

DALEY STEALS HONORS FROM GEO. SIMPSON

Holy Cross Sprinter Is Yard Ahead of Flash in 60-Yard Race

NEW YORK, Feb. 18, (AP)—Jimmy Daley of Holy Cross stole the honors of the Eastern debut of the "fastest human," Geo. Simpson of Ohio State, at the New York A. C. indoor track meet.

Simpson trailed Daley by over a yard at the finish of the 60-yard dash. The time was 6.3-5, two-fifths of a second behind the record, and just what Simpson made in winning his heat.

Pole Tunes Tables
Stanislav Petkiewicz of Poland, beaten over the two mile route at the Millrose meet, came back to defeat his conqueror, Paul Rekors of Penn State, by five yards in the 5,000 meter race.

Northwestern's slight vaulting star, Tommy Warne, kept on going right up after Fred Sturdy of Yale and the Los Angeles A. C., and Barney Berlinger of Pennsylvania, rivals for indoors honors for two years, had stopped. Warne cleared 13 feet 6 inches, and barely failed in an attempt to go four inches higher. Berlinger took second with 13 feet, while Sturdy failed to show his usual form and made but 12.6.

Edwards Wins Half Mile
Phil Edwards scored his first major victory of the season in the Breyer half mile, defeating Dr. Paul Martin of Switzerland and Fred Velt, a former team-mate.

Ray Conger of the Illinois A. C., won the fastest mile of the season to win the Baxter Mile trophy. He was timed in 4:19.2-5 to beat Joey Hickley of N. Y. U.

Holy Cross beat Georgetown at the mile relay in 3:23.3-5, the best performance of the year.

Stowell Resumes Score Leadership in North Sector

PORTLAND, Feb. 18, (AP)—Harold Stowell, University of Idaho basketball sharpshooter, with 111 baskets, resumed the leadership in the individual scoring of the northern division of the Pacific Coast conference on the basis of last week's results.

Hal McClary, Washington center, jumped into second place with 104 points. Hank Swanson fell from first to third position, with 99 points.

Tied with Swanson is Claude Holsten of Washington State. Art McLarny, Idaho flash, comes next, with 93. Bill Keenan, Oregon, edged in ahead of his Oregon State rival, Buck Grayson, running his total to 89, while the Oregonian stopped at 87.

Oregon State went into the lead in team scoring, with 389 points, dropping Washington to second place with 374 counters. Oregon remains third, with Washington State and Idaho bringing up the rear.

Oregon State continued to set the pace in personal fouls, with 143, with Oregon second. Eberhart of the Webfoots, became the chief individual offender, with 32, as compared to 26 for Grayson.

The league will meet each Monday evening at 8 o'clock at the Klamath Recreation.

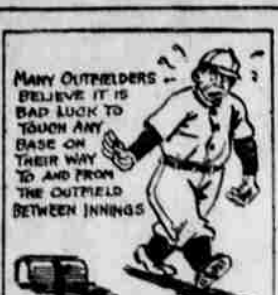
Webfoots Take One From Fast Vandals

Baseball superstitions are just as numerous as ball players. Some are general, but most of them are individual.

Some managers have certain players who take up the batting order to the umpire before each game. Still another player may be considered lucky in taking messages from the bench to the "bull pen."

Mike Gazella used to have this job for the late Miller Huggins with the Yankees.

John McGraw used to consider it highly unlucky to notify a hurler the night before, that he was going to pitch the next day.

The late Pat Moran believed it was unlucky to tell the pitcher in advance.

Some players have lucky bats that they lug up to the plate in addition to the bat they hit with. They would hold up a game fifteen minutes looking for the charmed piece of wood and then throw it away when they reached the plate.

Players have been known to change the arrangement of the furniture in their home or hotel room, thinking it would bring them out of a hitting slump.

Strangler Sends Charlie Hanson To the Hospital

SEATTLE, Feb. 18, (AP)—Ten terrific headlocks and five rabbit punches gave Ed "Strangler" Lewis victory in the sixth round of a scheduled eight-round match here last night, and sent Charlie Hanson, Seattle favorite, to the hospital. Hanson was reported doggedly today, though he was rushed from the ring to the hospital in an ambulance, suffering from convulsions.

The former world's champion put all of his 247 pounds behind the tenth headlock, which ended the struggle, and Hanson will probably feel the neck wrench for several days.

Up to the time Lewis got to Hanson with the first rabbit punch in the sixth, the Seattle grappler had won four of the first five rounds, in his third vain attempt to pin the "Strangler."

In the fifth he almost won a fall when he held Lewis close to the mat with an arm lock and wrist hold until the bell ended the round. Lewis wrestled cautiously in the early rounds, apparently awaiting the chance to clamp on his famous headlock.

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All Off With Big Swede When Giant Primo Gets Angry

OKLAHOMA CITY, Feb. 18, (AP)—Primo Canera, the biggest boxer of them all, crawled out of his sixth American boxing ring here last night with another two-round knockout victory dangling from his belt.

Behind him, wondering what it was all about, he left John O. "Man Mountain" Erickson, big Chicago Swede, a victim after one minute and 45 seconds of the second round of what was scheduled as a ten-round bout, had elapsed.

The Chicago Swede seemed willing to mix things, and a stunning right that landed on Canera's jaw, followed by a short jab to the stomach, aroused Primo's ire.

He tore in, tumbling the big Chicagoan twice in rapid succession, before the final count was tolled.

Erickson fell victim to a short left hook, followed by a right cross that was ticketed with the ten count when Primo started in. Just prior to this Canera had sent the big Swede sprawling across the ropes for counts of eight and nine.

Wallgren on Road To National Title

Monrad C. Wallgren of Everett, Wash., former national amateur 15.2 balking title holder, has just won the Pacific Northwest 15.2 title, and qualified to meet Robert Fouts of Los Angeles, winner of the Pacific Coast crown, for the Pacific Southwest championship.

They will meet in a 906-point match at the Seattle Recreation in Seattle on February 20, 21 and 22, and the winner will qualify to compete in the national 15.2 championship at the University club at St. Louis, beginning on March 10.

Wallgren won the title by defeating Percy N. Collins of Chicago in Everett last fall, then lost to Ray V. Fessenden of Madison, Wis. Wallgren won all four games in the Pacific Northwest tourney, which was played in Portland. He defeated C. G. Olausen of Portland in the final by 250 to 114, in 21 innings. His grand average for the four games was 10.21. He ran out one 250-point game, that against Sam Cooper of Seattle, in 13 innings, for an average of 20.91. He also broke a Northwest record for high run, with 87.

The Cougars scored heavily on free throws and it was these counters that proved the winning margin. Another game will be played tonight.

Atheistic Soviets Hurl Defi at Pope
LENINGRAD, U. S. S. R., Feb. 18, (AP)—"Curse us as much as you please; we will never turn

from the path shown us by Lenin," says a fiery manifesto issued by the Union of Militant Atheists today, dealing with the recent papal denunciation of the Soviets for their attitude regarding religion.

"There will come a time when the atheistic workers of the entire world will convert the Vatican into a museum," says the manifesto. "The mummy Roman pope will be interred with the mummy Siberian medicine man as a monument to the thousand years old religious delusion and deceit."

The manifesto also urged all workers to join the ranks of the atheists and march forward "towards new triumphs and socialism."

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
