FONTAINE TOO GOOD A SPORT TO WIN FIGHT

Canadian Battler Not Willing to Take Nod on Foul.

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 22 (AP)—A fine display of sportsmanship cost Del Fontaine, Winnipeg, his first heavyweight victory over Charley Risko, Tacoma, here last night, when the Canadian battler refused to claim a foul after Risko landed a sharp uppercut to his jaw while the latter was on his knees. Referee Tom Louttit put the decision up to Fontaine who said "no." The final decision was a draw. The incident occurred in the third round. Del opened it by clipping Risko a short right-hand chop to the jaw which sent Risko down for a count of two. He got up but went down again for no count. Fontaine then made a flying leap at Risko, missed and fell to the floor. It was here that Risko, greatly excited, struck the foul blow. Risko came back in the final rounds and nearly took the fight via the knockout route. He put Fontaine on the canvas in the eighth and ninth rounds and finished strong.

Ole Nashlem, Marshfield, after putting up a strong game battle against Dode Berrett, Seattle, in the semi-windup, fell a tenth-round technical knockout victim to the tough Puget Sound south-paw. It was a fight from start to finish, and Ole was indignant when the referee called a halt.

Pete Cerka, Tacoma, knocked out Luke Graham, Vancouver, Wash., in the first round and Al Straub finished Fred Jenkins in the third of the preliminaries.

Harold Clifford, state game warden, was the principal speaker of the evening. He wove his talk about the situation as it now stands between the two states, with California insisting no protected game can be taken over the state line, and Oregon attempting to have the law set aside.

Clifford stated he is now in communication with game commission officials in the neighboring state, and believes the matter can probably be cleared up before the next hunting season.

Other speakers on the program last night were C. A. Henderson, county agricultural agent; A. W. Schaupp, city attorney; Andrew Collier, representative to the state legislature from this district. Nate Oetzel presided as toastmaster at the feed.

Over 200 Klamath sportsmen, their wives and friends, attended the affair, which is an annual event after the close of the duck hunting season. Following the banquet last night, which was served at 6:30, several hours of dancing were enjoyed.

Postal Telegraph Shows Big Growth In Year and Half

The rapid growth of the local as well as the national Postal Telegraph service was told today by Otto Ellis, local manager. The local office opened on the first of October, 1928, and now employs four messenger boys and two motorcycles for use. An additional messenger was added to the staff recently because of the growth of the messenger or errand service.

The last three months of 1929 increased 60 per cent in business over the corresponding three months of 1928, Mr. Ellis stated.

The number of main offices operated by Postal Telegraph increased 7 per cent during the first three months of 1929.

Branch offices increased 21 per cent during the same period.

The installation of tape printers by P. T. at the end of the year showed an increase of 556 per cent.

Money order transfers increased 73 per cent.
