

WORKMEN FIND CLOTHING BUT MEN MISSING

Fear Predatory Beasts May Have Destroyed Fliers' Bodies

NOME, ALASKA, Jan. 31 (AP)—Workmen engaged in the search for the bodies of Carl Ben Eklund and Earl Borland at the scene of their wrecked plane, 90 miles southeast of Nome, Alaska, yesterday uncovered Borland's flying helmet and gloves, but found no trace of the bodies.

The plane, lost Nov. 9, while Eklund was attempting a flight to the far trading ship Nanuk, ice bound at North Cape, was located last Saturday by Pilot Joe Crosson and Harold Gilliam while on an aerial scouting trip from the Nanuk. The plane was badly damaged and its contents scattered over a wide area. Seven men were dispatched to the scene of the wreck from the Nanuk to begin digging away the ice and packed snow which all but covered the plane. Two more men were taken to the wreck yesterday from the Russian supply ship Stavropol, which is also locked in the ice at North Cape. The firmness of the ice and snow has rendered it impossible to make much progress in the search.

Bodies Probably Eaten
The theory was advanced here by persons familiar with the Alaskan wastes that the bodies might never be recovered as the country is overrun by wolves and other prowling animals. Ole Eklund, father of the aviator, was scheduled to arrive in Seattle today from Hatton, North Dakota, the family home. He had not decided whether to wait there for the recovery of the body or to proceed to Fairbanks, Alaska, the last messages from him said.

Memorial Arrangements
Memorial arrangements were completed here for reception of the bodies when they arrived here, should they be recovered. Public memorial services are planned in honor of the dead aviators, both of whom were widely known throughout the north.

Sultan's Heirs Get \$50,000,000

NEW YORK, Jan. 31. (AP)—A London dispatch to the New York Times today said that after a five-year legal battle nine surviving widows and 13 children of Abdul Hamid Sultan of Turkey, who was deposed in 1909, have obtained \$50,000,000 from the ruler's \$1,500,000,000 estate.

Greece, it was reported in London, offered \$50,000,000 to Abdul's former harem favorites, now living in poverty in various cities of Europe. The Aegean Financial Trust, Ltd., of London, hopes to get for them \$100,000,000 from Iraq.

Abdul, who died in prison in 1918, was said by some to be the richest man in the world. A number of British and American financiers have backed the contention of his heirs that confiscation of his properties during and after the world war was illegal. Greece's offer concerns properties acquired from Turkey under post war treaties.

NO DEATH PENALTIES
VALPARAISO—Chile has abandoned its death penalty and life imprisonment as punishment for crimes. In place of it is a minimum imprisonment sentence of 20 years. It is specified, however, that a murderer will not be released at the end of 20 years unless he "has proved his regeneration and his right to live once more in the society of his fellow beings."

PASTOR FACES SERIOUS COUNT FOR SHOOTING

Attempted Murder May Be Charge Filed at Mendota, Ill.

OTTAWA, Ill., Jan. 31 (AP)—Arraignment of the Rev. James A. Wilson, 60-year-old pastor of the Mendota, Ill., Methodist church, on preliminary charges of attempted murder today awaited word of the condition of Ames Elliott, church janitor shot and wounded by the pastor.

Wilson disputed Elliott and his wife in a dispute Wednesday at the Elliott home in Mendota; then, he returned to his home and attempted suicide.

Elliott's Condition Serious
Although the wounds of none of the three at first were regarded as serious, State's Attorney Russell O. Hanson, of LaSalle county, said today that Elliott's condition was worse and that arraignment on the formal charges filed yesterday would be held up pending a report from Elliott's physician.

Regardless of the outcome of the preliminary hearing, the state's attorney said he would bring the case before the grand jury.

Letter Causes Trouble
Details of the letter, written by Wilson to a widow in his congregation and obtained by Elliott, were made public by State's Attorney Hanson. It was Wilson's demand of this letter from Elliott that resulted in the shooting.

Subject Matter Vague
Vague as to subject matter, the letter in part followed: "This asks your forgiveness. The matter has worried me more than anything else in my life. I have made a mistake."

"I wouldn't have been human if I had not and I won't be right with God until you forgive me. I have gone to Chicago to see a physician. While there I intended to end it all but couldn't meet my maker without your forgiveness."

It was signed "Wilson." Removed from the Mendota hospital, Wilson was in the county jail; his two scalp wounds were not serious.

Heavy Snowfall In Capital Recalls Disaster of 1922

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31. (AP)

—Washington's heaviest snowfall in eight years found the capital's residents eager today to believe the weather man's promise of fair weather and rising temperatures.

Mercury Falls Also
Although the snow, which had fallen continuously since before midnight, ceased by dusk yesterday, and the let-up was welcomed by the hundreds of men working with plows, scrapers and shovels to clear the streets. The mercury, however, started on a downward course, and ran well below the freezing mark.

Numerous Accidents
Aside from the cost of clearing the streets, inconvenience to the thousands of government workers, and President Hoover himself experienced, school children and others was the chief toll charged against the snow storm. A number of accidents were reported by motorists and pedestrians, but few were at all serious.

Disaster Recalled
Eight years ago this week a 28-inch snow caved in the roof of the Knickerbocker moving picture theatre, with a loss of 98 lives. Householders yesterday and today responded to a warning by local officials to clear their roofs quickly.
