Woman Meets Death in Electric Chair

MONTGOMERY, Ala., Jan. 24. (AP)—Siena Gilmore, negro, the first woman to be electrocuted in Alabama was put to death in the electric chair at Kilby prison today.

The woman was convicted of the murder of Horace Johnson, Birmingham restaurant operator, last June. She was said to have entered the restaurant operated by Johnson, and after he requested her to leave, to have obtained a gun and shot him to death.

FOUR CHILDREN BURN

PORTSMOUTH, Ohio, Jan. 24. (AP)—Four children of Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Perry of Olway, 25 miles west of here, were burned to death when the home was destroyed by fire early today.

Mr. and Mrs. Perry rescued eight of their twelve children, but the other four were trapped in their rooms.

HOOVER'S PLAN WILL BE GIVEN CAREFUL STUDY

Governor to Name Group For Purpose at Conference.

PORTLAND, Jan. 24. (AP)—An exhaustive study of President Hoover's plan to turn over to the state great tracts of federal land, but retaining for the government timber, oil and mineral rights, will be undertaken by a committee to be appointed by Governor Norblad. This decision was reached at a conference yesterday of prominent bankers, educators, foresters, agriculturists, publishers and business men who were called together by the governor to discuss the effect of the proposed gift.

Questions raised at the meeting indicated considerable opposition to the plan. Among these questions were: Who will pay for restoration of public lands which have depreciated through neglect and lack of regulation by the federal government? Should the return of such lands to the state be considered as adequate compensation for natural resources, such as timber, which have been removed from states by the federal government for the benefit of the entire nation? What effect would the proposed gift have on reclamation lands and their future development?

It was pointed out that more than 13,000,000 acres, representing a quarter of the area of the state, was involved in Oregon. All but 1,000,000 acres of this land lies in the southeastern part of the state.

Grazing Value Important

In speaking of this land in southeastern Oregon, F. N. Kavanaugh, grazing expert of the forestry department, said improper use of the lands had prevented natural reseedling. If this land is restored to its pristine condition, he said, it would be capable of supporting 200,000 cattle and 500,000 sheep. J. D. Billingsley of Ontario, state senator from Harney, Grant and Malheur counties, disagreed with Kavanaugh, and questioned the value of the lands.

Judge Groesbeck Speaks

Judge R. C. Groesbeck, president of the Klamath Falls chamber of commerce, said some of the grazing land in Klamath county would require five years to restore.

Rhea Luper, state engineer, said mineral resources of the lands involved were not so extensive as to present a serious obstacle. Judge William Doby of Baker questioned this, and was one of the advocates of having mineral rights included.

Examination For Rural Carrier to Be Held Soon

The United States Civil Service commission has announced an examination to fill the position of rural carrier at Klamath Falls, Oregon.

The examination will be held at Klamath Falls, Oregon.

Receipt of applications will close on February 21, 1930.

The date of examination will be stated on admission cards mailed to applicants after the close of receipt of applications, and will be about ten days after that date. The salary of a rural carrier on a standard daily wagon route of 34 miles is \$1,800 per annum, with an addition of \$39 per mile per annum for each mile or major fraction thereof in excess of 34 miles. Certain allowances are also made for the maintenance of equipment. The examination will be open only to citizens who are actually domiciled in the territory of the postoffice where the vacancy exists, and who meet other requirements set forth in Form 1977. Both men and women, if qualified, may enter this examination, but appointing officers have the legal right to specify the sex desired in requesting certification of eligibles. Form 1977 and application blanks can be obtained from R. L. Griffith, local secretary, board of civil service examiners, or from the United States civil service commission at Washington, D. C. Applications must be on file with the commission at Washington, D. C., prior to the close of business on the date specified above. At the examination, applicants must furnish unmounted photographs of themselves taken within two years.

Dear Commander: Heartiest congratulations to you, the other officers and members of your post, on the winning by your post of a special citation from national headquarters for most distinguished service.

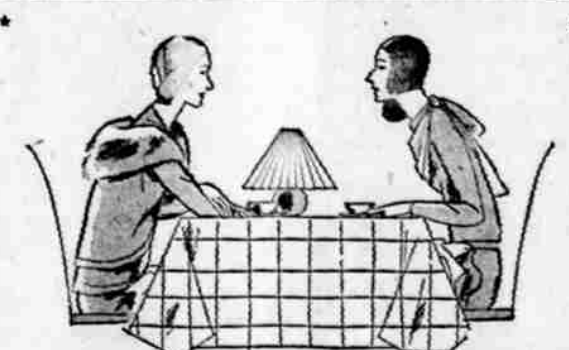
This is an outstanding and significant achievement and proves that your post is carrying out in a most substantial way the ideals, aims and purposes of the American Legion.
