Vast Volume of Road Work to Be Done in Oregon in 1930-31

Provided congress makes the necessary appropriation giving more money for highway construction, there will be a tremendous amount of road work under way in Oregon this year and next, according to C. E. Gates of Medford, member of the state highway commission, who was in Portland yesterday, says the Oregonian.

When the commission meets February 27 we shall open bids on a whole of a lot of road work," said Commissioner Gates "and if the government makes the appropriation now being asked for the commission will carry on even more extensively. A tentative list of projects, contingent on the increased appropriations, was arranged at the January session of the commission. What we would like to see is a greater amount of money permitted for co-operation. One of the bills before congress permits participation up to \$2000 a mile, but that isn't enough
