WANT CITY LIMITS TO INCLUDE EAST SECTION

Residents Petition Council; Bus Line To Start Operations April 1; Urge Harbor Survey

It was reported at a meeting of the city council last night that the residents of Dixon addition wish to come into the municipal limits of Klamath Falls for sanitary reasons. Francis Olds, chairman of the finance committee, suggested that property holders in the addition be requested to have their preliminary money ready for a system in order that work could start immediately after election.

Mayor T. B. Walters stated that, according to E. H. Chilcote, the other additions and the terrace east of the city will do doubt petition the city to be included in the boundary, and he believed the city should refuse to allow only one addition to enter.

Urge Harbor Survey
A resolution was passed urging upon the board of engineers for rivers and harbors and Senator Charles L. McNary the necessity of an immediate survey of the proposed Crescent City harbor.

Adopt Pedestrian Law
The ordinance which makes it unlawful for pedestrian traffic to be obstructed by articles placed on the sidewalks was adopted.

Nine Permits Granted
Building permits, which have been low the past few weeks, showed a slight rise last night when nine, aggregating \$24,750 were granted.

Petition for Paving
Five property holders petitioned for the paving of Ewauna street from Pine to High, High from Ewauna to Cedar street and Cedar from High to Pine, including intersections. The petition was referred to the street committee and city engineer.

Who Pays for Dogs
Councilman Richmond desired to know who pays to have dead dogs hauled away which are found lying in the streets of the city, and whose owners are not known. The mayor informed him that the city pays for such things.

Petition for Light
A petition signed by six property owners to have a light installed at the corner of School and Washington streets was referred to the light committee.

To Check Companies
The police judge was authorized by the council, upon the recommendation of the finance committee, to look up companies in the city who should be paying franchise taxes.

Dogs Again
It was pointed out by Councilman Olds that unlicensed dogs in the county will be taken care of on account of sheep, but he did not believe the county officers would enforce the license law in the city under the state law recently passed which places the taxing of dogs in the jurisdiction of county officials. Attorney Schaupp said the matter had been taken out of the city's hands completely, and he did not believe anything could be done about it. However, the police judge was authorized to take up the matter of collecting dog taxes within the city with the county assessor and see if some agreement cannot be reached.

Grant Licenses
Upon recommendation of the police committee, licenses to op-

erate were granted the Lawrence Cigar store, Eagle Pool hall, Fred Duke's taxi service, Tex rooms, Crater rooms, Imperial hotel, Anchor hotel, Means and Greenfield, John Gray, and Arthur B. Keenan, plumbers. Other applications turned in last night were referred to the police committee.

Amendment Not Approved

The city attorney informed the council that the lighting amendment passed by the council when the project for a new Main street lighting system was under discussion had never been approved by T. Winfree, McCulloch and Schuler of Portland, and he did not want to have lighting bonds issued and then to have fault found with the amendment. The Klamath avenue lighting project, which is being planned, brought the matter to an issue. A transcript of the amendment was ordered sent at once to the attorneys.

Discuss Sewer Unit

Considerable time was taken up in discussion of the 14th sewer unit, which takes in California avenue and vicinity. Although it has been the policy of the city not to require preliminary money on sewer projects, Mayor Walters stated this will be a large project which includes much vacant property. He believed the city should be constrained to serve the people in districts and then add to it as other sections in unit are paved. C. C. Kelley, city engineer, estimated that if this plan is carried out only about \$500 in preliminary money would be needed. He stated the unit will cost about \$100 per lot.

Wants Park Space

In behalf of the city park board, O. D. Matthews asked that additions wishing to enter the city limits, observe the law that one "lock out of every ten is to be provided for a park. City Attorney Schaupp explained that this did not refer to additions coming into the city, but to new subdivisions being platted within five miles of the municipal limits.

Recurring Matters

Upon questions from several councilmen, it was learned that the bus line granted a franchise recently is to start operation April 1 with new equipment; that the gas company granted a franchise has six months to start construction work, and that action on the new charter plans has been taking so much time of city officials that little has been done toward completing the zoning ordinance.

FEDERAL FARM BOARD LOANS TO DAIRYMEN

Announcement, in the Official Record of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, of new dairy loans by the Federal Farm Board, have been made as follows:

1. The National Cheese Producers Federation (Co-operative), Plymouth, Wisconsin, a loan of \$152,000 for merchandising its products, and another not exceeding \$100,000 supplementing loans from the Federal Intermediate credit bank, St. Paul, to enable the association to advance to producer-members up to but not exceeding 75 per cent of the market value of their commodity;

2. The Valley of Virginia Milk Producers Association, Harrisonburg, Virginia, \$50,000 for expansion of physical facilities, secured by first mortgage covering all properties of the association.

In addition, an announcement appeared in an Oregon daily newspaper that the Lower Columbia River Milk Producers Association had negotiated a loan to be secured by first mortgage covering all property of the association.

As far as we know these are the first dairy loans granted by the Federal Farm Board to co-operative marketing dairy associations of the United States. It also indicates that the board might not be adhering strictly to their original policy of making loans only through national co-operatives, but that loans might be made direct to regional co-operatives that are particularly well stabilized and successfully managed and directed.
