Cooper and Olaguer Will Play to See Who Meets Wallgren in Balkline Title Tourney

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 28. (A.P.)—Sam Cooper, Seattle and G. Olaguer, Portland, both undefeated, were matched in the first game of the second round of the Pacific Northwest amateur 15.2 Balkline billiard championship here today while G. Sharpless, Everett, and Peter Kleinschmidt, Seattle, each with two defeats to his credit, were paired in the second contest.

Wallgren Ex-Champ
Monrad C. Wallgren of Everett, Pacific coast title holder and former world's champion, who came through the first round with a clean plate and one more victory than any of the other contestants, was to meet the loser of the Cooper-Olaguer encounter in the third and final match of the day.

The tournament is of the round-robin variety and being held at the Rialto billiard parlors here under the supervision of G. Raymond Collins, president of the National Billiard association. **Made Day's High Run**
Wallgren, exhibiting spectacular billiards, breezed through his two games yesterday in true championship fashion. In his first match he defeated Kleinschmidt 250 to 81, establishing a high run for the day of 48.

Olaguer, a newcomer to the major matches, also defeated Sharpless. The score was 250 to 150 and the Portlander required 58 innings to run out. His high run was 39, his opponent's 12.

Cooper beat Kleinschmidt 250 to 181 in 53 innings, the winner's high run was 23, made twice. Kleinschmidt's was 15.

Seven Persons Are Taken in Custody

Seven persons, most of whom reside at Bly, have been indicted by the federal grand jury on a charge of maintaining a nuisance and all have been taken into custody by Deputy U. S. Marshal C. C. Wells and Probation Officer L. O. Shirley. They have several more warrants to serve, they state.

"The government is going to padlock all places where people have been convicted or have pleaded guilty to selling liquor," Shirley stated last night.

Those who have been taken into custody are Jack O'Neil, Tony Bens, John Stokes, Jack Russell, Marjorie Hanold, James Jamison will serve out a sentence in the county jail and will then be released to the federal government. Joseph Robinson will be taken into custody when released from a local hospital, where he is being treated.

James Walters was arrested yesterday at Chilquin and was bound over to federal grand jury on a charge of introduction of liquor onto the Klamath reservation and sale of liquor to an Indian. Bond has been set at \$2,500 in the case of all arrested by U. S. Commissioner Bert C. Thomas.
