

INDIANS PLAN DISCUSSION OF PROBLEM SOON

Klamath Tribe Members To Hold Session On Saturday

Members of the Klamath tribe of Indians will meet Saturday at 10 a. m. at the Williamson river church to discuss questions vital, at the present time, to the tribe, it was learned yesterday.

The meeting is scheduled to last several hours and it is believed that several resolutions will be introduced relative to the matters which have been brought up before the senate committee on Indian affairs in Washington, D. C., by members of the tribe.

Through sources which have asked that they not be mentioned, The News learned last night that all members of the Klamath tribe are not in sympathy with the actions of Mr. and Mrs. Wade Crawford who are now in Washington, D. C., and who represent part of the younger members of the tribe.

Some of the tribal members feel that all sides of the controversies which have been raised have not been thoroughly discussed and it is expected that not only the matter of the administration of the reservation will be brought up Saturday but that other bills pending in congress and relative to the Indian affairs will be discussed by the members of the tribe.

One bill which is now in congress would make the national forests on the reservation perpetual, would provide for reforestation and would make it a separate unit for that purpose.

It is also expected that the congress will discuss the letting of leases to sheepmen and that it will be mentioned that unless the grazing permits are issued soon that a large revenue to the Indians will be lost and the tribal payment decreased this year.

Women of the tribe will provide a luncheon at noon, it was understood yesterday, indicating that the conference will last for several hours and that all matters affecting the welfare and financial matters of the tribe, which is one of the richest in the state, will be thoroughly discussed.

Charter Group Is Outlining Plans

Five members of the new city charter committee who are drafting plans for a charter ordinance of the city manager form of government are working daily and expect to make a report before a committee of the whole within a short time.

A definite date for a meeting of the charter committee has not yet been set by W. O. Smith, chairman, who is waiting on the committee. Claude McCulloch, Merle West, John Fikes, Charles Thomas and Walter Waggoner are drawing up the first draft of the proposed charter.

Mayor T. B. Watters, Merle West and Claude McCulloch will meet this evening at the city hall with Rollin Rodolph, an auditor for a San Francisco firm, when the financial end of the charter will be discussed. Mr. Rodolph is at present auditing the city's books.

KLAMATH MAN WITH BIBLICAL LANGUAGE WRITES ON POLITICS

From the pen of a Klamath man comes forth biblical writings regarding the gubernatorial contest within the republican party in Oregon. Because of the interest, the Klamath News reprints the article from George Putnam's Salem Capital Journal.

It appeared under the heading: "CHRONICLES OF SALEM" By Abner of the House of David (W. A. Dezell)
