

INVESTMENT CO TAKES VALLEY S. AND L. STOCK

Retain A. W. Schaupp as
Counsel for Guardian
Interests Here

Purchase of the reserve stock of the Klamath Valley Savings and Loan association by the Mortgage Investment company of Portland was announced today by officials of the investment company.

The effect of the transaction is to place the operations and control of the Klamath Valley Savings and Loan association with the Guardian Building and Loan company, a Portland company, who recently opened a branch office in Klamath Falls in the Newberry building. Hereafter the Klamath Valley association will have its quarters in the Guardian offices.

Arthur W. Schaupp, who has been president of the local association, will serve the Guardian interests in Klamath Falls as attorney. The merger with the Guardian interests will prove of great benefit to the Klamath Valley depositors, Mr. Moltner, of the Guardian company stated, as the entire resources of the Guardian company whose affiliated interests now exceed \$1,500,000 are behind the Klamath Valley contract.

Ask Business Transfer
Members of the Klamath Valley association are requested to transfer their business at the office of the Guardian company in this city at 829 Main street. Mrs. Gladys Douthett is now secretary and Jay S. Moltner, Portland, president.

Judge R. W. Sawyer of Bend, R. S. Hamilton, Bend, E. E. Fitzwater and Guy Neely of Portland are the directors.

The assets of the Klamath Valley association totalled about \$50,000.

Coincident with the announcement of the acquisition of the control of the Klamath Valley association, Mr. Moltner announced that the Astoria Savings and Loan association of Astoria, Oregon, had been made a member of the Guardian chain. The assets of the Astoria company amounted to more than \$100,000. This will also be under control of the Mortgage Investment company. The following associations: The Guardian Building and Loan, Fidelity Savings and Loan, Wilmette Building and Loan, Investors Building and Loan, Klamath Valley Building and Loan, La Grande Finance Agency, in addition to seven other building and loan associations, covering almost the entire state.

Coast Guard at Coos Bay Starts Search for Men

MARSHFIELD, Ore., Feb. 8, (AP)—Coast guard and private launches today were prepared to set out in search for the bodies of Captain Louis Peterson, 27, and Andrew Froyem, both of Coos Bay, who have been missing since the fishing launch Dawn was caught in a gale off Bandon Bar, 35 miles south of here, late Thursday.

Men Lost Overboard
D. E. Wicks, who with his father-in-law was rescued with the disabled launch late yesterday by the combined Bandon and Coos Bay coast guard crews, advanced the opinion that Froyem was drowned Thursday night when he fell into the water while dropping the anchor after the Dawn's engine had stopped. Wicks said he believed Peterson was drowned when he attempted to rescue Froyem. Both men, he declared, disappeared while he was in the cabin of the vessel attending his sick father-in-law, whose name was not obtained.

Wicks and his father-in-law were rescued after coast guardsmen had sighted the helpless vessel drifting outside the Bandon Bar. They are also residents of Coos Bay.

Needs Not Provided for
"If our policy has been the correct one in the past," he added, "and if nothing has occurred to change the wisdom of that policy, then the Stinson offer, which contemplates the building of at least eleven 6-inch gun cruisers at an additional cost over the fifteen cruiser program of at least \$55,000,000, while giving us substantially parity in the types of ships allowed manifestly does not provide for our American naval needs."

"Should a treaty be negotiated along the line of the Stinson offer, or indeed should any treaty be negotiated, the whole matter will be fully threshed out on the floor of the senate and the committee before any action is taken on ratification."

city of its hoodlum horde was being fashioned by the Chicago Association of Commerce. The membership of the "courage committee," to consist of six men, was to be announced today, with Col. Robert Isham Randolph, president of the association, as its head.

The "courage committee" will take up "immediately" the matter of "rescuing" the city from gangster rule, Col. Randolph said. The members, it was explained, are to be men of known courage, unafraid of the consequences of a determined war on organized criminals.

Procedure Not Clear
The co-operation of the state's attorney and the police department was expected, Col. Randolph said, but the committee did not propose to wait for results. Col. Randolph said the committee had considerable "confidential data" and that it would obtain more.

Nearly 50 holdups were on the complaint books of the city's 42 police stations early today, representing store and street robberies for the night. An unidentified man was found shot dead in a room on South Sangamon street shortly after midnight, and at least one cab driver reported he had been held up and robbed by the "undress bandits," a man and woman, who cover their escape by taking most of the victim's clothing to prevent immediate pursuit. Similar robberies have occurred for the past week.

preclude employment of prohibition law violators. The amendment was rejected but in response to a question by Representative Colton, republican, Utah as the needs for the amendment Laguardia said:

"I want to present a situation which exists in the state of Washington in Puget Sound, where you have administrators of prohibition who are violating the law and when the department of justice tried to interfere a great statesman in the other body and a foremost champion of prohibition pulled the department of justice off. This is the kind of situation we are trying to prevent."

Jones Denies Charge
Off the floor Laguardia told newspapermen he referred to Senator Jones, republican.

Informed of Laguardia's statements, Senator Jones said he had "never asked the department of justice to stop any investigation and knew of no administrator who had committed a crime."

"I would think, as a matter of courtesy to me," he added, referring to Laguardia, "that he would see if there was any truth in a statement of that kind before he made it."

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JOURNALISTS HOLD MEETING

Spencer Says Reporter's
Information Is Secret
Many Speak

paper reporters should be privileged by law to withhold confidential sources of news when testifying in court, Carlton Spencer, of the university law school, declared today in an address before the 12th annual Oregon press conference.

C., case in which five Washington Times reporters were made the victims of contempt proceedings and told 150 newspaper men attending the conference that such action was not in accord with the generally recognized fact that reporters were in much the same position, in regard to the confidential information they possess, as are lawyers, clergymen and physicians.

Other speakers during the afternoon were Earl Buntline, Portland; Glenn Radabaugh, Roseburg; Simeon Winch, Oregon Journal, Portland; John B. Long, California Editorial association, and John Henry Nash, San Francisco.

A resolution was passed complimenting E. E. Brodie, publisher of the Oregon City Enterprise, on his appointment as minister to Finland, and an informal discussion of newspaper problems was held at a no-host banquet for more than 100 state editors. A second banquet, one of the most important features of the conference, was held tonight.

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 8 (AP)—Aaron M. Frank, nationally known Portland horse fancier, announced today the purchase of Harbrough Fascination from Robert W. Jay, breeder of Nottingham Road, London. The horse is claimed to be the finest harness animal in the world.
