Today's Markets

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 5. (A. P.)—Egg and butter quotations were steadier today than they have been for some time. Demand has shown much improvement.

All country meats and chicken prices have been reduced to by a leading produce company. Supplies were reported as unusually liberal.

Reviewing the fruit and vegetable situation, the Portland bureau of the United States department of agriculture says:
"Arrival of over 20 cars of potatoes resulted in an over-supply on the Portland wholesale market, and sales to retailers, although at unchanged levels, were on a decidedly unsettled market. A few carlot sales to jobbers were made at sacrifice prices. Liberal boat and rail deliveries to California points relieved the oversupply somewhat."

"Much California produce is of only fair quality now, as a result of rainy and otherwise unfavorable growing conditions during January. Cabbage, spinach, beets, and turnips of No. 1 quality are unavailable. Prices of these items are generally lower, due to quality. Cauliflower supplies are liberal, and No. 1 stock has declined to \$1.25-1.30 per crate. Paget Sound hothouse rhubarb arrivals continue to increase, and prices continue to decline."

"Supplies of unclassified and orchard-run apples are being rapidly cleaned up by peddlers, and fruit-stand operators who are resuming activities."
