HICKMAN, Ky., Jan. 28, (AP)—"Ponco Joe" Cantillon, baseball veteran, carried on his battle with death this morning, hours past the time doctors predicted it would be possible for him to remain alive.

Will power alone kept the veteran alive, doctors said as scores of messages came from notables in the sport world. His only rational moment since his condition took a turn for the worse Sunday brought back memories of his old days and he struggled to tell a yarn about Babe Waddell, pinching at who he is credited with discovering before he lapsed once more into coma.

Attendants this morning said Cantillon had passed a very bad night and gradually is getting weaker.
