HOW TO "REDUCE" REDUCING DIETS

The Appetite Will Demand Less Food If Sugar Is Part of the Diet

Too many reducing diets are lacking in satisfying qualities. According to a nationally known food scientist, every reducing diet ought to contain some sugar for the "well-filled" feeling it produces.

Such a use of sugar in the diet means that one can eat the minimum of essential foods and not go away from the table hungry. As far as sugar being fattening, medical science points out that sugar has no more fattening value than other carbohydrates—and far less than fats. The stout people of the world are, by no means, always big sugar eaters. It is the amount of food in general that produces fat—not sugar alone.

An example of a good "reducing" meal that will satisfy the appetite is a generous green salad and a sweet dessert. A consideration of this menu will be of value in planning other meals. The truth of the statement, "A bit of sweet makes the meal complete," will be apparent very quickly.

Sugar as a flavor for vegetables, stewed and fresh fruits, also increases their satisfying qualities and makes the meal enjoyable. There is no need to be unhappy when reducing. Eat less food and enjoy it more. The Sugar Institute.

Current Book Reviews

"Sheila Both Ways," by Joana Cannon

Sheila chose the red wine but wanted the white, too; Dorina, her sister, chose the white. Dorina later wanted the red but knew that it was bad manners to ask for it after having chosen the white.

Sheila is the older of the two motherless Clavering girls. Andrew Clavering, their father, who is a prominent lawyer, is easy going and carefree. Sheila, brought up in an irresponsible manner, at 17 becomes the wife of Douglas Toye and a member of the Toye family which takes her to the life very seriously. In the Toye family a wife effaces herself and her ideas to permit the husband's personality and opinions to rule. Sheila with her gray and charming ways and her irresponsibility is never quite able to become one of the Toyes or to come up to the Toye ideal of a wife although she does have three children.

Just as Sheila is getting adjusted to the staidness of Douglas and accustomed to Toye stolidity, she meets Robert Marston who is as romantic as her father and herself. Sheila is happy until she learns that she cannot have both red wine and white. Again she must choose. Hurt by Toye satisfaction, self-righteousness, and lack of deep feeling and driven by homesickness for her early life, she makes her decision. She realizes now that she cannot have both red wine and white, both safety and adventure.

The novel is not heavy and yet it is well written. The characters are nicely delineated with none too wicked or too perfect. The love story of Dorina who solves her problems of human relationships differently than did Sheila, affords a minor but interesting counter plot.

"A Daughter of the Samurai," by Madame Etsu Sugimoto

A popular magazine on our news stands vouches for a prevailing interest in all kinds of "true" stories but true stories are to be found elsewhere than in these magazines. "A Daughter of the Samurai" is the true story of Etsu Sugimoto who was born in Japan, brought up among the traditions of Japan and the Samurai class, and who later became a modern American woman even to having a profession, being instructor in Japanese language and history at Columbia university.

Madame Sugimoto's early home was in the northern part of Japan where there was not always sunshine and cherry blossoms but snow for many months. She tells about the children's games in the snow and relates incident after incident from her childhood. Many an American woman whose hair was straight when she was a little girl in a day not long past, remembers undergoing the torture of having her straight locks wetted and placed in rag curlers over night in order to compete with the other little girls whose locks were naturally curly. In Japan, on the other hand, hair must be straight and unfortunately Etsu's hair was curly so she had to have the

discomfort of having it made straight by the use of hot tea and scented oils. She tells that during one of these "gluing up" experiences, she rebelled to her nurse and was overheard by her mother who scolded her thus: "Etsu-bo, do you not know that curly hair is like animal's hair. A Samurai's daughter should not be willing to resemble a beast." So poor Etsu, like her little American sister, had to endure much for the sake of prevailing ideas and customs.

Contrary to the custom of the day, Etsu's education was more like that given a boy than a girl but Etsu's only brother had been disowned, and her father wished her to have an especially good education. Her mother, however, lamented this and sadly complained to her daughter, "Your honorable father trains you in so boy-like a manner that I fear fate must search long for your un-found husband. No gentle, family wants an ungenteel bride."

In spite of her mother's fears, Etsu was sought in marriage by a young Japanese in America who was a friend of her brother. After due and lengthy preparations, she sailed for America to become the bride of Matsuo Sugimoto and to become a stranger in a land of strange people and strange ways. She was sped on her way by these departing words from her grandmother, "Remember, Etsu-bo, where you live is a small matter. The life of a Samurai, man or woman, is just the same; loyalty to the overlord, bravery in defense of his honor. In your distant, destined home, remember Grandmother's words: loyalty to your husband, bravery in defense of his honor. It will bring you peace."

In America there were so many strange things. Madame Sugimoto writes that the sense of bigness was bewildering, almost overpowering, big rooms, big buildings, wide streets, big trees. It was to her a land of giants.

She had to learn that American women in evening clothes "displayed bare skin just for the purpose of having it seen," that people kissed each other, that there were bath tubs, running hot water, elevators, locked doors, and many, many things. Every American should read the chapters on her first impression of America and of the American customs which seemed to her so strange.

In America Etsu found both happiness and sadness—happiness with her husband and their two little American born girls, with her "American mother," and with many friends—and sadness

when her husband died while still a young man. Through all her experiences Etsu remained great hearted and brave, remembering that "The eyelids of a Samurai know no moisture."

It has been said that if the people of one nation really understood the people of every other nation, there could be no war. To read this book is to gain a better understanding of the people of Japan, for in revealing the incidents and episodes of her life, the stories and customs which impressed her, Etsu Sugimoto reveals the characters and personality of her people by comparing them with our American customs, she establishes a kinship between the Japanese and the American people. The book is a picture of more the Japanese life. As Christopher Morley says, she gives a "unique picture of the exquisite complexity and beauty of all humankind."—By "E. R."
