Thoughts We've Been Thinking

War Will Disappear when Conditions Which Permit Its Survival Will Disappear.

Paris Newspaper That Started Club of "Smiling Women" to be Commended.

Classical League of America May be Able to Direct the Thought of People to Beauty and Importance of Literature—But We Doubt It.

WHILE the question of peace is still being discussed, the great California scientist, who says: "War is the process of abolishment due to the persistence of science. War will disappear when conditions which permit its survival will disappear."

Every scientific advance shows ten times as many peaceful uses as those showing warlike means. Steel makes bayonets, but it also makes railroad tracks, sewing machines and countless other things related to peace. Science is diverting man's thoughts from war.

THE newspaper in Paris that instituted the club of "Smiling Women" is to be commended. It is not only a pleasant idea, it is an extremely beneficial one as well. If the countenance reflects the thoughts, says a Paris newspaper, it is possible that a reversal of this action may be effected, too. And with a smile upon our face our thoughts may be diverted into pleasant channels even though they were not running there before.

The only visible symbol of a person's attitude toward us is exemplified by his aspect and when the visage facing us is a smiling one we feel positive that there is good will and, below it, and we respond accordingly. I am sure that "any woman when she wants to see how attractive she really is beams upon herself before the mirror. No beauty mixture can remove as easily or quickly the lines of age as a smile. No lady, when it concerns a choice between growing old or smiling, will hesitate for long.

SOME way we have our doubts about the classical league of America being able to direct the attention of the people of this country to the beauty and importance of literature. The year of the 2000th anniversary of Virgil's birth begins in the fall of 1930, so the historians say. That year will have special observance by this classical league. You may or you may not care for Virgil, most of us never cared for it when we went to school, but it is pleasant to hear in these days of "barber shop blues, hysterical guitar songs, designed for the flapper trade, and books that go wild that there is such a thing as a classical league and that there is somebody who thinks it worth while to promote learning that won't bring you a dollar or even a kind word," says one writer.

Nobody who does not have the satisfaction of knowing a few beautiful and perfectly useful things has much conception of the happy facilities of education. Thus he continues:

JURY EXONERATES POPE

ADVOCATES OF RAILROAD FILE BRIEFS

List Includes Railroads, Chambers of Commerce and Communities

NEED MORE THAN SINGLE LINE ARGUED

If Great Northern and Western Pacific Connection Is Granted, Biggest Section in United States Served by Single Line Will Get Added Service.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28. (AP)—Support of the proposed new line of the Great Northern and the Western Pacific railroads, which would form a 200-mile connection between Klamath Falls, Ore., and Keddies, California, was given in briefs filed today with the Interstate Commerce Commission from various Western points.

Would Give Concessions

Certain concessions to assist settlers on private projects are suggested in the report, the newspaper's Washington correspondent said, which included waiving of interest payments of bonds from the Shasta View project, a readjustment for the Stanford project to be worked out jointly by the government and Oregon, and a modified contract for the West.

SEVEN LIVES LOST IN FIRE

Miner Burns in Effort to Rescue Mother and Children

FREDERICK, Colo., Jan. 28. (AP)—Seven persons were burned to death in a fire that broke out today in a two-room shack near the Slope mine. Mrs. Paul Martinez, her first children, ranging in age from 12 months to 15 years, and a miner named Newton lost their lives. Newton discovered the fire, broke into the shack through a window, and was burned to death trying to rescue the family.

Father at Work

The fire is believed to have started from an over-heated boiler. The father of the family was at work in the Slope mine, on a night shift.

The dead:

Mrs. Della Martinez, 20; Frances, 13 months; Pauline, 12 years; Ernest, 6 years; Emma, 10 years; Rosa, 8 years; Ernest L. Newton, 34 years.

Newton is survived by his wife, Dr. J. A. Weaver, corner of Weld county, came here from Greeley to take charge of the bodies.

Frederick is a coal camp, located 30 miles north of Denver.

RIOTS BREAK OUT IN FRISCO

Filipinos Accompanying White Girls Object Of Mob Attack

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 28. (AP)—Police, called to quell a disturbance at Turk and Larkin streets last night, arrested two Filipino youths, who declared they had been attacked and beaten by a gang of whites while returning with two white girls from a theatre. The Filipinos were charged with disturbing the peace.

The youths' assailants had disappeared when police arrived, while Jose Francisco and Roseguino Perales, the Filipinos, were found in their Eddy street apartment nearby.

Answered Insults

The pair declared they were returning from a theatre with their companions, when a gang of 15 whites passed insulting remarks as they walked by. When they replied to the insults, the Filipinos said, they were attacked. They were able to break away after receiving a severe beating, and fled to their apartment, police were told.

Says Girl His Wife

Francisco said one of the white girls was his wife, while Perales was unable to identify his companion beyond disclosing she lived on Bush street.

It was the first time since the race riots at Watsonville and disturbances in other parts of the state that anti-Filipino sentiment manifested itself in this city.

CURBING OF IRRIGATION FUND URGED

Bureau of Reclamation Against Financing of Private Projects

SHASTA VIEW AND HORSEFLY AFFECTED

Certain Concessions to Assist Settlers on Private Projects Are Suggested, Such as Waiving Interest Payments on Shasta View Project. Adams Survey Figures in Report.

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 28. (AP)—The Oregonian said today that recommendations submitted to Congress by the Bureau of Reclamation as a result of an economic survey last year set forth that the Federal Government should not extend financial assistance to private reclamation projects in Oregon, including those now controlled by the Shasta View, Stanfield, Horsefly and Westland Irrigation districts, but should take steps to assure financial stability for such Federal project as the Umatilla and Owyhee.

Those advocating approval of the proposed route were the Denver & Rio Grande Western railroad, board of city commissioners of Salt Lake City, the Salt Lake county board of commissioners, the Utah Coal producers association, the Utah Shippers Traffic association, the Utah Public Utilities commission, the San Francisco and Oakland chambers of commerce, the county and city of San Francisco, the city of Oakland, the downtown association of San Francisco, the North Dakota and Montana board of railroad commissioners, Washington State Department of Public Works, the Spokane chamber of commerce, the Spokane Merchants association, the Seattle and Tacoma chamber of commerce, the board of supervisors of Sutter county, California, California State Grange, the chamber of commerce of Rio Vista, the Gridley community club, the Modesto chamber of commerce, the Oroville and Allied communities chamber of commerce, the Sacramento Federated Trade Council, the Stockton chamber of commerce.

JOHN M'CALL IS CANDIDATE

Postmaster Says He'll Make Decided Effort To Retain Job

In reply to an article in the Evening Herald Monday mentioning the candidacy of Francis Olds for the position of postmaster of Klamath Falls, John A. McCall, present postmaster, comes forward with a statement that he will be a candidate to succeed himself when and if a re-appointment occurs. In a signed article, Mr. McCall writes as follows:

"When, and if, a vacancy in the office of postmaster for Klamath Falls occurs, at the expiration of my present term, I shall certainly be a candidate for re-appointment.

"The collection, distribution and dispatching of mail in a city the size of Klamath Falls has become a highly specialized business. The money order work, parcel post, postal savings, registry, C. O. D. organizing of new rural and carrier routes, all require knowledge of the business.

Office Growing Rapidly

"There is but one postoffice and it must serve all patrons, satisfied or dissatisfied, and they cannot take their business elsewhere when they feel they have grievance. Further all the employees are under civil service and it is a tedious and difficult proposition to make changes in the personnel. The office is growing by leaps and bounds, and mistakes are many, but we have a splendid working force, and we

POPE FOUND NOT GUILTY OF CRIME

Marshal Exonerated By Jury at Inquest Last Night

WITNESSES DECLARE MILLER AGGRESSOR

Pope Gives Story of Events Leading up to Shooting at Bonanza Sunday. Miller Carried Desire to Slay Marshal up to Dying Breath.

C. S. Pope, town marshal of Bonanza, was found not guilty of a crime when he killed Owen Miller, 21, in a gun fracas in Bonanza Sunday afternoon, according to the verdict returned by the coroner's jury which met last night. The jury was composed of Floyd McMillan, Glenn Jester, Jack Franey and Gus Eckman. Henry Joyaux, deputy coroner, presided at the hearing.

Pope Testifies

Pope took the stand in his own defense, and told the incidents preceding the fatal shooting and how he had been warned previously to watch out for Miller.

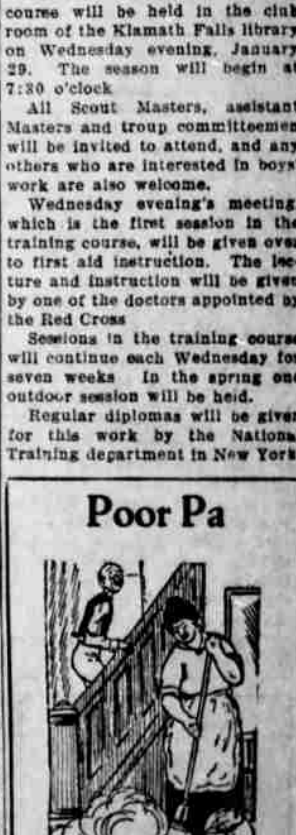
According to the marshal, Miller had caused considerable trouble before in Bonanza, and on several occasions Sydney Lyons, a youth who was arrested by officers yesterday and is being held pending an investigation, had been with him.

Gave Miller Chance

Pope said that he was sitting in the Bonanza hotel lobby Sunday, when he saw Miller, Lyons and Lawrence Campbell walk by, and Miller was carrying a gun. He watched the boys awhile, and finally told Miller to put the whiskey away and stop promenade around town. Events from that time on followed in quick order. Miller then got the horse and
