

WITNESS ALSO THREATENED BY JOHN G. WRIGHT

Darling's Mother Told She'll Get Shot, She Testifies.

(Continued From Page One)

O'Neill, attorney for the defense, called on his first witness, E. H. Henry, county engineer.

Mrs. Wright in Court.

Mrs. Wright, wife of the man on trial, was in the court room with her husband from nine this morning until 11:30, and came back this afternoon. She sat at the table beside her husband and from time to time they conversed in low tones. Neither seemed excited or in the least moved with the testimony being offered. Mr. Wright watched the proceedings with interest and smiled several times at a number of statements made.

The court room was filled and many turned away. More women were present to hear the trial on the second day than on the first. A number of Wright's friends were in the audience and he nodded toward several of them.

Ten Witnesses Testify

By noon today ten witnesses for the state had given testimony in the trial, and had been cross examined by J. C. O'Neill, attorney for the defense, and C. N. O'Neill and John Irwin, assisting with the defense. Three witnesses were called Wednesday afternoon after the jury had been selected and the premises at the Anchor hotel where the shooting occurred on the night of November 12, had been viewed. Dr. Sharp, Floyd Moore and Frank Howard were put on the stand yesterday.

Say Wright Was Drinking

The most outstanding testimony given by those called to the stand this morning was that Wright appeared to be drinking on the night the homicide occurred. One witness stated that he could state frankly that he smelled liquor on Wright's breath and although he was not drunk, he had been drinking.

Mother Hysterical

Chap Winfrey, a butcher, who was in the Anchor hotel restaurant, was the first witness called when court convened this morning at 9 o'clock. Mr. Winfrey testified as to the time of the event, where the body was lying when he arrived, shortly after eight o'clock, and stated that Mrs. Earl, mother of Mr. Darling, became hysterical after the shooting occurred. He also stated that Wright was "half shot."

Saw Wright Visit Closet

W. M. Husted, a mechanic, appeared in the restaurant shortly before the crime and witnessed Mr. Wright go to the closet, but he could not tell what for. The closet, located in the lobby of the Anchor hotel, was where Wright was claimed to have taken the shot gun from. Husted left the hotel before the shooting occurred but returned shortly afterwards and testified to events following the arrival of the officers on the scene.

Stoner Heard Shot

L. E. Stoner, the third witness called by the state this morning, appeared at the kitchen of the Anchor hotel, located in the rear of the building and where the murder was committed, shortly after he heard the shot. He viewed the body which was lying close to the door, with the feet about twelve inches from the door, and then left and went outside and looked at the door where the shot had been fired. Stoner stated that Wright acted queerly, as though he had had several drinks. Mr. Stoner helped take care of the women in the hotel and then went outside, notifying a messenger boy to call the police.

Ambrose Testifies

Chief Ambrose gave a complete description of events following the murder. He stated that shortly after 8 o'clock he was called by someone who stated, "there is a man laid out at the Anchor hotel." Ambrose sent Clarence Coons and R. Lyons, officers, to investigate and followed them to the hotel.

When he arrived at the hotel Lyons and Coons were already there and Coons took the gun out of the closet, located across the lobby from the desk. He then took Mr. Wright to the police station, called the coroner and returned to investigate the premises. Mr. Ambrose stated that he found two pools of blood, one located at the top of the stairs and the other near Darling's head on the floor. This proved, Ambrose stated, that the body had been moved. Later,

he stated, Mrs. Earl stated that the body had been moved.

Found Shot Marks

Ambrose also found 36 or 40 shot marks across the room, and explained by means of a chart where the marks were located. Blood and brains were scattered over the room, the chief stated, and specks decorated the walls and ceilings.

A state exhibit of a screen door and glass and wood door was brought forth by Mr. Gillenwaters and Mr. Ambrose showed the jury and court spectators in what position Wright must have been when the shot was fired. Mr. Ambrose stated that Wright must have been right close to the door.

Chief Has Shell

Mr. Ambrose presented an empty shot gun shell, 12 gauge, given him by C. Coons, officer, who found it a little ways away from the Oak street door.

Darling was still alive when the chief of police appeared on the scene and gave six or eight gasps for breath before he died. He was still breathing when the doctor appeared.

Sheriff Called

Lloyd Low, sheriff, was the next state witness called and said that he was called from the police station to "come and take Wright to the county jail since he is pretty wild" or words to that effect, Low stated. However, he first went to the Anchor hotel and investigated the situation there and saw that the upper left side of Darling's head was blown completely off by a shot gun and that fragments of brain, blood and even skull were around the room. Darling's right eye was also bruised.

Had Warrant for Wright

The sheriff stated that on the previous day he had given a warrant to arrest Wright, on a charge of assault against Darling. This warrant occurred on the day before the murder and resulted in Wright being put on Darling. Wright posted \$200 bail for this offense.

On the day following the murder the sheriff ordered Frank Howard, civil engineer, to make a plate of the entire building.

When taken to the county jail Wright appeared to be a trifle excited at first but later became calm and joked. He appeared to have been drinking, Low stated.

Redington Recites Story

Max Redington, employed as a night clerk by Darling and now in the employ of Mrs. Wright who is managing the hotel at the present time, was the next state witness and stated that Wright had asked him to work that night, even though it should have been his night off, and that he went on duty at 7 o'clock in the evening. He stated that he saw Wright come in after supper, about five minutes to eight, get his shot gun from the closet and put either a shell or shells into it. Wright then went out, turned to the right toward the Anchor cafe, and disappeared inside. Later, Redington testified, he heard the shot and looked at the clock and saw that it was 7 minutes after 8. He heard the screams but didn't care to stay around so went down in the basement for ten minutes.

When he returned to the lobby officers had arrived and Wright was put under arrest. "Everything is alright" Wright was said to have stated then.

Wright Made Threats

Redington claimed that Wright had threatened Darling before and stated that he was going to use the night club on him. The night club is always kept handy at the hotel, according to Mr. Redington, since there has always been difficulty there managing some of the men. Once, Redington stated, he had to use a rubber hammer but had never used the large night club. One night clerk employed before he was was said to have been beat up and for that reason the club is kept handy in case three or four of the fellows get rough.

Low Recalled

Low recalled at this time and repeated parts of his evidence. The matter of the gun, found under the stairs of the Anchor hotel several days after the shooting, and turned over to the sheriff on November 21st, was introduced but discussed only lightly.

Clarence Coons, patrolman,

was another state witness who stated that Wright must have been drinking on the night of November 12.

Wright Called Police

"I'm the man who called the police. It's all over; the body is in there," motioning toward the kitchen, "and the gun is in there," Wright stated to Coons, giving a final gesture toward the cupboard where he had replaced the gun.

When Wright was taken to the jail he was advised that any statements he made would be used against him, so he stated, "Let's don't talk about it."

Just before noon Floyd Moore was recalled by C. N. O'Neill and cross questioned until he became nervous and excited. Moore denied the following question which was put to him by O'Neill: "Didn't you state after the killing that you and Darling had been waiting three or four days for that son of a b—?"

ing the British dominions, spoke briefly.

Stimson Speaks

Henry L. Stimson, the American secretary of state, said that he would not expand at the present time upon American naval needs, as it was well understood that the United States was looking to the conference for as much actual reduction as possible. The secretary said:

"After careful consideration and consultation with my colleagues I have decided not to make any statement today as to the naval requirements of America. I do not think that to do so would particularly assist our deliberations. These requirements are well understood. They have been cheerfully recognized by the nation which is our host, which has through its prime minister agreed with us that equality in naval power between us is the basis upon which we can best promote the beneficial purposes of this conference.

World Condition Governs

"We also believe that the requirements for national defense on the part of the various nations of the world are necessarily large relative to the general condition of the world, and therefore of this conference can find a way by which general reduction can be secured our own navy can likewise be reduced.

"While this is our attitude, we shall gladly listen to any statements which may be made by others, as we are anxious fully and cordially to understand the difficulties and problems which may confront our sister nations, and for ourselves I shall not make any statement."

Hankey Secretary-General

Prime Minister MacDonald, who acted as chairman, opened with a short, general statement, and said afterward that the whole proceeding was most friendly. The session also completed its permanent organization, and chose Sir Maurice Hankey as secretary-general. The session lasted but two hours.

"The meeting was most interesting, most informing and most friendly," said Prime Minister MacDonald later. "There was evident no hostile desire whatever on the part of the delegations to question one another."

Police Stay All Night

All available police, including Sheriff Carl Abbott and six deputies from Monterey county, San Benito county state, traffic officers and city firemen, were needed to disperse the mob and rescue its victims. To prevent a renewal of hostilities, Sheriff Abbott and his men remained here throughout the night but no new disturbances occurred.

White Girls Cause Riot

Bitter feeling which had its inception in labor problems, flamed into action at the employment of white girls as dancing partners in a Filipino social club at Palm Beach, across the Pajaro river. Knots of men, gathered at street corners, joined others in the march on the Filipino residences in South Watsonville. Bricks and bullets were fired through windows and the infuriated whites surged into the houses, dragging out the occupants.

At least twelve Filipinos were badly beaten and flogged by the mob while others fled to rooftops and cellars in terror.

dered. Baker confessed to the crime, and a coroner's jury gave the verdict that Riddle met his death from blows on the head caused by a blunt instrument, and that Baker and his wife were guilty of a crime thereby, according to Baker's confession.

Bakers Acquitted

Baker and his wife were bound over to the federal grand jury, and tried in Portland, but were acquitted.

Since that time, the Baker and Riddle families have been at swords points. At one time, it is said, Owen Riddle was threatened by Quincy Baker, and was told to get off his land and stay off, at the point of a gun.

Men Engage in Fight

Last night, Owen Riddle and Frank Baker, incited by their women folk, were fighting furiously, and in a desperate clinch, when V. O. Hodson, deputy special officer on the Indian reservation, with the aid of David Choctoot, Indian officer, separated them.

The Baker women attacked Choctoot, while it is alleged, Riddle shouted, "I'll get my gun, and kill you."

He had left his car, where he had started his gun, but was stopped by Hodson, who brought him to town.

Officers Puzzled

Officers are in a quandary as to how the case should be handled. The fight occurred on leased lands, which seems to remove it from federal jurisdiction. Something must be done to quiet the feeling between the two families, or it is feared that another killing may be the result. It is thought that both families will be placed under peace bonds, in the hope that no more blood will be shed.
