Lot Beatie Makes Strides in Service

The following article from the Oregon Journal will be of interest to the Klamath Falls residents, since Lot Beatie was a former resident of this city. Mr. Beatie was for several years associated with the Grey Goose sandwich shop, located below Moe's store.

"When A. Lot Beatie left Portland in October, 1928, he was wearing 'elvis' and carrying besides his suitcase, the exhilarating knowledge that he was taking his first step into the army air corps. When he returned Monday to visit his parents and friends, he was wearing the outfit of an army air corps officer and had a 'Lieutenant' in front of his name.

"The transition, of course, was not quite as fast as it takes to say it. There were months of hard work until, on February 1, Beatie won his coveted lieutenancy. That done, he took time off for a trip home.

"Lieutenant Beatie is a son of Dr. and Mrs. A. L. Beatie of Oregon City. He graduated from the University of Oregon in 1924, spent the next few years around Oregon City, Portland and Klamath Falls, then decided to become a flier. His examination for appointment to the air corps was taken at Pearson field, Vancouver, Wash. On being named, he went to March field, Calif., where he spent eight months in primary training. July 1, 1929, he was transferred to Kelly field, San Antonio, Texas, for advanced training. Assigned to what is known as attack aviation, he spent four months learning it. His reserve lieutenant's commission arrived, and he took an examination for a regular commission. In October, 1929, he went on active duty at Fort Crockett, Galveston, Texas. Then, this month, his commission with its gold shoulder bars arrived.

"Army training is so beneficial and so much fun that I'd hate to think of doing anything else," he said on his arrival here. "I'm in it to stay."

"The flier has had about 400 hours in the air. After several weeks with his parents, he is going back and run the figure higher."

McNary Introduces McCormick Measure

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 13. (A. P.)—The Portland Telegram said today, in a special dispatch from its Washington, D. C., correspondent, that Senator McNary, after conferences with Secretary Wilbur and Bert Haney, representative of Washington settlers, introduced a bill to provide for the sale of the McCormick power site of the Klamath Reclamation Project to the Klamath Irrigation District.

Secretary Wilbur, the paper said, was unwilling to execute a contract of the sale of the reclamation district, but it is believed he will agree to the passage of the proposed legislation which will get the power site for development by the district.
