"According to the forest service, there are only 23 wolves in Grater national forest. It is the consensus of opinion of those who know that area that Stanley G. Jewett, chief of predatory animal control operations of the government in this state, assisted by the state game commission, should investigate conditions in this abandoned area and restore it to the deer.

"One lone wolf will kill half a dozen beef steers on the range in a day, just for exercise and the sport of it. A pack of the vicious killers can do far more damage. Only a few weeks ago Ted Arner saw wolves on upper Evans creek. He was fortunate to get out of those woods without the loss of some of his valuable cat dogs."—Oregonian.

"SPIRIT" IS SUNDAY TOPIC

"Spirit" was the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday, February 9.

The Golden Text was, "Not by might, nor by the power, but by my spirit, saith the Lord of hosts" (Zech. 4:6).

Among the citations which comprised the Lesson-Sermon were the following from the Bible: "The letter killeth, but the spirit giveth life. . . . Now the Lord is that Spirit; and where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is liberty." (II Cor. 3:6, 17).

The Lesson-Sermon also included the following passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health, with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy: "The baptism of Spirit, washing the body of all the impurities of flesh, signifies that the pure in heart see God and are approaching spiritual life and its demonstration. . . . Denial of the claims of matter is a great step

towards the joys of Spirit, towards human freedom and the final triumph over the body" (pp. 241, 242).
