## AT THE THEATRES

AT THE PELICAN  
"Devil-May-Care" Ramon Novarro's all-talking musical romance with a score by Herbert Stothart, lyrics by Clifford Grey, and an elaborate technicolor sequence, will open Sunday at the Pelican Theatre.

The picture, adapted to the screen by Richard Behaymer from the French drama, "La Bataille des Dames," is laid in the historical period of Napoleon's exile, and concerns the adventures of one Armand, played by Mr. Novarro, who, was a lieutenant of the deposed emperor, has an exciting time keeping out of the hands of Royalists, and at the same time winning one of the most beautiful feminine members of the group.

Advance reports indicate that those who have been speculating to the recording of Novarro's speaking voice, need have no fears since tests have shown it to be as well suited to the megaphone as his singing voice, which was first introduced to the public in "The Pagan."

The songs in "Devil-May-Care" are said to be unusually beautiful, having a semi-classical air but a catchy swing. It is predicted that "Charming," the principal song will be one of the most popular numbers of the year. Two other romantic songs, "If He Cared" and "The Shepherd's Serenade," are reported to outdo anything sung in current musical comedies. "Pompador" and "Bon Jour, Louis" are rollicking comedy ballads, and "March of the Old Guard" is a military song sung by Novarro with a large chorus.

Director Sidney Franklin chose Novarro's supporting cast with an eye on the musical phase of the production. Dorothy Jordan, formerly of "Garrick Gaities," "Twinkle, Twinkle" and other Broadway musical comedies, has the leading feminine role, this being her first feature venture in film. Marion Harris, well-known "blues" singer has the prominent role of Countess Louise. Others in the cast include John Miljan, William Humphrey, George Davis and Clifford Bruce.

Advance information from the Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer studio at Culver City has it that "Devil-May-Care" proves itself distinctive not only in its musical score but in beautiful photography. It is said the height of artistry was reached in filming various sequences, including Napoleon's farewell to his guard, in which the various expressions on the faces of the soldiers are shown in closeup as the camera is slowly moved in front of the ranks. The use of light and shadow is expertly employed in a scene in which Armand is to be shot at dawn but makes his escape over a stone wall. However, most comment has been in connection with a scene filmed in technicolor in which a group of Albertina Rasch girls execute a Napoleonic ballet in a reproduction of the gardens at Versailles. The costumes, the impressionistic angles from which the scene was "shot," the sudden shooting up a myriad of fountains, and the effect of the colorings, are said to make this scene by far the most beautiful ever filmed through the use of the technicolor process.

AT THE PINE TREE  
A lucky piece—a hat with a silver lining! This is an apt description of the storehouse of headgear worn by Ted Lewis, vaudeville's famous jazz entertainer, and in "Is Everybody Happy?" the Warner Bros. and Vitaphone picture which marks his debut as a screen star and which will open at the Pine Tree Theatre Sunday the same battered old plug hat still serves as a contributing factor to his eventual success.

No other stage performer is so definitely linked with a distinguishing trade mark as is Ted Lewis with his high hat, and no other performer has evolved so distinctive a style of singing jazz songs. With a strange fascination, Lewis acts his syncopated melodies in a tragic style that gives them a new meaning. His method of singing is also responsible, will open Sunday at the Pelican Theatre.

In "Is Everybody Happy?" Lewis is first shown as an immigrant boy, and his gradual rise eventually presents him just as he is in real life—a "different" vaudeville artist at the head of his own band. And this, be it noted, is in actual fact the famous Ted Lewis Band, which has for years formed such an important feature of his vaudeville act.

Prominent members of his supporting cast are Ann Pennington, Alice Day, Lawrence Grant, Julia Swayze Gordon, Fumeli Pratt and Otto Hoffman. Archie L. Mayo directed "Is Everybody Happy?" It is an original screen story by Joseph Jackson and James A. Starr.

AT THE LIBERTY  
That American vaudeville is becoming increasingly popular in Germany is indicated clearly in the UFA production, "Spies," which comes Sunday to the Liberty Theatre.

Berlin cabarets and vaudeville houses form one of the many colorful backgrounds for this story of Continental adventure and intrigue. In many of the theatrical sequences shots of the performers show many figures that have apparently been transplanted from American two-day houses.

The American "down East" farmer, with luxuriant chin whiskers and slow, gangling walk, is one of the current standbys in Teutonic vaudeville entertainment and utilizes a great many of the standard Yankee jokes, sometimes translated, sometimes not.

The American Indian is another popular figure on the German stage. Many persons are inclined to believe that his special favor with German audiences results from the successful foreign "invasion" of Tim McCoy, Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer Western star, McCoy, when he visited Europe, took with him a pack of redskins who appeared in numerous theatres along with McCoy and seemed to enjoy the trip immensely.

Managers immediately reported a great demand for Indian performers in their vaudeville skits and special acts. Troupes were brought over from this country and at present their popularity seems greater than ever before. It hasn't been stated how many of them learned to "sprechen Deutsch."

"Spies" is a dramatic story of a master mind's attempt to upset world peace. Fritz Lang, who made "Metropolis," directed, and the cast includes many of the best-known Continent players.

Butter went up another cent at the Portland produce exchange Saturday, while butterfat jumped 2c to a basis of 41c delivered Portland. Tillamook at the same time advanced Tillamook triplets and loafs 2c.
