HUSKIES AND U. S. C. IN LINE FOR LEADERS

Both Teams Have Good Leads in Respective Divisions

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 10 (AP)—University of Washington continues to lead the northern division of the Pacific coast basketball conference. By winning both week-end games from University of Idaho, the Huskies were firmly entrenched in first place with excellent prospects of again winning the championship.

Oregon Teams Close Oregon and Oregon State divided a two-game series, the Webfoot winning at Corvallis, 34 to 27, but lost the second at Eugene by the close margin of 29 to 35. At one time in the second game Oregon held a lead of 35 to 16, but the Orangemen staged a desperate rally in the last five minutes to score 13 points, while Oregon was held to a single field goal and one converted foul throw. Both Oregon teams take the road this week. Oregon to play Washington State at Pullman Friday and Saturday, while Oregon State plays Idaho at Moscow the same nights. Washington State drew a bye last week and plays four games this week, two against the Huskies and two with Oregon.

U. S. C. LEADS SOUTH

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 10 (AP)—The southern division basketball race of the Pacific coast conference has narrowed down to Southern California and California, but the Stanford and University of California at Los Angeles quintets will have a large hand in deciding which team will take the championship.

Stanford Losses Southern California handed the Stanford five a 30 to 24 defeat Saturday night to retain its place at the top of the standings with a record of five games won and two lost. Meanwhile, however, the California quintet was taking a double victory from U. S. L. A. to advance into second place with 4 won and 3 lost, and to get within halting distance of the leading Trojans.

Chance for Tie Both California and Southern California have two games left on their season's schedule, the Bears taking on the Stanford Cardinals in both encounters, and the Trojans meeting the U. C. L. A. Bruins twice. If the Bears succeed in winning both games from Stanford, they will have a chance for a tie at the title if U. C. L. A. can rise up and hand their southern rivals a drubbing.

Slattery, Scozza Meet Tonight in Semi-Title Bout

BUFFALO, N. Y., Feb. 10 (AP)—Jimmy Slattery and Lou Scozza, Buffalo boys both, battle 15 rounds here tonight for New York state recognition as light heavyweight champion of the world.

In promising to recognize the winner as successor to the 175-pound title relinquished by Tommy Loughran, the New York State Athletic commission ruled that the winner must defend the title within sixty days against Maxey Rosenberg, clowning battler from Harlem.

Slattery Favored Slattery, an outstanding light heavyweight for several years, is favored over his rugged body-punching rival. "Slats," a clever and extremely fast boxer, figures to outspeed Scozza, although the championship distance of 15 rounds may prove too long for him. Boxing observers recall Slattery's title bout against Loughran here several years ago, when the Buffalo flash outboxed the former champion for ten rounds, but slowed down so much in the last five that Loughran won the decision and retained his title.

Scozza has compiled an impressive record in the last year or so, beating Rosenberg twice, among others. He is not as fast nor so clever a boxer as Slattery, but he is more rugged and punches harder.

Seattle Invites Primo Carnera to Visit Northwest

SEATTLE, Feb. 10 (AP)—Primo Carnera, the biggest man in boxing today, both in weight and interest, may visit the Pacific northwest next month. Arrangements are under way for the leviathan of the heavy weights to make a tour of the Pacific coast, and if he decides to come west, which seems likely, Nate Draxman and Joe Waterman, officials of the National Athletic club, will show the "man mountain" in a Seattle ring.

Waterman, who has already wired Carnera's manager for the Venetian carpenter's services, said that the proposed show would not be any "Max Schmeling exhibition."

No Sparring Match

"Of course Carnera will not meet any Sharkey or Dempsey in Seattle but whoever he is pitted against he will go in the ring to fight," said Waterman. "It won't be any sparring match."

While the proposed tour of Los Angeles, San Francisco, Portland and Seattle is still pending, the club officials have already begun negotiations for a suitable opponent for the 275-pound giant. Their first choice is Long Tom Hawkins, Los Angeles negro, who holds a decision over George Godfrey, Hawkins stands 6 feet, 5 inches and weighs 240 pounds.

Tigers, Pelicans To Play Tonight

A game between the Mills Tigers and the Pelicans of Pelican City, one of the fastest teams in southern Oregon, is scheduled to be held tonight at the Mills Addition school gymnasium. This will be the second game between the two quintets. Race Patrons Go On Rampage and Get Money Back

VINCENNES, France, Feb. 10. (AP)—The race track here today looked as if a tornado had swept it, an appearance caused by the fury of a French racing crowd which didn't like the way yesterday's races were carried out.

Thousands of francs damage was done the track buildings, when an immense Sunday crowd, enraged because five horses were left at the post in the first trotting race on the program, burned Parimutuel barracks, wrecked the grandstands and raided the bars.

Money Refunded

The riot continued for an hour and a half, and was quelled only when police prefect Jean Chlappe took personal charge and ordered the backers of the races to announce that money, both entrance fees and bets, would be refunded. The mob then quieted and lined up at the various gates to get their money back.

Varying fines of from \$20 to \$50 for beating the flag and refusing to return at the call of the starter, were assessed against ten jockeys. There were fifteen horses in the race, five being left behind when the other ten started.

It was Wallowa's third defeat in their last 45 games with eastern Oregon teams. Baker held the lead during the entire game, and only twice did Wallowa threaten to overcome this lead. Three Baker players, Joslin, McKim and Howard, tied for high honors with eight points each.
