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Today's Markets

PORTLAND, Jan. 29. (AP)—All egg grades declined again today, according to announcement from the Pacific Co-operative Poultry Producers. Fresh extras and standards dropped 2c each to 34c and 32c, respectively. Fresh mediums were cut 3c to 31c. Medium firsts were quoted at 28-29c. This further reduction was no surprise in view of the increased supplies.

Butter prices were firm and unchanged.

Reviewing the fruit and vegetable situation, the Portland bureau of the United States department of agriculture says: "Trading is good on Portland's wholesale fruit and vegetable market this week. City retailers are replenishing their stocks, following their two weeks enforced hibernation due to impassable streets. Wholesalers delivery trucks are also finding their way to suburban and rural retail centers, all of which makes for active distribution.

"Most commodities are unchanged in price, although wide price ranges generally prevail, due to variation in quality of southern produce now offered for sale. Some stocks show deterioration, possibly due to too long storage in refrigerator cars last week, awaiting an opportunity to unload.

"Demand for apples is active; cheaper sorts especially cleaning up readily, both at Portland and at shipping points.

"Ninety-four cars of cauliflower were shipped from California and Arizona yesterday; this being the season's peak movement thus far.

"The potato market shows increased activity at Yakima valley shipping points, and prices are 1 to 3 dollars per ton higher than last week's close. Portland potato prices are unchanged.

CREW IS RESCUED. BIARRITZ, France, Jan. 29. (AP)—Fourteen members of the crew of the British steamer Knabworth, marooned in the fore part of the vessel which had broken in two after going aground yesterday, were rescued this afternoon.

OFFICIALS PLEAD GUILTY. OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Jan. 29. (AP)—Twenty-two of the 103 officials and residents of Pottawatomie county charged with conspiracy to violate the national prohibition act, pleaded guilty here today when trial of the case was called.

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
