Freedom Vote Coming.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29. (AP)—A vote in the senate on Philippine independence during the present session of congress appeared likely today with the announcement by chairman of the senate territories committee, that the committee would report a bill as soon after February 19 as possible.

Ten Years More.

It also was disclosed today that Senator Vandenberg of Michigan, an administration member of the territories committee, is drafting a bill providing for independence at the end of ten years.

Vandenberg is using the measure once offered by Secretary of War Weeks proposing independence at the end of 25 years as the basis of his bill. He is adding to the measure a provision for gradual tariff autonomy. Full tariff autonomy would be granted to the Philippines with independence at the end of the ten year period.

"Laboratory Test."

"I am for Philippine independence if and when the islanders are politically and economically ready," explained Vandenberg. "I will not be satisfied that they are politically and economically ready until we have a ten-year laboratory test."

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6000 square feet of the entire space will be located on the first floor with another vault and directors room located on the second floor. The bank also will have a mezzanine floor over the lobby. Located at the rear center of the bank will be a huge clock. Use Marble Finish

The floor of the bank is being decorated in a diamond pattern of chip marble, composed of chips of multicolored marble ground and polished, making a beautiful finish. The same type of floor is used throughout the building. Stencil work is being used for the interior decorating of the bank with soft colors bringing out a beautiful effect. The pillars are finished in two tone and the walls are finished in a tan mottled effect. Lighting fixtures giving a daylight brightness at all times are being installed.

The large vault at the back of the bank is protected by a 12,000 ton vault door.

Build For Future

"We are building for the future, and not for a day. We thoroughly believe in the growth of Klamath Falls and know that our faith will be lasting. We are giving to the city the best and most beautiful building in the entire state, outside of Portland," Mr. Duke commented.

The rest of the ground floor will be taken up with F. W. Bertram's jewelry store, a Marshallfield firm; the Tri-States Realty firm, who are handling the rental of business offices for the building; and a drug store which will be opened by Earl Dewese of the Star Drug company.

Walls Fire Proof

The second floor is to be taken up with commercial businesses and part of it will be occupied by the bank. Throughout the building the hallways are being finished with marble chip floors, called parazzo. The partitions are lined with fire proof and sound proof materials. Every room in the entire edifice has an outside wall.

Finished To Order

None of the office suites are being finished until rented so that the tenant may have his office finished according to his own tastes. In many of the offices already rented the lighting and plumbing fixtures have already been installed and the rooms are near completion.

Elevator Service

Elevator service is used throughout the building from the basement to the top floor.

Medics Rent Space

The third to the fifth floor is taken up with doctors and dentists offices, most of which have already been spoken for. The sixth floor has been set aside for lawyers and attorneys offices.

Ventilation Modern

The ventilating system, which from the roof and is one of the most modern systems tried out.

Room For Three Boilers

The basement has been divided up into numerous rooms and contains a garage disposal, boiler room, and other necessities. A complete switchboard is also located in the basement. There is a room for two more boilers in addition to the one already installed, which would be sufficient to heat an additional hotel and apartment house.

An idea of the size of the building and the work that has been done was given by Mr. Duke when he stated that 75,000 tons of concrete were necessary for the completion of the building in addition to 175 tons of steel reinforcement used in construction, 90 tons of terra cotta used on the outside, 220 tons of tile, 360 tons face brick and 10 miles of pipe.

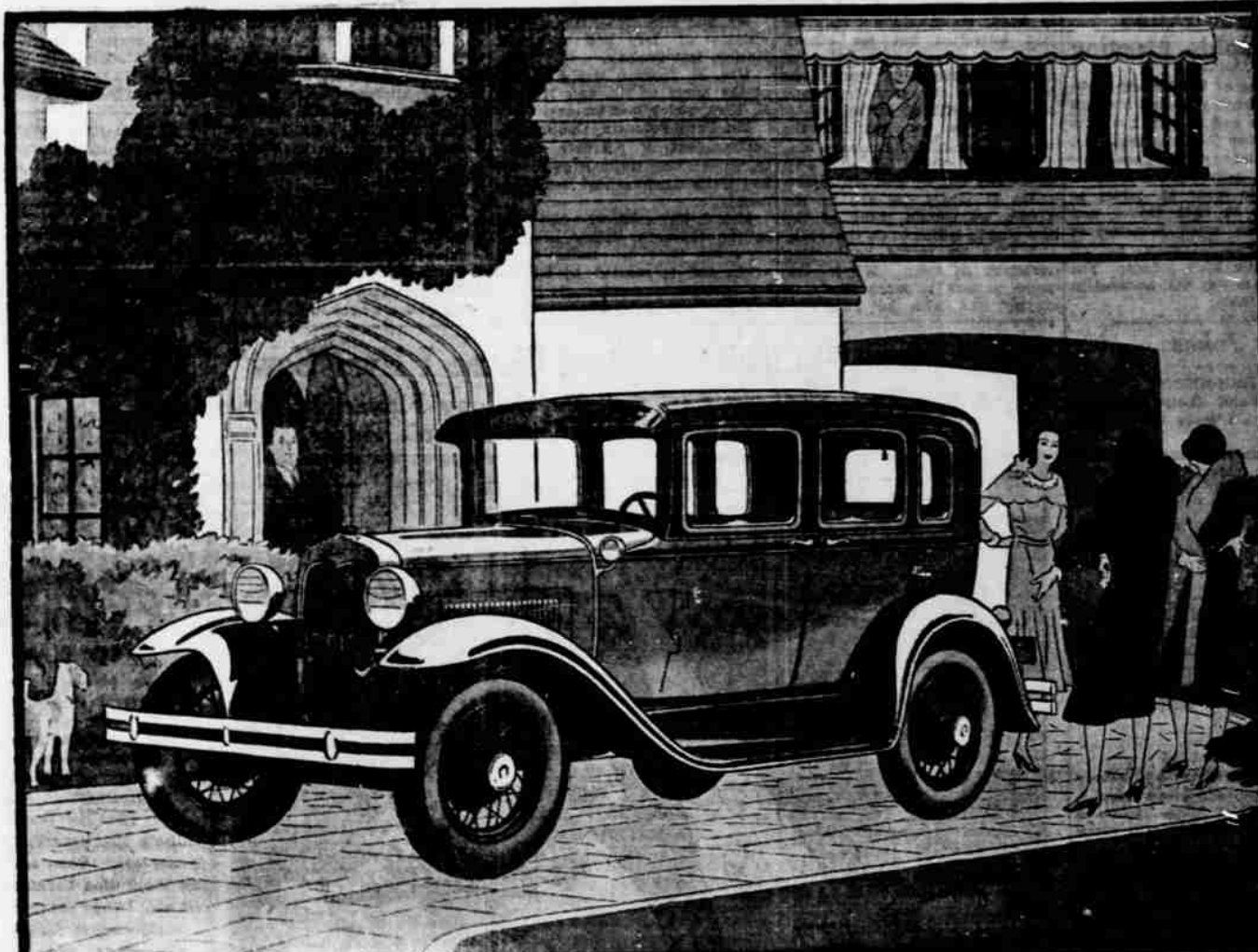
