

PROHIBITION MAY GO UNDER NEW COMMAND

Mellon Recommends That Justice Department Enforce Law.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22, (AP)—Andrew W. Mellon, who took over the treasury portfolio about the time the dry law was placed upon the statute books, recommended today the transfer of the prohibition bureau from the treasury to the justice department, but flatly refused to be drawn into a discussion on the prohibition question.

Made Every Effort
"I am sure we have made every effort to carry out our responsibility," was his answer to Representative Igoe, republican, Illinois, who had asked if Mellon believed the prohibition bureau had done everything feasible to enforce the law.

"Then you think prohibition can be enforced?" pursued the Illinois member.

Matter of Legislation
"This is a matter of legislation before us," responded the veteran treasury secretary. "Prohibition is a very controversial subject, and I don't see any place now to express personal views."

Mellon testified on the Williamson bill to carry out the phase of the Hoover prohibition enforcement reorganization program to transfer the prohibition bureau to the justice department.

Down to Rejoice
He was accompanied to the committee room by James M. Doan, commissioner of prohibition, who, a current report says, expects to retire from the government service as soon as the transfer is effected. Seymour Lowman, the assistant treasury secretary, specifically charged with dry law enforcement, also was at the hearing.

A good civic man will see in the future a better city, one more beautiful and possessing more comfort and make that vision have influence in his state and community, especially in regard to schools and churches."

"Combined with vision and thinking is another requisite, that of action. Shake off the lethargy, your present conditions and environment, and set forth to realize your vision."

"The last important necessity is team play. Play the game all the time, co-operate with others without attempting to 'star' at the time or to 'grandstand'."

Billingsley Says Alvord Ranch Ideal Playground

Of interest to local people is the following article from the Oregonian.

"If I had several million dollars for development purposes I would buy Alvord ranch, build highways to it from Winemucca and from Burns and advertise the greatest racetrack for automobiles and airplanes in the world," said J. D. Billingsley of Ontario, at the Imperial. "The Alvord desert, if accessible by good highways, would be a great attraction."

"A track 50 miles in length could be used for automobile races. Then there are hunting and fishing in Steens mountains. At Alvord ranch the climate is so mild that peaches can be taken from the trees in October. It could be developed into one of the finest sporting places to be found in America, but it would cost money, and the first investment would have to be in highways."

For many years I lived at Alvord and at White Horse ranch, and I knew every foot of that area from riding herd on the range. When I first went there in the early '80s there was plenty of grass, and the big stock companies made little or no preparation for feeding in winter. The stock always came through fine by spring.

"Later, of course, the herds

increased so that grass became more scarce, although I wouldn't say that the range was overgrazed. In those days it was didn't brand 10,000 calves a year we didn't consider that we had a very good calf crop. And then came the hard winter of 1889, which put a crimp in the big cattle companies and started their decline. There had been little provision made for feed, but one storm came after another until it was impossible for the cattle to survive, and I estimate that a least 50 per cent of the cattle perished. It broke the big companies, for it was a terrific blow."

Senator Billingsley says that when he was at White Horse some of his men discovered a number of caves near Tub springs some half a mile in length. In one of these the men found poles which looked as though they had been in there for a couple of hundred years, and a basket was discovered which was woven of willows and then coated with pitch so that water could be carried. The basket has been on the ground so long that the side that rested on the floor of the cave had rotted away. The Malheur cave, another freak of that region, was entered by the senator in the early '80s, but he did not venture on the lake.

DEATH CALLS WIFE OF LATE WM. J. BRYAN

Widow of "Commoner" To Be Buried Beside Famous Husband.

HOLLYWOOD, Cal., Jan. 22. (AP)—Mrs. William Jennings Bryan, widow of the late democratic leader, today is joined in death with her famous husband, whose constant companion in victory and defeat she was from that October day in 1884 when he led her to the altar and slipped onto her finger the ring inscribed "Won 1880; one 1884."

"Mental Safety Valve"
Mrs. Bryan, whom the great commander called "my mental safety valve," died last night at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Grace Bryan Hargreaves, wife of a Beverly Hills, Cal., banker. She had been suffering from arthritis for about 12 years, and her condition became suddenly worse upon her return here a short time ago from Miami, Fla., where she visited another daughter, Mrs. Ruth Bryan Owen, member of congress from Florida. Mrs. Bryan was 69 years old, and survived her husband by four years.

Husband's Career Here.
Throughout the 41 years of their married life, her husband's career was Mrs. Bryan's career. They discussed everything together—men, events and every new political issue. She assisted him with his mail and read aloud to him while he chopped down trees for exercise. In order that she might share more intimately his thoughts and be of greater aid in his efforts, she took up the study of law and was admitted to the bar.

Followed Guiding Principle.
While still a bride, Mrs. Bryan took as the guiding principle of her life the theory of which she later wrote: "I hold the theory that if a wife does not show an interest in her husband's work and does not go with him when he asks her, the time will come when he will cease to ask her."

That time never came. Throughout more than 35 years of Mr. Bryan's political life, during which he three times was democratic candidate for president, the commoner never ceased to "ask her."

She never failed to respond.

Burial at Arlington.
The burial place of Mrs. Bryan will be beside that of her husband in Arlington National cemetery, Washington, D. C., where the body will be shipped following brief funeral services here.
