

## WATSONVILLE HAS NEW RIOT

White Man Stabbed And Filipino Killed In Latest Outrage.

WATSONVILLE, Cal., Jan. 24. (AP)—Racial hatred, inflamed by the employment of white dancing girls in a Filipino club here, smoldered again in the Santa Clara valley today as the result of two clashes at San Jose, in which one white man was stabbed and four Filipinos badly beaten.

The outbreak at San Jose, which occurred last night, came while armed patrols were guarding the streets and highways here to prevent any possible recurrence of the fighting which has raged intermittently for five days, resulting in the death of one Filipino, the flogging of several others, and the arrest of seven white men on rioting charges.

**One Man Stabbed.**  
Alfred Johnson, 22, was stabbed twice in the back and critically wounded while he was watching a clash between Filipinos and whites at San Jose. There were two fights, two Filipinos having been beaten in each. Police said white men were the aggressors in each case.

Discovery of an alleged Filipino pamphlet called "The Torch" to which was attributed the statement that "Filipinos have as much right to American girls as Americans," was reported to peace officers.

The body of Fernán Tehera, 22, a Filipino, was found in a bunk house east of here yesterday. He had been shot through the heart. Authorities said shots had been fired into the building by a mob of white men Wednesday night and that several Filipinos fled from the place in terror.

Pool halls and similar places of amusement here were closed at 5 o'clock last night by order of city officials. Members of the American Legion joined peace officers in preserving order.

## Crescent Harbor Survey Receives General Support

The request of the Northern California-Southern Oregon Development Association that the Board of Engineers for Rivers and Harbors make a physical survey of Crescent City harbor immediately is receiving the support of county courts, city councils, chambers of commerce, service clubs, and other organizations throughout the whole territory the association represents, according to C. E. Gates, president.

The district engineer has asked for time to make a survey of the project at the California port and the development association concurs with the idea, but is anxious that no delay be occasioned by the work. Many letters have been sent to the army engineers, and to Senator McNary and Congressman Lea, asking for immediate action. Sam H. Baker, president of the Grants Pass chamber of commerce, was one of the first to place his organization on record as supporting the claims of the development association.

MEDFORD, Ore., Jan. 24 (Special)—The board of directors of the Medford chamber of commerce at a meeting held last night voted to support the Northern California-Southern Oregon Development Association in its request that the Board of Engineers for Rivers and Harbors make a physical survey of Crescent City harbor immediately.

The Medford chamber of commerce is sending letters to the army engineers, Senators Charles L. McNary, the Honorable Clarence F. Lea asking that the work be started as soon as possible.

## Episcopal Church and J. Henry Thomas



The debt having been fully paid on the Episcopal church here it will be formally consecrated at a ceremony Saturday night by Bishop William P. Remington. The church was made possible through the co-operation of the parish and the work of Venerable J. Henry Thomas, archdeacon of this section. The church will be the scene of three meetings, one to consecrate the church, one the ordination of Rev. Joseph Ewing, and the confirmation of a large class of adults.

## St. Paul's Episcopal Church To Be Consecrated Saturday By Bishop W. P. Remington

The beautiful building of St. Paul's Episcopal church, opened four years ago, is entirely free of all debt and in a service of rejoicing is to be consecrated Saturday night at 8 o'clock by the Rt. Rev. William P. Remington, D. D., Bishop of Eastern Oregon.

The structure was designed by Messrs. Holford and Lawrence. Dean Lawrence is head of the architectural school at the University of Oregon. Mr. Holford is an ardent churchman. The dual combination of churchmanship and architectural skill of this firm has resulted in a building patterned after the exquisite lines of the churches of the Old World with an interior conducive to worship and devotion. The supervising architect during construction was Howard Ferrin, and Stevens and son were the builders.

**Work Started in 1901**  
Pioneer work of the Episcopal church in this territory started as far back as 1891 when services were held in homes and various buildings by Bishop Morris and visiting clergy.

Bishop Paddock was successor to Bishop Morris in this jurisdiction and for 15 years in strenuous endeavor and with many hardships diligently shepherded his people until, broken in health, he retired.

**Remington Here in 1922**  
Bishop Remington found the nucleus of a church in the faithful group of women who had unfalteringly been working towards attainment of a church building, when he was in Klamath in 1922. Their tireless efforts with gifts that the Bishop secured made possible a church building at the Fremont school site.

**Thomas Builds Church**  
The departure of Rev. Meryweather and sale of the church property to the school board caused the high hopes of the church people to drop.

There was about \$11,000 on hand from the sale of the old property and the new structure was started. The energy and determination of the new rector caused a structure to be near enough completed for the holding of services on St. Paul's Day, January 25, 1926, only about four months after his arrival.

With enthusiasm the church group has steadily beautified their church and given generously for its support, while the bishop has aided splendidly not only in spiritual but in financial needs.

**Made Archdeacon**  
The steady development in parish consciousness and organization with the vigorous growth of parish activities are the result of the much-appreciated work of the rector who had a firm belief in the future and possibilities of this district, and he has repeatedly refused outside offers and honors.

The success of his work was recognized by the office of archdeacon being conferred upon him.

**To Advance Ewing**  
Within the past six months Rev. Joseph S. Ewing has been appointed by Bishop Remington as archdeacon of this section.

Tenacity of purpose and fine faithfulness has characterized many of the good men and women who through thick and thin never lost sight of their goal, and they are to rejoice in the consecration of their church.

In addition to the Saturday night service, the Rev. Joseph Ewing is to be advanced to the order of Presbyter in another unique service, Sunday, Rev. S. W. Cressy will be the preacher and Van J. Thomas

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the presenter, while Bishop Remington will perform the Episcopal functions. At this service Arthur Douglas Hay of Lakeview will be admitted to the office of Lay reader.

**To Confirm Class**  
In the afternoon Archdeacon Thomas will present to the bishop 24 adults, candidates from Lakeview, Langell Valley and Klamath Falls. In addition there are 13 adults for Holy Baptism.

These results have been possible only by the splendid way in which the archdeacon has enlisted the co-operation of men not only in the financial and organization of the church but in its spiritual enterprises. Frequently when a multiplicity of services has made it a physical impossibility to carry them through, men have conducted services and preached sermons.

The present governing committee of the church is: R. Heber Radcliffe, Dr. E. D. Lamb, Frank L. Weaver, F. R. Olds, V. J. Walker, J. M. Young, S. P. Miller, F. L. Crittend and H. E. Getz. Mrs. D. V. Kaykendall is president of the Guild. Miss Virginia West, president of the Wednesday club, Mrs. E. D. Lamb, president of the Altar society, and Rev. Joseph S. Ewing, director of religious education.

## Bishop Remington To Be Addressed At Consecration

At the consecration of the Episcopal church at 8 p. m. on Saturday night the following address will be made to Bishop Remington:

This day sees the realization of the hopes, prayers and labors of the many years since 1891 during which time the services of the Protestant Episcopal church have been held in the City of Klamath Falls. From a small beginning this church has grown and prospered under the administrations of our former Bishops Morris and Paddock, Archdeacon Van Waters and other ministers who have served us in the past. Particularly during this period, as well as since, we owe a great deal to the faithful group of women workers who form the splendid Women's Guild, and whose energies and hard work resulted in our first church and parish house which was built at the corner of 7th and High streets. This early work and the later sale of this first church building to the School Board placed us in the strong financial position with which we started our present

church and parish house. With your coming to the District in 1923 the first church building was completed and our real Parish organization begun with the work of the Rev. Mr. Meryweather.

At this time and during the succeeding years we are exceedingly grateful to you, our present Bishop, for the love and faithfulness with which you have guided us in our work, and for the great help which you have given us in our spiritual and financial needs.

With the coming of Rev. J. Henry Thomas in October of 1925, the building of our present church and parish house was started, and owing to the determination and energy of Mr. Thomas our services were begun in the new church in 1926 on the date of our Patronal Festival, January 25th.

Since that time we have witnessed a steady development in Parish consciousness and organization. Along with the vigorous growth of our Parish activities we are thankful that the work of Archdeacon J. Henry Thomas and the Episcopal church is extending and receiving appreciation not only in our town but in the surrounding territory.

With deep appreciation to the members and many friends of this church who contributed to our building fund, as well as to you who secured the most generous contributions from outside Klamath Falls, we are able to certify that all obligations and outstanding bills have been paid or secured, and now we are able to turn over to you as Bishop these buildings, asking you to consecrate them and set them apart to the worship of Almighty God and the upbuilding of His Kingdom. We hope that here the worship of Almighty God according to the rites and ceremonies of the Episcopal church may be firmly established, that our children and young people may receive here adequate Christian nurture and that Christian fellowship and friendship may be blessed within these walls.
