Present Season Profitable One to Professional Golfer

NEW YORK Jan. 27. (AP)—Gene Sarazen, stocky New Yorker, may have won the most money, but the real leader of the winter golfing troupe is Young Horton Smith, of Joplin, Mo.

Thanks to his victory in the rich Agua Caliente open, Sarazen, former open title-holder, has enjoyed the most profitable winter of all his golfing brethren, with cash prizes aggregating close to \$11,500. Smith, however, has given a sensational display of consistently brilliant play ever since the troupe left for the West late last fall.

Smith Consistent Winner
In the eight major winter tournaments in which he has played, the Joplin professional has won three, placed second once and tied for second twice. And in compiling this imposing record Smith has earned nearly \$9,500.

Sarazen did not follow the same trail as the majority of the pros. He won \$600 by finishing fourth in the Hawaiian open; jumped back to Florida to win the Miami open and \$750, and then snared the big prize of \$10,000 in the Agua Caliente open.

Smith, on the other hand, played in practically all of the California tournaments, and nearly always with conspicuous success. He won the Pasadena, Berkeley and Portland, Ore., opens; placed second to Craig Wood in the Hawaiian open, and tied for second at

Looking Into Real Estate HOME OWNERSHIP MAKES GOOD WORKERS SAY TWO BIG EMPLOYERS

The more home owners there are among a company's employees, the better it will be for the company, says F. Edson White, President of Armour and Company, in a statement released today by the National Association of Real Estate Boards in a series of articles on the practical aspects of home ownership.

And the Association also quotes P. S. DuPont, Chairman of the Board of the E. I. Du Pont de Nemours & Co., who states that the fact that a man is able to purchase a home is an indication of past ability and trustworthiness.

The Armour Company, one of the largest packing companies in the world has 50,000 employees and the Du Pont Company, largest manufacturers of chemicals and explosives in the world, has 35,000 employees.

No good workers will be turned down by a big employer because he does not own his home but the casual mention of the fact that he is making payments on a mortgage will favorably impress the man who is doing the hiring, because the home owner is good for the company, says the Association.

"Naturally the employee who owns a home in the vicinity of a factory or office where he works is more inclined to remain in his position and to work harder to retain it than a man who either rents a home or has quarters in a boarding house," says Mr. Du Pont.

"On this account, corporations are naturally favorable to the class of employee who will purchase a home, for the fact that he is able to do this is an indication of past ability and trustworthiness."

The big manufacturer warns employers against encouraging workers to undertake home ownership just to become a home owner, and points out that the employee involved in too heavy payments may not be an asset to a company.

"Employers should be careful not to state the home owning proposition in a way that will lead employees to invest in a home simply because it is desirable to become a home owner," says Mr. Du Pont. "Making such a purchase requiring payments beyond a man's means or finance or making purchases beyond what is reasonable, may involve an employee in a way that will make him less desirable."

"The purchase of real estate must, therefore, be recommended guardedly, with certainty that the offerings are not only reasonable as to values but not too burdensome as to time payment. I am not one who believes in indiscriminate real estate ventures."

"Steady, reliable employees

who have pride in their jobs and a sense of responsibility are worth much to any business enterprise," declares Mr. White the Armour Co., head.

"Ownership of a home is a great factor in developing reliability and responsibility in a man. The home owner feels that he is definitely a part of the community, he takes an active interest in it and can be counted on to boost it when opportunity presents itself. The more home owners there are among a company's employees, the better it will be for the company."

Should Be Encouraged
"It is regrettable that home owning carries with it, in some places, rather heavy penalties in the form of taxes."

"I am hopeful that the time will come when there will be a premium on home ownership rather than a penalty. Certainly the home owner, on the average has more incentive for good citizenship and good workmanship."

Uclas Putting Up Best Fight in Southern Conference.

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 27. (AP)—University of Washington by its one-point victory of 32 to 31 over Oregon Saturday night maintained its hold on first place in the northern division of the Pacific coast basketball conference. The Webfoots' green and inasurenced team threatened to defeat the leaders in the last 10 minutes of the game. During that time Oregon held the Huskies to one single foul conversation while totalling 11 points, just one short of a tie.

Washington moves to Corvallis today where they meet the Staters, still under the coaching of Dick Newman while Coach Slats Gill is recovering from his attack of pneumonia.

This week-end will see the ancient rivals, Oregon State and Oregon meet in their first conference clash at Eugene, Saturday night.

Trojans Tramp Uclas
Southern division basketball circles of the Pacific coast conference received a hard jolt over the week-end when Southern California handed the University of California at Los Angeles a 33 to 16 defeat and changed the whole complexion of the championship race.

The U. C. L. A. Bruins went into Saturday night's fray against the Trojans boasting of an unblemished record that included victories over both California and Stanford and were given little chance of downing their southern rivals.

Title Undecided
However, Southern California sprang another upset in this season of surprises and by her decisive drubbing of the Bruins disclosed that the southern division championship is not yet decided by a long way. Three teams are still in the running for the title, the two southern schools and the University of California.

California met her ancient rivals Saturday night, the Stanford Cardinals, and finished the contest on the long end of a 36 to 30 score. This Bear victory just about eliminated Stanford from titular consideration. Four games they have played this season, and the best they could do was to hang up one win.

MARINE MAN DIES

PORTLAND, Jan. 27. (AP)—E. W. Wright, 67, veteran Pacific coast marine man, died at his home here yesterday, after an illness of several years. Death was due to heart disease. Wright came to Portland in 1883, and became manager of the Portland Merchants' Exchange. In 1915 he accepted the position of manager of the Port of Portland commission. He resigned in 1917 to become part owner of the McEachern shipyards at Astoria.

SEA CLAIMS HOUSES

ATHENS, Jan. 27. (AP)—Many houses collapsed yesterday on the islands of Psara and Antipara in the Aegean Sea during a violent earthquake. There were big cracks in other buildings. Inhabitants were panic-stricken and deserted their homes for the open country. No loss of life was reported.
