Enters Crater Ski Race



Miss Della Mallory, Crescent, who won the cup "Daughter of the Snows," in the Fort Klamath-Crater Lake, 32-mile ski race for women in 1928 has announced that she will enter the race again this year in an attempt to win back the trophy.

Miss Della Mallory To Again Enter Crater Lake Ski Races

FORT KLAMATH, Jan. 30—(Special)—Word comes today from Crescent in northern Klamath county that Della Mallory is preparing to make a run to Crater Lake in an attempt to regain the championship of lady members of the Crater Lake Ski club.

The Daughter of the Snows, wandering trophy cup, presented by the club to the lady member making the fastest time over a 32 mile course to Crater Lake lodge and return was held by Miss Mallory for one year and her record of seven hours and five minutes, made February 14, 1928, was lowered by Ida Briscoe last February 14, when she made the 32 mile trip in six hours, 32 minutes.

Three Names on Cup—Miss Briscoe and Miss Mallory battled the trail for several trips each, in effort to hold title to this trophy, both of them making runs over the course that ended in failure to establish a new record. The name of Ida Briscoe appears first on the cup with a record of 10 hours, 29 minutes, January 27, 1928. Jessie Gray lowered this time and her name and record appear on the cup next, on

February 15, 1928, with the time of 9 hours, 15 minutes. On February 14, 1928, Ida Briscoe established a new record of 8 hours, 29 minutes and it was smashed the same day by Della Mallory who lowered the new time to 7 hours, 5 minutes.

It so happened that the runners chose the same day to establish a new record, and they were started only a few minutes apart, causing a real ski race over the 32 miles of snow and resulting in defeat for Miss Briscoe. Just a year to a day later, Miss Briscoe made a dash covering the distance in 6 hours and 32 minutes.

It appears now that these two ladies may again do battle on the trail. The ladies have literally moved Crater Lake much closer to Klamath and demonstrated that it is not impossible for ordinary members of the fair sex to make the ski trip to the lake in a few days at least.

A very beautiful snow picture of the lodge and lake in winter is awarded every lady making this 32 mile ski trip under 12 hours. Miss Doris Noah is the fourth young lady to receive the Daughter of the Snow picture.
