised, was found Monday evening tangled in a barb wire fence by a brother-in-law, Peter Burton, who noticed the dark object in the fence and investigated. McKinney was unconscious when found, but was later revived and able to state that he had found himself out of matches and was crossing a field to a neighbor's home about three-fourths of a mile away to replenish his supply. In crawling through the fence the heavy barbs caught in his clothing and he was unable to liberate himself.

### SALEM, Ore., Jan. 21, (AP)

Better coasting conditions constituted the only improvement noted in Salem's cold weather situation Tuesday morning. Surface snow melted by the sun Monday froze again before a minimum temperature of 6 degrees below zero during the night and the coasting paths on the hills more glistening ribbons of solid ice over which sleds flew at racing speed.
