### Arrival of Coaching Staff Revives Old Fighting Spirit

SEATTLE, Feb. 7. (AP)—After a short lull, Seattle has again taken on a football atmosphere, with the arrival of "Cotton" Wilcox and "Pest" Welch from Purdue university.

They are to help Washington's new head coach, Jimmy Phelan, in the construction of the Husky football team this year. Wilcox, former freshman mentor at Purdue, will handle the varsity back field for two years. Welch, an All-American end on the champion Bojiackers eleven last fall, will take charge of the Washington freshmen.

**Phelan Arrives Soon**  
Phelan will be returning to Seattle soon to establish his home and get down to work. He will likely bring two more assistants with him. It was the belief for some time that Heartley Anderson, head coach at St. Louis, would be one of them.

Since Phelan's return to LaFayette, Ind., reports have been current that Anderson might sign with Notre Dame as assistant to Knute Rockne. Hope is still held out at Washington that Anderson will come west to handle the line for Phelan.

### Fourth Coach Coming

The fourth assistant will likely be announced in a few days. One man under consideration is a former All-American player at Notre Dame.

If Phelan doesn't accomplish anything else he will have added a lot of "color" to the Washington coaching staff.

### Phelan Likes Color

Speaking of color, the latest information to sift into Seattle about Phelan is that the Washington footballers will probably be outfitted in brilliant satin pants. Phelan believes in showmanship, and that would be one way of carrying it out. Purdue won the "Big Ten" title last fall in satin pants.

No wonder Washington's new coach has requested Earl Campbell, graduate manager, to turf the stadium floor. He wouldn't want to spoil the show right at the start on a muddy day.

## EVANS CALLS RAY SCHALK HIS GREATEST CATCHER

Kling, Bresnahan, Gibson, Criger, Archer Rated Best Old-Timers

The 10 greatest catchers of the last 25 years, to my way of thinking, would be made up about equally of old-timers and present-day stars.

For my old-timers I would name Johnny Kling of the famous Chicago Cubs, Roger Bresnahan of McGraw's New York Giants, George Gibson, who starred for the Pirates when Fred Clarke was turning out great teams for Pittsburgh, and Lou Criger of the Boston Red Sox and Jimmy Archer, who came to the front with the Chicago Cubs as Johnny Kling started to slip.

Of the present-day stars I rate Mickey Cochrane of the world champion Athletics; Ray Schalk, who gained great fame with the Chicago White Sox; Muddy Ruel of Washington, Steve O'Neill of

Cleveland and Wally Schang, who after playing with Boston, New York and St. Louis is back again with the Athletics.

This list would make six American Leaguers and four National Leaguers, with the former having the edge as to the modern stars and the latter showing the way as to the old-timers.

It might seem that I am showing partiality to the American League as to the modern stars, but such a thing is farthest from my thoughts. It just seems to me that the American League has been a bit more fortunate in the last 10 years as to catching.

When I broke into the American League as an umpire back in 1906 all the outstanding catchers in the two major leagues were good-sized chaps. At that time, it was my thought that one very necessary asset of the star catcher was a husky physique.

Lou Criger, a great catcher of those days, was one of the few exceptions. Criger was quite tall but far from sturdy, yet he could do plenty of work and had a tough pitching staff to handle. Other great catchers of that period were Roger Bresnahan, Johnny Kling and George Gibson. Other husky receivers, not as outstanding as the trio mentioned, were Oscar Stange and Charley Schmidt of Detroit, Ed Sweeney of New York, Eddie Ainsmith of Washington, Chief Myers of the New York Giants and others too numerous to mention.

It was not until around 1912 that I became thoroughly convinced that a six-foot physique, totting around from 175 to 200 pounds, wasn't at all necessary for a successful career as a big league catcher. Ray Schalk of the Chicago White Sox was the player who changed my entire viewpoint.

About 1912 Billy Sullivan, who had done most of the catching for the Chicago White Sox over a period of about 10 years, began to fade. The Chicago club in an effort to bolster its catching staff had paid the Milwaukee club something like \$15,000, big money in those days. At that time Ed Walsh, famous spitball pitcher of the Chicago White Sox, was at the peak of his game. That the 140-pound Schalk could handle the deceptive spitball delivery of the six-foot, 200-pound Walsh was more or less regarded as a joke by the experts.

It took one game for Schalk to convince the experts to the contrary. He made the catching of Walsh look easy and it was easy for him. Despite his mid-set size, he holds all records for catching endurance. For 11 consecutive years he caught 100 or more games. Shortly after the coming of Schalk, Muddy Ruel, another pint-size receiver, came to the American League and for years he vied with Schalk for the catching honors of the organization.

It is my belief that true greatness can only be established over a long period, in which the player has been a super performer. There are a lot of athletes who flash for a year or two but fail to stand up under the acid test.

## Giant Venetian Gets Nearly \$8,000 a Minute in Fights

NEW YORK, Feb. 7. (AP)—There are no figures to prove it, but the suspicion grows that Primo Carnera, Venetian carpenter, will be the highest paid athlete in the United States within almost as short a time as it takes to tell it.

**Kayoes Owens**  
The giant Italian heavyweight knocked out Cowboy Billy Owens, Cherokee Indian from Guthrie, Oklahoma, in three minutes and 25 seconds of fighting at Newark last night, and boosted his total earnings in America to somewhere between \$40,000 and \$45,000.

Carnera has made three ring appearances since he came to this country, and knocked out three men in total ring time of five minutes, 22 seconds. That makes his earnings average approximately \$8,000 for every minute he spent in the ring.

**Kayo Comes Easy**  
Owens made a better showing than either of Carnera's previous opponents, although that may have been because the Italian was inclined to clown his way through the first round. The Italian knocked out Big Boy Peterson in

1 minute, 10 seconds of fighting in his first match here, and KO'd Elsiear Ritonx of Canada in 47 seconds at Chicago last Friday night. Owens lasted 3 minutes, 25 seconds.

**8000 Sees Fight**  
Eight thousand persons jammed their way into the Newark armory and watch Carnera abandon his usual formula of getting his man as quickly as possible. The ambulating Alp moved about the ring with great speed, boxing with Owens, wrestling his man around in the clinches when he wasn't blocking all the punches the Red Man aimed at him. Toward the end of the round Carnera sent home several hard punches to the head and body, but Owens took them without flinching.

**Uses Both Hands**  
As the second round opened, Primo landed both hands heavily on the Indian's head. Owens's knees buckled and he went down on his shoulders as a heavy right caught him on the chin. The count of ten found Owens writhing on the floor and Carnera a victor in his third straight match. Carnera weighed 274; Owens, 220.

One, two or three good years do not make for greatness in big league baseball.

If I were to select the greatest catcher of the 10 I have named, I feel that I would give the honor to Ray Schalk. He did not have a great arm, but he was tough to steal on because he had a master mind. Nine times out of 10 he would pick the proper spot for his pitch out. He wasn't a good hitter, but in the pinch was mighty dangerous. However, he came close to being the perfect receiver. He was grace personified back of the bat, raised his pitchers beautifully, was without a peer in catching foul flies and no catcher in all baseball ever put the ball on the runner better than Schalk. He was mighty smart.

Mickey Cochrane has much more natural ability, but he may go as far as has Schalk to rate with him. Cochrane has a much better arm, is a far better batter and several steps faster than Schalk, but will he perform over a dozen or more years as consistently as did Schalk? That remains to be seen.

**WINS CHAMPIONSHIP**  
SEATTLE, Feb. 7. (AP)—Wallace Lindley of Mount Vernon, Wash., won the Pacific Northwest amateur three cushion billiard championship here last night from Jerry White of Seattle, 50 to 48, in a playoff match. The contest lasted 84 innings.
