Plenty of Money for Roads

"They'll have more money for roads this year in California than they'll know what to do with, it looks like," says J. S. Sawyer, of the Multnomah. "California will have \$50,000,000 for highways to be spent this year. Of course, California is a large state and has thousands of miles of highways, but you can see what can be done with such a large sum of money." Mr. Sawyer is manager of the asphalt department of the Shell Oil company. For several years he was a division engineer of the Oregon state highway and was one of the most valuable members of the organization. He resigned last year to organize the asphalt department of the oil company. Mr. Sawyer, whose territory is now covering the west, declares that Oregon has received full value for its money in road building and that the system is one of which the state may well be proud. His division included the Oregon coast highway at the time of his resignation and he expressed pleasure at the prospect of this road being completed within a reasonable time. Mr. Sawyer is in the city to attend the meeting of the highway engineers who are in conference considering oiling problems for the next year.—Oregonian.

Works For Oregon

The man in charge of the oiling program on the highways of Oregon is R. H. Baldock, who is registered at the Multnomah from Salem. As a division engineer, Mr. Baldock experimented with treating macadam with oil in eastern Oregon. He continued experimenting until he evolved a method that has attracted the attention of highway departments in other states and the Oregon method of oiling is now being copied, just as is the Oregon system of issuing bonds for highway construction. Mr. Baldock is now in command of the maintenance department and he works out the oiling program and argues it out with the highway commission. When oiling was first undertaken there were howls from motorists wherever the substance was used, but every community now provided with hard-surface pavement gives the highway department for oil treatment to lay the dust. The oil is not a substitute for hard-surface, but it is a preservative of macadam roads.—Oregonian.

Butter and Egg Men Propose to Educate Public

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 13. (A P)—To make the consuming public "butter conscious," delegates to the Pacific states butter, egg, cheese and poultry association convention yesterday decided to conduct a nationwide campaign after reports indicated a decrease in the consumption of butter.

Butter Left In Storage

At the end of the past year, officers of the association said, there was surplus of nearly 50,000,000 pounds of butter in warehouses throughout the country. This indicated that there had been a decrease in per capita consumption as the increase in production for the year was about in the same ratio as the increase in population.

Go After Farmers

It developed during the concluding session of the organization yesterday that inhabitants of an agricultural country must carry much of the blame for the decrease in butter consumption. Therefore the publicity campaign to make the public "butter conscious" will be carried to the farmer's door.

A plan for developing a large and lucrative trade in Pacific coast eggs in the orient will be presented to the association by E. J. Dixon, representing the producers' organization of Oregon.

STUDENTS AND FACULTY GO TO COLLEGE FETE

UNDERWEIGHT DUE TO TASTELESS DIET

Often True in the Case of Children

"Get correct weight on children," says the doctor. For the underweight child is more subject to disease than the one up to standard. However, the old saying about horses being "led to water" can be paraphrased to describe underweight children—you can lead them to food but you can't always make them eat.

In such cases, the mother or the cook must take extra pains to make the foods in the child's diet inviting and palatable. Sugar is a great aid in this respect. A dash of sugar on essential vegetables as carrots, peas, cabbage and spinach improves their flavor to a marked degree. A leading child specialist in Pennsylvania invariably suggests that tomatoes be sweetened to taste.

This recommendation should be followed even in the case of adults who are underweight. In addition to using sugar on vegetables, a sprinkling on fresh and stewed fruits, also cereal, makes them more tasty and is dietetically correct. It must also be remembered that nourishing desserts such as custards, puddings and ice creams are invaluable. Most foods are more delicious and nourishing with sugar. The Sugar Institute.

GUNMEN SLAY MAN AND GIRL

Gang Warfare Breaks Out On Sidewalks Of New York

NEW YORK, Feb. 13. (AP)—An unidentified woman, about 24 years old, and her escort, Carmine Barelli, 30, were shot and killed in the Bronx early today by four men who early from an automobile, fired two bullets into each and reentering the car drove away.

The woman was fashionably gowned and wore two diamond rings. There were no marks of identification on her person. Barelli died a few minutes after the shooting and the woman while being taken to Morrisania hospital.

Pair Was Walking

The two were walking in Wood Avenue, the Bronx, when the four men alighted from their machine. They attempted to flee in opposite directions but the gunmen chased them and shot them down.

Employees of a nearby garage told the police the man and woman had proceeded about 50 feet

from a garage where he had stored his car when the automobile with the four men drew up to the curb beside them.

Both Tried To Flee

As the men stepped from the machine, the woman screamed and started to run north, while Barelli fled in the opposite direction. Two of the men chased the woman, who after running a few yards tripped and fell. They then fired four shots at her, one of which entered the back of her neck and the other between the shoulder blades.

Her screams attracted a negro washer who had admitted the couple to the Sherman garage a few minutes earlier. He ran to the street, picked her up and placed her in a taxicab. She was dead when examined by a hospital surgeon.

Meanwhile, the other two gunmen chased Barelli to the entrance of another garage where they fired five shots at him. One pierced his chin and the other his chest. A garage employee called an ambulance, but Barelli died before its arrival. At the Sherman garage it was said Barelli had been storing his car there for the last two weeks under the name of "C. Barelli."
