

SLATTERY NODS SCOZZA IN 15 BRUTAL ROUNDS

Smiling Irishman Wins Nine Rounds, Scozza Takes Five

BUFFALO, N. Y., Feb. 11. (A P.)—Jimmy Slattery of Buffalo is on the top of the light heavyweights today, a champion in the eyes of the New York State Athletic Commission at least, and his reign is certain to last for 60 days. At the end of that time he must defend the crown against Maxey Rosenbloom, the harlequin of Harlem.

Scorza Tough Nut
But for a round or two last night it seemed as though graceful Jimmy, whose third trial was successful would have no worries as to title burden for some time to come. In order to whip Lou Scozza, the home town rival nominated by the commission to determine a successor to the retired Tommy Loughran, Jimmy had to do things within the squared circle he never has been able to accomplish before.

11,000 Saw Fight
When the battle was over and Slattery had survived the stormy thirteenth round as well as a brutal fourteenth session, to come back in the last round and beat Scozza all over the ring, the decision and the plaudits of a crowd of 11,000, one of the largest in Buffalo's history, greeted the new champion. Although one judge voted the contest a draw, with the referee and other judge agreeing on Slattery, newspapermen at the ring-side awarded the smiling Irishman nine rounds with five for Scozza and one even.

Slattery, a veteran despite his 34 years, bid for light heavy-weight title honors first in 1925 but was knocked out by Paul Berlenbach in 11 rounds. Two years ago Jimmy fought Tommy Loughran for the title, but lost the decision in 15 close rounds.

Strangler Wins Bruiser Contest

SEATTLE, Feb. 11. (A P.)—Ed (Strangler) Lewis, former world's heavyweight champion, defeated Howard Cantonwine, Iowa, two out of three falls here last night in a spectacular match. Cantonwine took the first fall with a series of bruising flying punches in the first ten minutes round. Lewis squared the match in the fifth round, when Cantonwine dived out of the ring and knocked himself groggy. Lewis taking the fall with a crushing headlock. Lewis won the final fall in the next round with headlocks.

Chet Willes, Portland traffic cop, wrestler-referee, won a five-round referee decision over Stan Bureoch, Yakima. Neither was able to gain a fall.

Mandell to Defend Title at Chicago

CHICAGO, Feb. 11. (A P.)—Sammy Mandell, world light-weight champion, and Jimmy McLarnin, Vancouver, B. C., welter-weight title contender, will meet in the rubber bout of their feud in the Chicago stadium February 24. The match officially has been announced by Matchmaker Nate Lewis of the stadium.

They will meet at 145 pounds, the same weight as in their last meeting in the stadium, which resulted in a ten-round decision victory for the baby-faced Irishman from the coast. In their first meeting, when McLarnin attempted to lift Mandell's light-weight crown, the latter easily gained the decision in Madison Square Garden, New York.

Actor and Writer Stage Real Fight Without Referee

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 11. (A P.)—John Gilbert, film star, and Jim Tully, writer, today admitted they staged impromptu fistbuffs in a Hollywood cafe several night ago.

"I don't care to talk about it," Gilbert, who with his wife Ina Claire, actress, is spending a week at Palm Springs, said. "I did only what any man would have done under the circumstances."

"I did what you or anybody else would have done if a man had come charging across a room at you," Tully declared. "I got up and knocked him down."

Diners at Ringside
Other diners, who unwittingly had purchased ringside seats with their coffee, described the scene in greater detail.

They said Tully was seated with May Cruise, sister of James Cruise, the director, and Nicholas Kelly, when Gilbert entered with his wife and Sid Grauman. Gilbert shouted something to Tully about an article he had written two years ago in a magazine, in which the actor was mentioned. Tully replied, and after exchanging more words, Gilbert took off his overcoat and charged. Tables were upset, chairs kicked about and Gilbert knocked down. At this point bystanders interfered, and the actor was persuaded to leave, Ina joining him at the door.

Student Conduct At Games Causes Ruffled Feelings

EUGENE, Ore., Feb. 11. (A P.)—Athletic relations between the University of Oregon and Oregon State college threatened to reach the breaking point following actions which revealed an attitude of anger on the part of the Oregon State athletic officials last week end.

At the Oregon-Oregon State game at Corvallis, Paul J. Schissler, director of athletics at the college, is said to have told Tom Stoddard, president of associated students at the university, that if Oregon students didn't behave better at the games all athletic relations would be terminated.

Later, at the game Saturday at Eugene, Virgil Earl, director of athletics at the university, talked to Schissler, who made no mention of his talk with Stoddard. Schissler is said to have denied he had told Stoddard that athletic relations would be severed but Stoddard insisted his allegations against Schissler were true.

Specific charges the Oregon State students claim against the university students are that at a baseball game last spring the Oregon students are said to have paraded before the Oregon State rooters with milk cans. They said apple cores have been thrown at Coach Schissler and at the basketball game here Saturday the Oregon rooters "booed" Buck Grason, Oregon State player, when he was forced off the floor on a personal foul.

Schissler is said to have called a meeting of the Oregon State student body, at which he told them not to "boo" decisions. Stoddard said. After the game the Oregon State students are alleged to have told Stoddard that that was the way games should be handled.

Hack Served With Papers in Big Suit

CHICAGO, Feb. 11. (A P.)—Hack Wilson, pugnaous cub outfielder, was ordered to appear in superior court tomorrow to answer the \$20,000 damage suit filed by Edward Young, a milkman, whom Wilson attacked at Wrigley field in 1928 for making "insulting remarks" to him. Wilson was served with papers as he stepped off the train.

ARMY-NOTRE DAME TO PLAY IN WINDY CITY

Scholastic Reasons Are Given for Change in Game This Year

NEW YORK, Feb. 11. (A P.)—The 1930 renewal of that classic of the gridiron, the Army-Notre Dame football game, becomes Chicago's gain and New York's loss.

For scholastic reasons, the Rev. Charles L. O'Donnell, president of Notre Dame, asked that the game be transferred from the Yankee stadium, New York, to Soldier Field, Chicago. After a long conference yesterday, army officers reluctantly agreed. The contest is scheduled for Saturday, November 25.

Western Game Factor
Father O'Donnell pointed out that under Notre Dame's original schedule the Ramblers would play the Army in New York November 29, and then travel to the West Coast to meet Southern California at Los Angeles December 6. When no other solution for Notre Dame's difficulties could be found, army representatives agreed to the change.

The Army representatives denied that any other factor but the scholastic one had led to the transfer of the game. After the last Notre Dame game here, considerable ill feeling developed over the alleged failure of the New York police to provide an adequate escort for the cadet players on their way to the stadium the day of the game. Underlying the dispute with city officials, it was hinted at that time, was dissatisfaction in some quarters over the manner in which tickets for the game were distributed.

Change for 1930 Only
The change is for the 1930 season only. The 1931 and 1932 games will be played in New York as usual. Army and Notre Dame have played annually since 1913, with the exception of the world war period. All the games have been played either at West Point or New York.

Huskies Tighten Grip on Pennant

PULLMAN, Wash., Feb. 11. (A P.)—University of Washington's basketball quiet tightened its grip on the northern division conference leadership here last night when it took a heart-breaking game from Washington State, 24 to 21. The Staters held a lead of 15 to 15 a few minutes before the end of the game. McLarny, Washington State forward, was high scorer, with nine points, followed closely by McClary, husky center, with eight. The two teams met again tonight and if Washington wins, the Huskies will clinch the northern division championship.

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Clifford Working to Adjust Differences Between Oregon And California Game Laws

Efforts of Harold Clifford, state game warden are being directed towards the adjustment of California laws so as to permit Oregon hunters to cross the line and take ducks and geese from Tule Lake. Recently the California officials unearthed an almost ancient law which prohibited the exportation of game birds from their state. No great effort is being made to enforce it, but would it rigidly enforced several thousand Oregon sportsmen would be banned from hunting in the Tule Lake district. It is estimated that \$30,000 of Oregon money goes annually into the California treasury for non-resident hunting licenses. Enforcement of the law would eliminate this sum from the California game protection fund. Mr. Clifford has pointed out that if Oregon was in the mood to work a hardship on California sportsmen it could practically bar them from hunting in the Tule Lake district, as it is almost necessary for them to come into Oregon before reaching the lake.

It is expected that an adjustment will be made so that neither the California hunters nor those of Oregon will be handicapped in their efforts to bag game.

Planting Coast Streams
Matt Ryckman, superintendent of hatcheries for the state game commission has returned to Portland after spending several days at the Cedar Creek hatchery in Tillamook county starting the planting of fish in the coast streams. During the next few days approximately one half million steelhead and cutthroat trout will be liberated in the Nehalem, Miami, Killehe, Wilson, Trask, Tillamook, Nestucca and other streams.

The work of planting these streams is being carried on under the supervision of Henry Heisel.

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Brandon Upsets Howard at Last

The big upset came last evening in the three-cushion billiard tournament at the Klamath Recreation. Howard, who had lost but one match, and who was expected to go clean the rest of the way, lost a close and exciting game to Brandon, the man who came so near winning each week, but old man "hard luck" seemed to have it on him just at the crucial moment, and the best he had to date was 2 wins and 4 defeats.

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The original purpose of special taxes upon insurance was to maintain state supervision of the business, but such supervision uses but four cents of each dollar, and the balance—about \$77,000,000—goes into the general funds of the states.

These special taxes of the state and the taxes which insurance companies pay in common with all other business concerns, and owners of property, as well as their substantial taxes to the Federal Government, are factors in the cost of fire insurance.

The Chamber of Commerce of the United States has adopted the following resolution:

"... Special State Taxes now levied on Policyholders through insurance companies should not be considered as a source of general revenue, but should be reduced to the total in each state which will adequately support such state's departmental supervision

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
