Today's Markets

PORTLAND, Feb. 12. (AP)—The egg and butter markets closed steady Tuesday, and went into the Lincoln birthday holiday with supply and demand fairly well balanced.

Reviewing the fruit and vegetable markets, the Portland bureau of the United States department of agriculture says:

"Volume of fruit and vegetable trading on the wholesale market this week is the greatest registered in several months. Carlot arrivals over the week-end totalled 36 cars; 15 to 18 cars are being unloaded daily, for immediate movement to retailers; and total track holdings of all commodities are in the neighborhood of 80 cars.

"Shipments of lettuce and cauliflower are still heavy, but not disastrously so, as was threatened last week; and both commodities are in stronger market positions, with shipping point prices slightly higher.

"Potato movement from the Yakima valley was heavy yesterday, with 72 cars—apparently in response to the flurry of buying activity there, over the week-end.

"Shipments of hot-house rhubarb are reported at their season's peak now, and further declines are hardly expected. Demand for rhubarb, by consumers, has been slow."

Butter, eggs, milk (butterfat), poultry, country meats, onions, potatoes, wool, hay, tons, cactus bark and hops, steady and unchanged.

CARRIER EXAMINATION

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced an examination to fill the position of rural carrier at Bonanza. The examination will be held in Klamath Falls and receipt of applications will close on March 7, 1930. The date of examination will be stated on admission cards mailed to applicants after the close of receipt of applications, and will be about ten days after that date. The salary of a rural carrier on a standard daily route of 24 miles is \$1,800 per annum, with an additional \$30 per mile per annum for each mile or fraction thereof in excess of 24 miles. Certain allowances are also made for the maintenance of equipment.

The examination will be open only to citizens who are actually domiciled in the territory of the post office where the vacancy exists and who meet the other requirements set forth in Form 1977. Both men and women, if

qualified, may enter this examination. Applications must be on file with the commission at Washington, D. C., prior to the close of business on the date specified above. At the examination, applicants must furnish unmounted photographs of themselves taken within two years.
