FILIPINO CENTER BOMBED

CITY WILL
FIGHT TAXI
INJUNCTIONCouncil Determined To
Keep For Hire Cars
Off Main Street.FENWICK SEEKS TO
HOBBLE ORDINANCETaxi Operator Says State Legis-
lature Did Not Delegate Klamath
Falls Officers With Au-
thority to Regulate the Oper-
ation of Motor Vehicles.

The city of Klamath Falls will fight the injunction suit brought against them by B. B. Fenwick, local taxi owner, was the statement made this afternoon by Mayor T. B. Watters who stated, "We intend to fight it to the finish and will do everything we can to protect the people and keep the taxis off Main street."

This action on the part of one of the taxi owners who has been attempting to obtain a car stand on Main street since the passage of a new ordinance in November is believed to have resulted from a meeting held between taxi men and the police committee of the city council, Monday night, when Mayor T. B. Watters "threw down the gauntlet."

Asks Restraining Order.
Fenwick claims in the complaint that the legislative assembly of Oregon has not delegated to Klamath Falls officers, including the mayor, city council and chief of police, the right to regulate the operation of motor vehicles, but that the council on November 7, 1929, disregarding the rights of the plaintiff and as part of a scheme to deprive the plaintiff of his equal rights under the laws of the state, passed and approved an ordinance whereby the city was given the right to state where taxi stands might be located, refusing to allow them on Main street.

The plaintiff has requested the court for a temporary restraining order to be issued, restraining and enjoining the city and its officers from enforcing the provisions of the ordinance, and that upon a hearing the order be made permanent and that the ordinance be declared invalid.

Says Power Lacking
The complaint terms the council's action as "an unwarranted and unreasonable interference with lawful business," and states it is "unconstitutional and invalid because it grants immunities and privileges to some which are not given to all."

Fenwick contends that the ordinance has sought to confer upon members of the council the naked and arbitrary powers to give or withhold consent as to the operation of motor vehicles for hire.

Says Right Denied
Further extracts from the complaint follow:

"That the plaintiff was engaged in his lawful operation of his said 'anywhere for hire,' service, as licensed so to do by said public service commission, and complying with all rules and regulations, the city, by direction of its executive (Continued on Page Five)

RIVERA ACTION
CAUSE OF JOYStudents Stage Riotous
Celebrations When
Dictator Quits.

MADRID, Jan. 29. (AP)—Police today battled crowds of students boisterously celebrating in the streets of the capital the resignation of General Primo De Rivera, for six years premier and dictator.

Almost 200 were arrested and many were injured, several seriously. Clashes occurred in many parts of the city one demonstration near the Royal Palace was dispersed when police fired over the students' heads.

Police Draw Sabers
Drawn sabers were used to force back the manifestations in some downtown streets. There were many fistfights between the officers and students, who shouted "Viva Rey! Muera Primo!" "Long Live the King! Death to Primo!" Police quickly suppressed shouts of "Viva Republica," or "Long Live the Republic."

Confers With Successor
Meanwhile General Primo De Rivera, whose resignation was accepted by King Alfonso effective as of 10:15 p. m. last night, conferred with his successor and perennial enemy—General Damazo Berenguer, chief of King Alfonso XIII's military household and former commander in Morocco.

To Take Rest
General Primo De Rivera, bidding farewell to King Alfonso and to the country as head of the government and explaining reasons for his resignation, issued an official note which concluded:

"And now to rest a little, to recover my health. Two thousand and three hundred and twenty six days have been filled with inquietude, responsibility and labor! But rested, then I God wishes, I shall return to serve Spain until I die!"

LIKED A CHANGE

BERLIN, Jan. 29. (AP)—A German can leave his wife at home and get married in Russia with impunity. Karl Schmitz did it. He was arrested on returning to Germany. It was decided that he was liable only to the punishment of the place where his crime was committed. Russian has no punishment for such an offense.

FAMOUS PRIMA
DONNA'S VOICE
LOST FOREVEREmmy Destinn, Operatic
Star of Many Roles,
Passes Today.

BERLIN, Jan. 29. (AP)—The Prima Donna, Emmy Destinn, died today at Budweis, Czechoslovakia. She was 51 years old. Mme. Destinn became one of the most famous figures of European opera of the first quarter of the century. She was born in Prague, Bohemia, Feb. 20, 1878, the daughter of Emanuel Kittel, and began her education as violinist under Lachner.

From 1892 to 1898 she studied under Maria Lowen-Destinn, whose name she adopted. In 1898 she joined the Royal Opera company in Berlin. Starred Many Roles
She appeared first as Senta in the "Flying Dutchman" and as Nedda in "Pagliacci" at Covent Garden in 1898, later creating the title role in Puccini's "Madame Butterfly." Her other favorite roles were Aida, Santuzza, Nedda, Armida, Venus, Elsa, and Maddalena in "Andrea Chenier." Her hobby was writing and verifying, collecting rate books and beautiful bindings.

In 1910 she participated in the then new production of Puccini's "Girl of the Golden West" with the Metropolitan Opera company, New York.

U. S. Citizen
She took out her first citizenship papers in the United States shortly before America's entrance into the world war. In 1923 she married a Captain Haisbach, Czech aviator, who was much younger than herself.

Her voice was a soprano of extraordinary range.

An added menace to motorists early this morning were the icy pavements throughout the city and on highways. March 3 Is Date Set For
Opening of Splendid New
Oregon Bank Structure

Fred P. Duke, president of the Oregon Bank and Trust company, announced this morning that the beautiful new \$200,000, six-story bank building would be completed and ready for occupancy on March third. The bank will be open for business at that time and nearly all the offices from the first to the sixth floor inclusive, will be filled.

Peterson In Charge
Hans Peterson of Seattle is the general contractor for the building and will have the entire building ready to turn over to the tenants about the first of the month. 79 men are working on the building night and day in order to rush it toward completion and the interior decorating work is now in progress.

The permit for the building was issued on July 29, 1929, and the work has been carried on since that time with no interruptions. The plumbing and heating systems have already been installed and lighting fixtures will be placed in the near future.

COUNTY JUDGE
FORUM SPEAKERGoddard Tells Chamber
Of Commerce About
County Expenses.

Speaking on a subject that has been closest to his heart for the past three years, at least, County Judge Fred R. Goddard told members of the Klamath county chamber of commerce at the weekly forum luncheon today something of the running expenses of the county and how they are handled by the court.

Opening his talk with a reference to the first official record of acts of a Klamath county court, wherein the annual levy amounted to ten mills and the total expenses were about \$27,000, the speaker brought the attention of his hearers to the present budget which calls for a levy of 11.2 mills. That levy covers the actual running expenses of the county as disbursed by the county court. Considering the change in methods of business and the demands made upon public purse these days, the judge feels proud of the record made by the body of which he is a member.

Mr. Goddard gave many interesting statistics and details in proving his contention that the affairs of the county are being handled to the best interest of the taxpayers and made it clear that the people themselves can help in the economical (Continued on Page Five)

HURLS MANY
FROM BEDSMotorman Sees Large
Blue Sedan Speed
Past Building.POLICE THINK DEED
AFTERMATH OF RIOT

Sporadic Outbreaks in San Francisco and Other Sections Where Filipinos Congregate Continue. Police Think They Are Situation in Hand But Are Worried.

STOCKTON, Cal., Jan. 29. (AP)—Dozens of Filipinos were hurled from their beds in the Filipino center, a club house, here early today when a bomb exploded on the front porch of the structure. The blast carried away the facade of the building and shattered windows of dwellings within a block's radius. No one, however, was reported seriously injured.

Hurled From Caa.
The bomb was hurled, apparently, from a speeding automobile. Charles Woodrow, a street car motorman, said he saw a "large blue sedan" speed past the club an instant before the blast occurred. The center, a remodeled mansion, is in a poorer residential section in the southern part of the city. It is an entertainment center as well as a dormitory and white women have been employed there recently as entertainers.

Aftermath of Riot.
Police saw the bombing as an aftermath of recent riots and anti-Filipino disturbances in San Francisco, San Jose and Watsonville, where whites, who regard Filipinos as the cause of much unemployment in the state, have subjected the islanders to numerous attacks. A Filipino shot to death and a white man stabbed to death have constituted casualties so far. In Watsonville whites began aggressions when two white women were employed as entertainers by a Filipino social club at Palm Beach, near here.

Holdups and Fights.
Almost simultaneously with the explosion this morning, three holdups were reported in various parts of the business district and a half-dozen fist fights between Filipinos and whites were reported.

Officials said the situation today was orderly, but admitted they were worried. They pointed out that this city has a Filipino population of 15,000, said to be the largest in California. Three Filipino labor contractors have headquarters here and supply the Delta farming region with workers.

Many Whites Stranded.
The city is also a center for white transient labor and white winter men unemployed here, unable to find employment in the fields. Such a situation, they assert, might lead to serious (Continued on Page Five)
