Fort Klamath Warming Up to Winter Sport As Snow Softens

PORT KLAMATH, Ore., Jan. 28.—(Special.)—The slight moderation in temperature for a few days past has made the snow condition much better for skiing. Wherever a single trail has been made the boards slip pretty well. All of the Fort Klamath ski fans were out all day Sunday. Coast line was enjoyed on several hills near the old Anna Creek sawmill site. In the afternoon a party of young ladies led by Miss Ida Briscoe took the Crater Lake trail, going some distance beyond White Cat spring. They report the trail as being fair. They measured the snow at the Klamath entrance and found it to be three feet, or only a little more than a foot deeper than at Fort Klamath.

Despite London Parley French Naval Secretary Plans to Build More Ships

LONDON, Jan. 28.—As if to snap its fingers at restriction of naval strength, France—with the five-power naval armament conference under way here—would appear to have taken two steps in the opposite direction:

1. It has approved the building of more cruisers and submarines; and,
2. Pointedly announced that hereafter naval units will be maintained in French colonies—some of them in parts of the world where now only American and British warships are seen.

Georges Leygues, who is a sort of perpetual Secretary of the Navy surviving the multitudinous changes in French cabinets, the other day made a speech in Paris in which he said the guiding principle of his department was: "Unity of views; continuity of effort."

To Protect Colonies.
He then went on to say that his department aimed not only at giving France an adequate navy for her home waters in the Mediterranean, Atlantic and English Channel, but also for her colonial empire.

"There are," he said, "active races and passive races. The foundation of our overseas empire proves that we belong to the former category. One of the most important missions of our navy is to protect the magnificent work accomplished by our predecessors."

He then announced that he was about to form four divisions of the navy to be permanently attached to ports in the Pacific Ocean, Indian Ocean, the western coast of Africa, and in the West Indies.

Besides, Saigon in Indo-China will remain the French base of operations in the far east. From there cruisers, dispatch boats and gunboats will depart for the seas and rivers of China to protect French interests. This force will be strengthened by at least three big submarines.

Two Bases in Pacific.
In the Pacific the bases will be at Noumea in the island of New Caledonia and at Papeete in the island of Tahiti. The fleet there will be composed mainly of dispatch boats for the present. The fleet designed to patrol Indian ocean waters will be stationed at the newly completed harbor of Diego Suarez on the great island of Madagascar. Submarines largely will be entrusted with this work. The waters of western Africa will be patrolled by boats having their base at Dakar and the naval units in Moroccan waters also will be reinforced. Ships will be sent to the French ports in the

West Indies, hitherto mainly patrolled by American and British war vessels. Bayout in Syria also will have its naval contingent.

In addition, there will be a flying division capable of carrying important military and marine units to any given point. This will be composed of the Duquesne, Tourville and Suffren, three of the most powerful and modern 10,000-ton cruisers in the world.

The French government organs have been careful to point out that in doing this, France is only following the example set by the United States, England and Holland.

It is pointed out that Holland does not hesitate to send to the Dutch East Indies the most important part of its fleet—namely, two cruisers, three new destroyers, submarines of series K—the best she has—a mine layer, a ship for the refueling of airplanes and seaplanes, and a great quantity of smaller units.

U. S. Navy in Tropics.
America is shown to have naval units constantly in the West Indies to protect the Panama Canal, in the Hawaiian waters and at Guam and the Philippines.

And it is declared that Great Britain has the greatest fleets of all in distant waters. Thus it maintains in Chinese waters a veritable flotilla—a squadron composed of five of its most recent and powerful cruisers, an entire flotilla of destroyers, a squadron of submarines, nineteen gun boats, five dispatch boats and a seaplane carrier. In the East Indies it has another division of three cruisers and four dispatch boats.

India, New Zealand and Australia each have their own navy. The Australian comprises three cruisers, two of which are comparatively new, powerful 10,000 tonners, and a large and powerful aviation force.

Even when they were coming into the city the marshal said Miller would swear at him, and insisted that he intended to kill him.

Pope's Story Verified

Oliver Pitts, Tom Hutton and Carl Lenz, owner of the restaurant, were all present at the shooting and also at the hearing and testified that Miller shot first. Dr. G. S. Newsome, who performed an autopsy on the body, stated that death was caused by internal hemorrhage due to a bullet striking the liver. He testified to finding three bullet wounds in the youth's body.

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land district which would extend the time for payment of water charges to 40 years. This contract covers the purchase of water from the McKay reservoir.

Discontinue Refunds

The field investigators who studied the Umatilla project concur in the tentative decision already reached by the reclamation bureau to write off all delinquent charges and title to the irrigation systems and transfer all rights to the two districts with the understanding that the government will expend no more money on the project. The request of the districts that construction payments heretofore made should be refunded should not be granted, in the opinion of the investigators.

The report laid the present "unhappy financial condition" of the Shasta View district to lack of settlers and the lack of elimination of some areas too distant to be reached without excessive distribution costs.

Adams Made Survey

Last year Professor Frank Adams was here making a thorough survey of the financial conditions of the Shasta View and Horsety irrigation projects in the Klamath basin, and reported back on his findings and survey to Washington, D. C., where the matter was taken up by the bureau of reclamation.

Under the present law a forty year term is allowed for repayment of debts, and it has been decided that no extension of this time will be made in order to give financial assistance in that manner or any other manner, according to officials at the local reclamation offices.

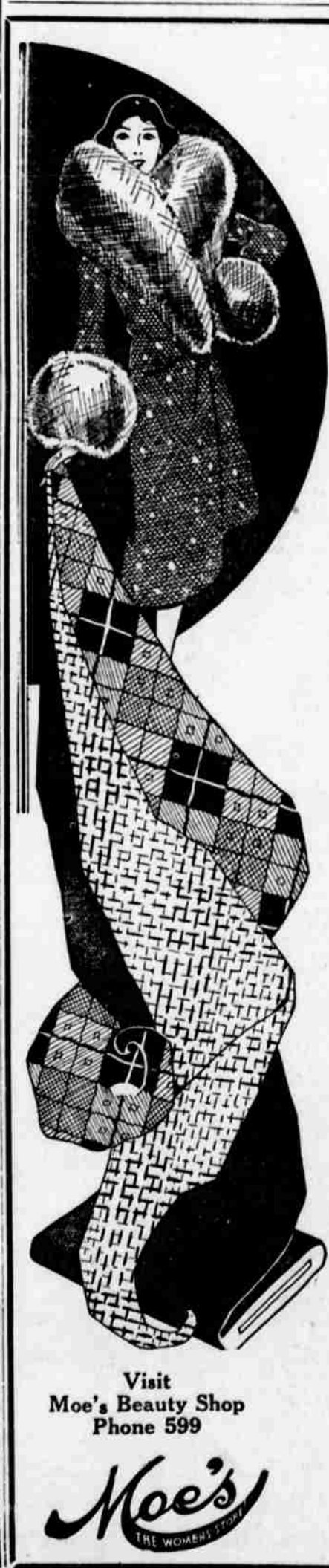
