Judge Goddard Forum Speaker

"The Business of Running Klamath County" will be the subject of the address at the chamber of commerce forum luncheon Wednesday noon when County Judge Fred R. Goddard will talk before the membership. It was announced Saturday in the Keynotes published by the chamber.

T. R. Gillenwaters, deputy district attorney will preside. Preceding the talk, George Cunniff will entertain with several readings.

The candidates will be asked to refrain from speaking on political issues, but it is the belief of the committee it will be an opportunity for citizens of the county to become more intimately acquainted with the candidates.

AT THE THEATRES

AT THE PELICAN
Ramon Novarro's first talking picture for M-G-M, "Devil-May-Care," will give ample opportunity for a display of the star's excellent tenor voice.

Six special numbers were written for this picture, a story of France in the days between the exile of Napoleon to Elba, and his return. Sidney Franklin directed.

The love affair of Armand, a young Bonaparte, and Leonie, a Royalist, is aided by the well-known emotional power of song. The various numbers are: "If He Cared," "Charming," "Pompadour," "March of the Old Guard," "The Shepherd's Serenade," and "Bon Jour, Louis."

"Charming" is the principal love song of the production. It is sung by Novarro while he is masquerading as a servant in the house of the Countess. This part is played by Marion Hargis, the famous "blues" singer, who also has a specially written solo, "If He Cared."

"Pompadour," and "The Shepherd's Serenade" are two other Novarro numbers. In the latter he sings in both English and Spanish, his native tongue.

"March of the Old Guard" is sung by Novarro and a chorus of defeated Bonapartists. "Bon Jour, Louis" is a derivative song directed against the King of France, sung by Novarro and the Bonapartists in prison.

The entire score for the musical romance was written by Herbert Stothart, who was the co-composer of "Rose Marie," "Wildflower" and "Songs of the Flame." The lyrics are the work of Clifford Grey, one of the most distinguished musical comedy authors of Great Britain.

As a result of such British shows as "The Bing Boys Are Here" and "Yes, Uncle," Grey was brought to America to write the lyrics for "The Three Musketeers" and "Sally," the lyrics of "Hallelujah" (with Leo Robin) and the lyrics and book of "Mayflowers."

Associated with Stothart in directing the orchestra for recording of the songs in the Novarro production was Frederick Stahlberg, who for many years was a musical associate of the late Victor Herbert. Stahlberg met Victor Herbert in Stuttgart, Germany, and came to America with him as conductor through all of Herbert's greatest successes. After Herbert's death, he became musical director of "Princes and Paupers" and "The Velvet Lady" and other musical shows.

According to representatives of music-publishing houses who were given an opportunity to hear advance recordings of the music, the songs numbers in "Devil-May-Care" are destined to nationwide popularity. While the songs retain a musical-comedy tilt, they have been written with a popular catchiness that will enable listeners to whistle the tunes as they walk out of the theatres.

"Devil-May-Care" will close a two-day engagement at the Pelican Theatre tonight.

AT THE PINE TREE
What of the son who fails to follow in the footsteps of his father, in spite of a lifetime of preparation?

There is poignant drama in the story of Victor Molnar, Old World musician proud of his past greatness, who expected that his son Ted would carry on the torch laid down by his father, and become an interpreter of the world's beautiful symphonies only to find that he had capitulated to the spirit of the New World and had become a devotee of the hated "jazz."

This is one of the situations in the Warner Bros. and Vitaphone production, "Is Everybody Happy?" now playing at the

Pine Tree Theatre that brings real tragedy into the life of a proud and aristocratic Hungarian immigrant. He discovered his son playing syncopated melodies in the hectic confusion of a New York cafe.

"Is Everybody Happy?" marks the film debut of the famous Ted Lewis, vaudeville's most popular and merriest entertainer, and presents him as the star of a pretentious production which traces his eventual career after coming to America.

The culmination of the story shows him just as he is in real life—an outstanding vaudeville singer appearing with his own band in a type of music that has served to elevate him to the topmost ranks of variety performers.

The role of Ted's father is played by Lawrence Grant, and other prominent members of the supporting cast are Ann Pennington, Alice Day, Julia Swayze Gordon, Otto Hoffman and Purcell Pratt. Archie L. Mayo, directed.
