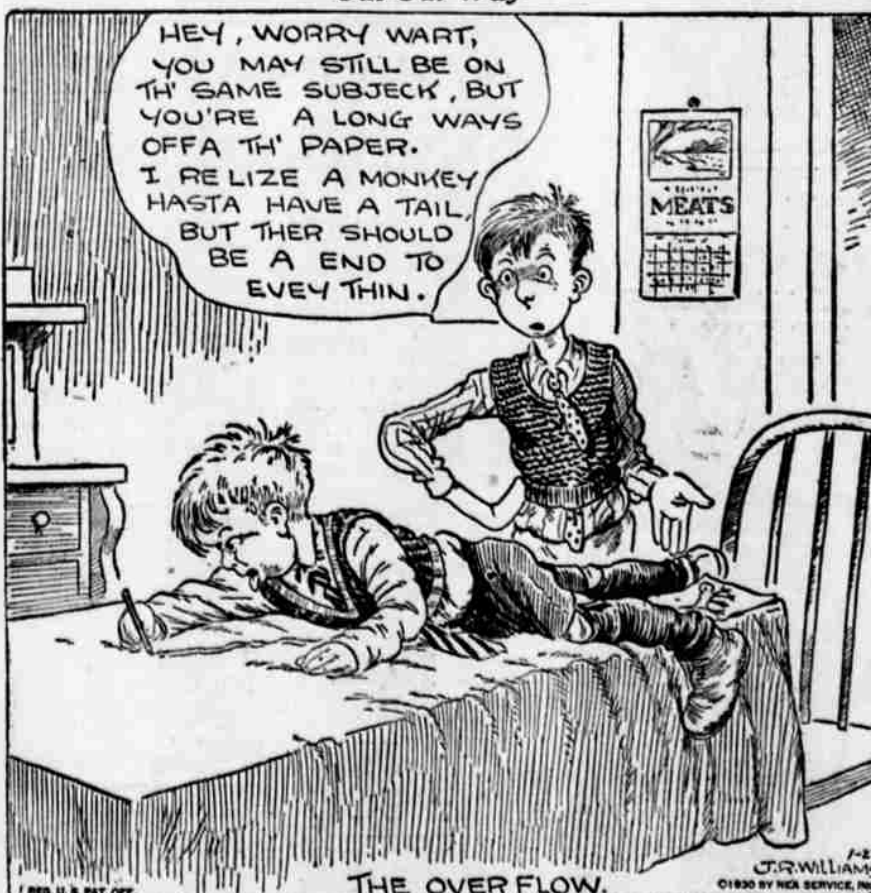

Grass Lake is about 60 miles south of Klamath Falls. It was reported to be 20 degrees below zero there on Monday night.

Today's Markets

PORTLAND, Jan. 22. (AP)—Egg and butter showed no indication of price changes today.

The Sperry Flour company has reduced the price of bakers' hard wheat flour 30¢ a barrel.

Reviewing the fruit and vegetable situation, the Portland bureau of the United States department of agriculture says:

"Trading continues on an unexciting level, on the wholesale fruit and vegetable market. Deliveries on telephoned orders, to retailers, constitute 90 per cent of the trading, as long as the cold weather lasts. There is a good demand for all classes of apples and trading is fairly active, at unchanged prices.

"Carlot arrivals from southern points are liberal; but unloading is slow and uncertain, on account of hazards of chilling in transit, and snowed-in streets and railroad sidings. Track holdings included 52 carlots, including some that were partly unloaded. Sixteen different fruits and vegetables were represented in straight carlot quantities, in addition to some carlot track holdings of mixed vegetables.

"Local storage stocks of onions, although not depleted, are steadily declining, with shipping impossible at Oregon producing districts. About 50 carloads of onions remain in frost-proof storage at Yakima valley points, and a few cars are being loaded there daily."
