Negro Swings For Crime Done in 1927

ST. LOUIS, Jan. 31. (AP)—William Mosley, negro, went to his death on the scaffold today for the murder of three persons here in 1927.

The 54-year-old negro shot and killed his common law wife, Mildred White and two white persons, Mr. and Mrs. Marcus Bass September 10, 1927. The shooting took place in the Bass grocery store, where the negroes had fled after Mosley beat her. He also wounded their baby. Mr. and Mrs. Bass were slain as they attempted to flee.

ICE IN RIVERS HINDERS TRADE

Steamers Unable to Reach Shore and Deliver Supplies Mid-Stream to Sleds.

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 31. (A. P.)—Ice in the Columbia and Willamette rivers continued today to hamper the return to normalcy of river transportation and life at Brookfield, Wash., and on Puget Island in the mid-Columbia.

The lighthouse tender Rose, which last week brought supplies to a half dozen fishing villages on the Washington side of the Columbia after the United States coast guard cutter Northland ploughed a water route through ice, left Astoria today laden with supplies for Brookfield.

Supplies Loaded on Sled.

The steamer Effin, which yesterday reached a point 900 feet from the shore off Brookfield, lowered mail and supplies to the ice which were transported to the village by sled. Reports indicated more supplies were needed.

Another emergency call for a physician was received from Puget Island, where an airplane landed a doctor last week to attend a girl ill with pneumonia. Sankey Blix, a resident of the island, suffered a fractured shoulder when he was kicked by a horse.

Ice Piled High.

Attempts of the Northland to cut its way to the relief of the ice locked river steamer N. R. Lang were checked when the cutter rammed into ice piled ten feet deep.

An ice jam threatened the river steamer Robert Young, ice-bound near Jennings Lodge, in the Willamette river.

TO STUDY WHALES

LONDON—The ship "Discovery II" which recently set sail from here is off for a two-year cruise of the antarctic on a scientific survey on the habits of whales. This expedition, backed by the F. J. L. Islands, is sent out in an effort to gather information helpful in safeguarding the future of the whaling industry. Darts bearing distinctive marks will be shot into the backs of whales so their movements can be checked.
