

# IDAHO FORWARD POINT LEADER

## Harold Stowell Leads Pack by Margin of Eight Points.

SEATTLE, Jan. 30 (AP)—Although competing in only one game in the last seven days, Harold Stowell, dynamic forward of the University of Idaho basketball team, continues to lead the parade of point getters in the northern division of the Pacific coast hoop race. With a grand total of 71 points in six contests, Stowell leads the pack by eight, one less than he garnered in his last battle against Washington State college last Saturday.

**Grayson Ousts Holsten**  
Buck Grayson, Oregon State college left-handed guard, ousted Claud Holsten, rangy W. S. C. forward, from second place during the week. In two games against Washington Monday and Tuesday nights, Grayson boosted his total to 63 compared with 61 for Holsten.

**McClary Jumps Up**  
With four more contests under his belt, "Stork" McClary, 6-foot, 6-inch center of the Washington Huskies, has jumped from nowhere to fourth place with 57. Keenan of Oregon, has moved up two rounds next to McClary with 55 while Frank McMillan, Idaho flash and last year's leading scorer, is tied with Hanks Swanson, elongated Washington forward, for sixth place with 46. Ralph Callahan, Oregon State forward, is the "bad boy" of the north with 20 personal fouls charged against him. His teammate, Grayson, is nearly as bad with 19.

Stowell, the leading scorer, is also the cleanest regular with only two fouls.

Holsten, McClary and Grayson will have a chance to catch Stowell this week when Washington plays Washington State in Seattle Friday and Saturday and Oregon entertains Oregon State at Eugene Saturday.

## Jack Elder Tastes First Track Defeat

NEWARK, N. J., Jan. 30, (AP)—Jack Elder, hero of many exploits in football and track for Notre Dame, has tasted defeat for the first time this season, but he did not allow the taste to linger.

Making his second appearance of the eastern indoor season at St. Joseph's Catholic club games here last night, Elder lost the first race of the Rupert F. Mills memorial sprint series to Jimmy Pappas, former Princeton star now wearing the colors of the Newark A. C. Pappas won the 50 yard event, but Elder came back to win at 60 and 70 yards and capture the series prize.

Phil Edwards defeated Ray Conger of the Illinois A. C. in the 1,000-yard event by 15 yards.

# Jim Bagby's World Series Victory Over Robins Was Freakiest Gme Billy Evans Ever Saw

The freakiest pitched ball game I can recall among more than 3000 games in which I officiated as an American League umpire goes back to the world series of 1920 between Cleveland and Brooklyn. Jim Bagby was the pitcher in that game and I never could quite make up my mind as to whether Jim should have felt proud or ashamed of that performance.

It was in 1920, you will remember, that Bagby won 31 games for Cleveland. This is a lot of games on the winning side of the ledger and any pitcher who accomplishes the feat must be blessed with more than average luck. Bagby surely had it that year. If he blanked the opposition, the Indians would somehow manage to get one or more runs. If the opposition found Jim for eight runs, the Indians would find ways and means to get him nine or more.

Bagby's good luck continued with him in the 1926 world series, though for a time it seemed as if Dame Fortune intended to slip him nothing but trowns. Selected to pitch the second game of the series, Bagby was pitted against Burleigh Grimes. He held

Brooklyn to six hits and three runs in seven innings but in the meantime Cleveland bats, that usually spoke loudly with Bagby working, had been silent under the mastery of Grimes' deceptive spittle. Bagby was beaten, 3-0. It was Bagby's turn to start the fifth game. The series at that time was all even. Probably never in the history of a world series game was a winning pitcher batted as savagely as was Bagby that afternoon. It seemed as if every Brooklyn batter to face him hit the ball on the nose. The Dodgers made 13 hits, yet could score only one run. Cleveland won the ball game, 8-1, even though it made one hit less than Brooklyn.

As a matter of fact, Bagby should have been credited with a shutout. Brooklyn scored a run in the ninth when a ground ball that "Doc" Johnston should have handled, retiring the side, was credited as a hit and resulted in a run. I am told Jim took "Doc" to task in the clubhouse after the game, while the rest of the club roared with laughter.

It seemed as if the bases were loaded with Brooklyn players all afternoon, but something would

invariably happen to erase them from the picture. Three times double plays did it, one of them a throw from Jamieson to Steve O'Neill, cutting off a run at the plate. On another momentous occasion, with the bases loaded, no one out and several Cleveland pitchers hastily warming up, Bill Wambagans made his now famous play unassisted to retire the side.

I might also add, in this freak ball game, Elmer Smith made his now famous home run in the first inning with the bases filled. Burleigh Grimes threw him a spitball that didn't carry enough saliva to break properly and Smith did the rest. To add to the gaiety of the occasion Bagby himself made a home run.

On the verge of being driven to the showers in almost every inning, Bagby really should have scored a shutout. This game was the turning point, as it removed Grimes, Brooklyn ace, from the picture and Cleveland won the following day, 1-0. Try back baseball's pages and try to find another game like it from a "freak" standpoint.

Sarpolis finally succumbed, lying prone on the mat and had to be carried from the ring. After an examination, an ambulance was summoned and he was taken to a hospital for an X-ray examination.

EUGENE, Ore., Jan. 30 (AP)—with the first game of the annual Oregon-Oregon State basketball feud scheduled for Saturday night at McArthur Court, Coach Bill Reinhart is driving his charges the better part of two hours every night this week in an effort to push them beyond the form they displayed in the unfortunate two game series with the Washington Huskies last weekend.

Since then the Staters have taken a clean sweep in their second series with Washington, winning both games in Corvallis, each by a two point margin.

Present appearances indicate that Reinhart will start the same lineup which came back so strongly in the second half of the last game with the Huskies, reaching to within one point of a tie score after Washington had rolled up a commanding lead in the initial period.
